NOTICE is hereby given, that Her Majesty will hold a Drawing-Room at the Queen's Palace, on Thursday the 23d instant, at two o'clock, to celebrate His Royal Highness the Prince Regent's birth-day.

AT the Court at Carlton-House, the 6th of April 1818,

PRESENT,

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in Council.

WHHEREAS by an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, cap. 57, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to suspend training, and to regulate the quotas of the militia," it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by any Order or Orders in Council, to suspend the calling out of the militia of the United Kingdom, or any part of the United Kingdom, or of any county, riding, shire, stewartry, city, town, or place, for the purpose of being trained and exercised in any year, and to order and direct that no training or exercising of the militia of the United Kingdom, or of any county or counties, riding or ridings, shire or shires, stewartry or stewardries, city or cities, town or towns, or place or places, specified in any such Order or Orders in Council, shall take place in any year, any thing contained in any Act or Acts of Parliament relating to the militia, to the contrary notwithstanding: And whereas it is deemed expedient that such training and exercising should be dispensed with in the present year; it is ordered by His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, that the calling out of the militia of that part of the United Kingdom called Great Britain, for the purpose of being trained and exercised in the present year, be suspended, and that no training or exercising of the said militia do take place in the present year.

WE, the Mayor, Aldermen, Citizens, and Inhabitants of the ancient and loyal City of Worcester, in Common Hall assembled, this 5th day of December, offer to your Serene Highness all the consolation which our sincerest sympathy with you upon the lamentable loss you have had to sustain may be calculated to convey. Unaffected and sincere indeed is that common feeling which animates us upon this mournful occasion. All classes, all descriptions of people from the highest to the lowest, deplore with one accord your severe and unparalleled affliction; most bitterly and heavily have the feelings of a populous nation borne testimony to the value of that object which it has lost, whilst sorrow has united the public voice in one unvaried sentiment of suffering at the peculiar visitation of calamity which it has pleased Heaven to shower down upon your Serene Highness. That the tranquillity and manly fortitude of your Serene Highness's mind may, under the Grace of Heaven, remain undiminished, is the anxious and fervent prayer of those who subscribe themselves your attached and devoted servants.

BY THE LORDS COMMISSIONERS OF HIS MAJESTY'S TREASURY:

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the forty-third year of His present Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for permitting certain goods, imported into Great Britain, to be secured in warehouses without payment of duty," it is, amongst other things, enacted as follows, that it shall be lawful for the importer or importers, proprietor or proprietors, consignee or consignees of any of the goods, wares, or merchandise, enumerated and described in the table hereunto annexed, marked (A), and, which shall be legally imported and brought into the port of London, to lodge and secure the same under the joint locks of the Crown, and the merchant, in any warehouse or warehouses situated at the Isle of Dogs, and belonging to the West India Dock Company, without payment, at the time of the first entry of such goods, wares, or merchandise, of the duties of Customs or Excise due on the importation thereof, subject nevertheless, to the rules, regulations, and restrictions directed by this Act; provided always, that no such goods, wares, or merchandise shall be so lodged or secured, unless and until such warehouses and other works, belonging or to belong thereto, shall be so far completed, that in the judgement of the Lord High Treasurer or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the time being, or any three or more of them, the same shall be fit and proper, in every respect, for the reception of such goods, wares, and merchandise, and wherein the same may respectively be safely and securely deposited and remain under the regulations and directions of this Act; and the Lord High Treasurer or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the time being, or any three or more of them, are hereby authorised and empowered, by writing under his or their hand or hands, to certify and make known his or their approbation of such warehouses, which certificate

shall be published, three times at least, in the London Gazette, and in two or more public morning newspapers then usually circulated in London:

We, the undersigned, Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, do, in pursuance of the said Act, certify and make known that the new vault, No. 2, situated upon the Rum Quay, on the south side of the said Company's import dock, and adjoining the West Wood Wharf, is, in our judgement, fit and proper for the reception of rum, being one of the articles enumerated and described in the said table annexed to the said Act, and wherein the same may respectively be safely and securely deposited and remain under the regulations and directions of the said Act: and we do hereby declare our approbation of the said vault for such purpose accordingly.

WHÈREAS by an Act, passed in the forty-third year of the reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for permitting certain goods imported into Great Britain, to be secured in warehouse without payment of duty," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that it shall be lawful for the importer or importers, proprietor or proprietors, consignee or consignees, of any goods, wares, or merchandise enumerated or described in the table hereunto annexed marked (C), and which shall be legally imported or brought into the port of London, to land any such goods without payment at the time of the first entry of such goods, wares, and merchandise, of the duties of Customs due on the importation thereof; and such goods may be lodged and secured at or in such places, and under such rules, regulations, and restrictions as the Commissioners of the Customs in England, or any four or more of them, shall approve and direct, upon the said importer, proprietor, or consigned entering into bond to His Majesty, his heirs, and successors, with one sufficient surety, to be approved of by the Collector and Comptroller of the Customs of the said port of London, in double the amount of the full duties due and payable on the importation of such goods, wares, and merchandise, with condition that such goods, wares, and merchandise shall be either duly exported in the manner and under such rules, regulations, and restrictions, so far as the same are applicable thereto, as by this Act are directed in respect of goods, wares, or merchandise secured in warehouses aforesaid, and exported directly from thence, or that the full duties due and payable on the importation of such goods, wares, or merchandise shall be paid to the Collector, or other proper Officer of the Customs, within the space of twelve months from the date of the first entry of such goods; and it is by the said recited Act further enacted, that if the Lord High Treasurer, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the time being, or any three or more

of them, shall deem it expedient that the provisions of the said Act should be extended to any goods, wares, and merchandise not enumerated or described in either of the tables annexed thereto, and shall cause a list of such goods, wares, and merchandise to be published in the London Gazette, then and from thenceforth all and every the provisions, regulations, and restrictions of the said Act shall extend, and be construed to extend, to such goods, wares, and merchandise, in every respect in as full and ample a manner as if the same had been inserted and enumerated in the said tables respectively, at the time of passing the said Act:

We, the undersigned, Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, pursuant to and in execution of the powers vested in us in and by the said Act, do hereby declare, that it appears to us expedient that the provisions of the said Act should be extended to the article of

Foreign Rape Seed,

legally imported or brought into the port of London (not being imported by the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies); and that such rape seed should be added to the list of goods, wares, and merchandise enumerated and described in the table annexed to the said recited Act marked (C); and that such rape seed should be lodged and secured at or in such places as the Commissioners of the Customs in England, or any four or more of them, shall approve and direct, under the regulations and directions of the said Act: and we do further declare, that from and after the publication of this our certificate in the London Gazette, conformable to the directions of the said Act, all and every the provisions, regulations, and restrictions of the said Act shall extend, and be construed to extend, to all such rape seed in every respect in as full and ample a manner as if the same had been inserted and enumerated in the table annexed to the said Act marked (C), at the time of the passing of the same Act.

And, as a further encouragement, a reward of FIFTY POUNDS is hereby offered by the Committee for Improving the Navigation of the River Thames, to any person or persons who shall discover his or their accomplice or accomplices therein, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof, or to any person or persons who shall apprehend and bring the said offenders to conviction, or cause them or any of them to be apprehended and convicted as aforesaid. 
