AT the Court at *Carlton-House*, the 13th of May 1818,

PRESENT,

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in Council.

WHEREAS the time limited by the Order of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent in Council of the tenth of October last, for prohibiting the exportation of gunpowder, arms, or ammunition, to the places therein specified, will expire on the thirtieth day of this instant May; and whereas it is expedient, that the said prohibition should be continued for some time longer; His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, doth, therefore, hereby, order, require, prohibit, and command, that no person or persons whatsoever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's service) do, at any time during the space of six months (to commence from the thirtieth of this instant May), presume to transport any gunpowder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, to any port or place on the Coast of Africa, or in the West Indies, or on any part of the Continent of America (except to a port or place, or ports or places in His Majesty's territories or possessions on the Continent of North America, or in the territories of the United States of America), or ship or lade any gunpowder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, on board any ship or

vessel, in order to transporting the same into any such ports or places on the Coast of Africa, or in the West Indies, or on the Continent of America (except as above excepted), without leave or permission in that behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring and suffering the respective forfeitures and penalties inflicted by an Act, passed in the twenty-ninth year of His late Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of salt-petre, and to enforce the law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of gunpowder, or any sort of arms or ammunition, and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying coastwise of salt-petre, gunpowder, or any sort of arms or ammunition;" and also by an Act, passed in the thirty-third year of His Majesty's reign, cap. 2, intituled "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the exportation of naval stores, and more effectually to prevent the exportation of salt-petre, arms, and ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council:"

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, cap. 57, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to suspend training, and to regulate the quotas of the militia," it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by any Order or Orders in Council, to suspend the calling out of the militia of the United Kingdom, or any part of the United Kingdom, or of any county, riding, shire, stewardry, city, town, or place, for the purpose of being trained and exercised in any year, and to order and direct that no training or exercising of the militia of the United Kingdom, or of any county or counties, riding or ridings, shire or shires, stewardry or stewardries, city or cities, town or towns, or place or places, specified in any such Order or Orders in Council, shall take place in any year, any thing contained in any Act or Acts of Parliament relating to the militia, to the contrary notwithstanding: And whereas it is deemed expedient that such training and exercising should be dispensed with in the present year; it is ordered by His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, that the calling out of the militia of that part of the United Kingdom called Great Britain, for the purpose of being trained and exercised in the present year, be suspended, and that no training or exercising of the said militia do take place in the present year.

His Royal Highness the **PRINCE REGENT** in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the twentieth year of the reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for regulating the trade between the subjects of His Majesty's colonies and plantations in North America and in the West India Islands and the countries belonging to the United States of America, and between His Majesty's said subjects and the Foreign Islands in the West Indies," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty in Council, by Order or Orders to be issued and published from time to time, to authorise, or by Warrant or Warrants under His sign manual, to empower the Governor of Newfoundland for the time being, to authorise, in case of necessity, the importation into Newfoundland of bread, flour, Indian corn, and live stock, from any of the territories belonging to the said United States, for the supply of the inhabitants and fishermen of the Island of New-

foundland, for the then ensuing season only; provided always, that such bread, flour, Indian corn, and live stock, so authorised to be imported into the Island of Newfoundland, shall not be imported except in conformity to such rules, regulations, and restrictions as shall be specified in such Order or Orders, Warrant or Warrants respectively, and except by British subjects, and in British-built ships, owned by His Majesty's subjects, and navigated according to law:

And whereas it is expedient and necessary, that provision be made for fully supplying the inhabitants and fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing season, with bread, flour, Indian corn, and live stock, His Royal Highness the Prince Regent doth thereupon, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, hereby order and declare, that for the supply of the inhabitants and fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing season only, bread, flour, Indian corn, and live stock, may be imported into the said island from any of the territories belonging to the said United States, by British subjects, and in British-built ships, owned by His Majesty's subjects, and navigated according to law, and which within the space of nine months previous to the time of such importation, have cleared out from some port of the United Kingdom of Great Britain or Ireland, or other His Majesty's dominions in Europe, for which purpose a licence shall have been granted by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, or any other person or persons who may be duly authorised in that kingdom respectively, in the manner and form herein-after mentioned; which licence shall continue and be in force for nine calendar months from the day of the date upon which such licence is respectively granted, and no longer; provided that no such licence as aforesaid, granted after the thirtieth day of September next, shall be of any force or effect: and His Royal Highness is hereby further pleased to order, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, that the master or person having the charge or command of any ship or vessel to whom such licence shall be granted, shall, upon the arrival of the said ship or vessel at the port, harbour, or place in the said Island of Newfoundland where he shall discharge such bread, flour, Indian corn, and live stock, deliver up the said licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs there, having first indorsed on the back of such licence the marks, numbers, and contents of each package of bread, flour, Indian corn, and the number of live stock, under the penalty of the forfeiture in the said Act mentioned; and the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs at Newfoundland, is hereby enjoined and required to give a certificate to the master or person having the charge or command of such ship or vessel, of his having received the said licence so indorsed as before directed, and to transmit the same to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or to the Commissioners of

His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland respectively, by whom such licence was granted. *Chetwynd.*

FORM OF LICENCE.

By the Commissioners for managing and causing to be levied and collected His Majesty's Customs, Subsidies, and other Duties in [where]

WHEREAS [the name of the person] one of His Majesty's subjects, residing at [place where] hath given notice to us the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs [in Great Britain, or Revenue in Ireland] that he intends to lade at [some port of the United States of America] and import into [some port of Newfoundland] in the [ship's name] being a British-built ship [describing the tonnage and what sort of vessel] navigated according to law, whereof [master's name] is master, bound to [where]; and it appearing by the register of the said ship [ship's name] whereof [master's name] is master, that the said ship, the [ship's name] was built at [place where] and owned by [owner's name] residing at [place where] all His Majesty's British subjects, and that no foreigner, directly or indirectly, hath any share, part, or interest therein.

Now be it known, that the said [person's name] hath a licence to lade on board the said ship, [ship's name] at and from any port or place belonging to the United States of America, bread, flour, Indian corn, or live stock, the produce of the said United States, and no other article whatever; and to carry the said bread, flour, Indian corn, and live stock, to some port or place in the Island of Newfoundland; and on the arrival of the said ship at any port, harbour, or place of discharge in Newfoundland, the master or person having the charge or command of the said ship, is required and enjoined to deliver up the said licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of His Majesty's Customs there, and to indorse on the back thereof the marks, numbers, and contents of each package of bread, flour, Indian corn, and the number of live stock, and shall thereupon receive a certificate thereof from the said Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs.

This licence to continue in force for calendar months from the date hereof.

Westminster, May 23, 1818.

THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorised by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, for declaring His Majesty's Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Arch-*

bishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act to repeal the several bounties on the exportation of refined sugar from any part of the United Kingdom, and to allow other bounties in lieu thereof until the fifth day of July one thousand eight hundred and twenty, and for reducing the size of the packages in which refined sugar may be exported:

An Act to alter the allowance for broken plate glass, and to exempt manufacturers of certain glass wares from penalties for not being licensed:

An Act to permit the importation of certain articles into His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in the West Indies, or on the Continent of South America, and also certain articles into certain ports in the West Indies.

An Act to continue until the fifth day of July one thousand eight hundred and nineteen two Act, made in the fifty-fourth and fifty-sixth years of His present Majesty's reign, for regulating the trade in spirits between Great Britain and Ireland reciprocally, and to amend the same.

An Act for regulating the payment of fees for pardons under the Great Seal.

An Act for preventing frivolous and vexatious actions of assault and battery and for slanderous words in courts.

An Act to amend an Act passed in the fifty-third year of His Majesty's reign, to make further regulations for the building and repairing of court houses and sessions houses in Ireland.

An Act to amend so much of an Act of the fifty-fifth year of His present Majesty, as relates to the salaries of Clergymen officiating as Chaplains in houses of correction.

An Act to repeal an Act, made in the fifty-sixth year of His present Majesty's reign, for establishing the use of an hydrometer called Sikes's Hydrometer, in ascertaining the strength of spirits, instead of Clarke's Hydrometer, and for making other provisions in lieu thereof.

An Act to provide for the maintaining of theoyal canal from the River Liffey to the River Shannon, in Ireland.

An Act for rendering more effectual several Acts of His present Majesty for draining certain low lands on both sides of the River Witham, and in Wildmore Fen, and in the West and East Fens, and other low lands adjoining or contiguous thereto, in the county of Lincoln.

An Act for better paving, cleansing, lighting, watching, and improving the streets, lanes, and other public places and passages of the city of Aberdeen, and the roads and avenues within the freedom and royalty thereof, and for supplying the inhabitants of the said city with water.

An Act for erecting and maintaining a harbour and works connected therewith in the bay of Portnessock, at Kirkmaiden, within the barony of Logan, in the county of Wigton.

An Act to amend the several Acts passed for making wet docks, basins, cuts, and other works, for the greater accommodation and security of

shipping, commerce, and revenue, within the port of London.

An Act for making a railway from the Hay Railway, near Eardesley, in the county of Hereford, to the Lime Works, near Burlinjob, in the county of Radnor.

An Act for lighting with gas the University and City of Oxford, and the suburbs of the said city.

An Act for lighting with gas the town and parish of Sheffield, in the county of York.

An Act for lighting with gas the port and town of Liverpool, and township of Toxteth Park, in the county of Lancaster.

An Act for lighting the city and suburbs of Edinburgh and places adjacent with gas.

An Act for enabling the Southwark Bridge Company to raise a further sum of money, and to amend the Acts for building the said bridge.

An Act for making and maintaining a turnpike road from Bramley, in the county of Surrey, to Ridgewick, in the county of Sussex.

An Act for making and maintaining a turnpike road from the turnpike road leading from Ulverstone to Kendal, into the turnpike road leading from Millthorp to Kendal, and a continuation of the said road from the last mentioned turnpike road to join the turnpike road leading from Lancaster to Kendal.

An Act for more effectually converting into money the statute labour in the stewardry of Kirkcudbright, for repairing the highways, bridges, and ferries therein, and for making and maintaining certain turnpike roads within the said stewardry.

An Act for repairing the road from Chipping Campden, in the county of Gloucester, to Clifford Side Gate, in the parish of Old Stratford, in the county of Warwick.

An Act to continue the term and enlarge the powers of several Acts for repairing the roads from Basingstoke, through Popham-lane, Sutton, Scotney, and Stockbridge, in the county of Southampton, to a place called Lobcombe Corner, in the county of Wilts.

An Act to alter and amend an Act, passed in the forty-third year of His Majesty's reign, for raising a fund for making provision for the widows of the Writers to His Majesty's Signet in Scotland.

For the purpose of upholding the said Rector in the exercise of his undoubted rights, and of marking with the severest censure, dissensions so contrary to all true sense of Religion, and so subversive of Church discipline, and for bringing the author of the said letter to condign punishment, His Royal Highness is hereby pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to promise His Majesty's most gracious pardon to any person privy to the writing or sending the said letter, who shall discover the person or persons who actually wrote and sent the same, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof

And as a further encouragement a reward of **ONE HUNDRED GUINEAS** is hereby offered by the said Rev. Thomas Wyndham, L. L. D.
