**T**He Duke of Cadaval is come hither inognito, and is Lodged in the House of the Envoy of Portugal: He has seen the Duke and Dutchess of Savoy. There is not as yet any discourse of his Highness's departure, because his indisposition continues upon him to the great trouble of this Court.

Brussels, July 17, The Marquis de Grana has declared, That he will accept of the 800 thousand Florins, which the States of this Province are willing to grant for an extraordinary supply, upon condition no abatements be made for the marching and lodging of Troops; which the States, it's believed, will consent to, finding that the moneys given by the several Provinces are wholly employed for the Payment of the Forces, and not diverted to any other use. His Excellency intends to go from hence the beginning of the next Week, to visit Aeth, Mons, and the other Garisons on that side; but before he begins this Journey, he will order another Months Pay to the Army. His Excellency continues resolved that all *Maistres de Camp*, and Colonels, shall obey the Governors where they are in Garison, though they are not Generals of Battaile; and Colonel Vanderput, who was committed Prisoner to the Cittadel of Antwerp, for refusing to obey the Governor of *Leire*, where his Regiment is, has upon his submission obtained his Liberty. From Lille we have advice, That Monsieur *Montbron* is now Encamped, with a Body of French Horse, near *Conde*, having eaten up all the Forage in his two former Camps, near *Cambrai* and *Valenciennes*: Monsieur *Sourdais* has likewise for the same reason changed his ground, and is now Encamped near *Pont-Espieres*. From *Luxemburg* they write, That a Body of French Horse and Dragoons continues encamped near that place, but that all the French Troops that were Quartered in the Towns and Castles of that Province, are Marched towards *Thionville*. The disorders at *Liege* continue very high.

Brussels, July 21. Yesterday in the Evening the Marquis de Grana parted from hence for Flanders, and will be this night at *Bruges*, where the States of that Province are to assemble the 23 Instant, to settle the matter of the extraordinary supply which his Excellency has demanded of them; The States of this Province are separated, but are to meet again after his Excellencies return from Flanders. It is believed his Excellency will make a step from *Bruges* to *Newport* and *Ostend*, to see what forwardness the new Fortifications that are making there are in. We have Letters from *Lille* which give an account, That the French have Quitted *Chevre*, near *Aeth*, as likewise *Antoin*, near *Tournay*, and some other places which they have possessed themselves of since the Peace of *Nimeguen*, but upon what motive we know not.

Whitehal, July 13. The following Addresses were very graciously received by His Majesty.

To the Kings most Excellent Majesty.

**W**E the Mayor, Aldermen, Sheriffs, with the Burgeses and Inhabitants of the County Burrough of Carmarthen, your Majesties most Loyal and Dutifully devoted Subjects, being deeply apprehensive of the inestimable Blessings in all Sacred and Secular Concerns, enjoyed under your Majesties propitious Government (which before the signal Divine Mercy in your happy Restoration, were injuriously invaded, trampled on) having had Experimental Assurances of your Majesties just and gracious Reign, not warping from the Established Laws (the Kingdom being by the influences of your Majesties wise Conduct in a prosperous State of Peace and Tranquility of Commerce and Plenty, so the Envy of all other Nations) are astonisht at the late Execrabie Association; a Work of Darknes Provisionally brought to light (at the Impeachment of the E. of Shaftsbury at the Old-Baily) a disingenious, monstrous Brat of Ingratitude, an equal defiance of Piety and Loyalty, designed not only to the future Interests of your Majesties lawfull Successors, but to all the present Preheminencies and Jurisdictions of your Crown and Dignity; opening a Suicid to a return, an Inundation of those Evormities of distmal mischiefs and miseries formerly sustained, Still fresh in our memories. We sincerely profess our utter irreconcilable Abhorrence of that Traiterous Model and Unparalell'd Schemer of Populair Seditions, which though it is Prefaced with an Inroad of Protestant Zeal, (Rebellion never appearing to the World without a Masque of Religion) yet the cloje, beyond all Precedent, Faction, Covements, and Conspiracies, discovers the deformed Lineaments, the disfigured Aspect of Democracy, and Anarchy, the ulcer'd completion of Treason, without any Pair or Parrish, without the least Recognition of your Majesties Sovereign Power (being manifestly rejected; sprag'd at) a most presumptuous attempt, not consistent with the Conscientious Duties of Pagan, much less Christian Reformed Subjects, notoriously contrary to the indispensable Obligations of the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy, which we resolve inviolably to observe, not daring to provoke the Divine Indignation by the horrid guilt of Perjury, though pilliated by Jesustical Sophistry, or the modish Transcription thereof. A Fanaticall Collusion. We have hereto put our Common Seal, and Subscribed our Names.

To the Kings most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Loyal young Freemen and Apprentices of the City of London.

May it please Your Majesty,

**W**Hereas Your Majesties most Loyal and Obedient Subjects have been formerly scandalized with being Popishly and Tumultuously Inclined, and for meddling with things we have nothing to do withal; by the Enemies of Your Royal Person and Government, and the Publick Peace; only for presenting our selves in a dutiful way of acknowledging the Blessings we enjoy in our Religion and Liberties; under Your Princely and most Gracious Reign over us. We do withall

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firmly presume to declare, That we will lay our Lives at Your Majesties Feet, in the defence of Your Sacred Person and Authority, the Rights of Your Lawfull Successors, and the true Protestant Religion as it is Established by Law, against all Oppoblers of the same, without exception of any Quality, Principles, or Perswasions whatsoever.

And in a further justification of our Practices and Intentions, we take the boldness to subjoin this Protestation, That we reckon our selves concerned as English-men and Loyal Subjects, and even under the Character of Loyal Young Freemen and Apprentices of this Your Famous City of LONDON, with our Bloods, and utmost hazards, to assert this Monarchy, and the Rights of the Imperial Crown, in Detestation of that Rebellious Paper of ASSOCIATION that was produced at the Old-Baily in the Case of the Earl of SHAFTS-BURY, expressly purporting a design to Dethrone Your Sacred Majesty, and to set up a Traiterous number of our own Fellow-Subjects to Rule over us.

May God Preserve Your Majesty, Your Royal Family, the Church, and the Laws, and Bleis the Parties to this Address no longer than while they make good every Title of this Declaration,

*Whitehal, July 13.* The Ambassadors from the King of Bantam having taken their leave of His Majesty, ( who gave them His Letter to their Master with His own hand ) did both of them receive the Honour of Knighthood, and each of them the Sword wherewith it was conferred, and Embroidred Belts, which were Buckled about them in His Majesties Presence: The next day they were conducted to Greenwich, where they went aboard the Cleveland Yacht, which carries them to *Chatham*, to see the Navy Royal, and from thence on board the *Kempborne*, an East-India-Man, of above 700 Tun, wherein they are to make their Voyage home.

*Whitehal, July 14.* This day the Ambassador from the Emperor of Morocco was conducted to take his Leave of the King, and to receive the Letter to his Master from His Majesties own hand, to whom he made many acknowledgments of the great Honours and Favours he had received during all his stay in England, but most especially now at his departure.

*London, July 15.* Yesterday the Common-Hall met, pursuant to the Adjournment made that day Sevensnight, where the Lord Mayor and Aldermen being come down to the *Hustings*, the following Order of His Majesty in Council was read.

At the Court at *Whitehal*, July 13. 1682.

Present

The Kings most Excellent Majesty, &c.

His Majesty having been informed by the Lord Mayor, and divers of the Aldermen of London, That the Disorders and Riots arisen in that City upon the day appointed for the Election of Sheriffs, have been chiefly occasioned by the Proceedings of the Common-Hall in an irregular way, contrary to what hath been anciently accustomed, His Majesty, by the Advice of His Council, hath thought fit, for the better keeping of the Peace of the City, to Direct, and hereby Require the Lord Mayor, to maintain and preserve intire the Ancient Customs of the City; and for the better doing thereof, to take effectual order, that at the Common-Hall to be held to morrow, all Proceedings be begun anew, and carried on in the usual manner, as they ought to have been upon the 24th of June last.

This done, the Lord Mayor and the Aldermen withdrew, and the Honourable *Dudley North* Esq; Elected by my Lord Mayor, according to ancient Custom, to be one of the Sheriffs of the City of London and County of *Middlesex* for the year ensuing, was put up by the Common-Sergeant to be confirmed, which was done accordingly; and then *Mr. Papillion*, *Mr. Dubois*, and *Mr. Box* were likewise put up in order to the choice of the other Sheriff; and the Election not being able to be determined by the View, a Poll was demanded, which being Reported to my Lord Mayor in the usual form, his Lordship with the Court of Aldermen came down to the *Hustings*, and having first called

out *Mr. North* to take upon him the Office of Sheriff, ordered a Poll, as was demanded, between the other three, which his Lordship afterwards Adjourned till this morning, that the Proceedings might be orderly and regular, and Right done to all Parties; and appointed the Common-Sergeant, the Town-Clerk, the two Secondaries, and the four Attorneys of the Mayors Court, the sworn Officers of the City, to take the Poll, which being taken and cast up in the presence of *Mr. Ellis*, and others appointed by the Sheriffs in behalf of *Mr. Papillion* and *Mr. Dubois*, Report thereof was made by the Common-Sergeant to the Lord Mayor and Aldermen, in the Mayors Court, according to ancient usage; and thereupon his Lordship and the Aldermen came down to the *Hustings*, and Declared the Election by majority of Voices to have fallen upon *Mr. Box*, who after Proclamation, was called out, to take upon him the Office of Sheriff. The other Proceedings, by way of Polling in another place, being contrary to the ancient Usages of the City, and without any Warrant or Authority from my Lord Mayor.

*Mr. North* and *Mr. Box* being thus declared Sheriffs for the year ensuing, the Common-Hall was Dissolved, and my Lord Mayor returned to his House, accompanied with the Aldermen, and several hundred of the most eminent and substantial Citizens.
