He Duke of Cadaval is come hither incognito, and is Lodged in the Houle of the Envoy of Portugal: He has feen the Duke and Dutchels of Savoy. There is not as yet any difcourfe of his Highaels's departure, because his indisposition continues upon himy to the great trouble of this Court.

Bruffels, Fuly 17, The Marquils de Grana has de-clared. That he will accept of the 800 thousand Florins, which the States of this Province are willing to grant for an extraordinary fupply, upon condition no abatements be made for the marching and lodging of Troops; which the States, it's believed will confent to, finding that the moneys given by the feveral Provinces are wholly employed for the Payment of the Forces, and not diverted to any other ule. His Excellency intends to go from hence the beginning of the next Week, to visit Asth, Mons, and the other Garifons on that fide; but before he begins this Journey, he will order another Months Pay to the Army. His Excellency conti-nues refolved that all Maisfres de Camp, and Color sels, shall obey the Governors where they are in Garifon, though they are not Generals of Battaile; and Colonel Vanderput, who was committed Prifoner to the Cittadel of Antwerp, for refufing to obey the Governor of Leire, where his Regiment is, has upon his fubmillion obtained his Liberty. From Lille we have advice, That Monfieur Montbron is now Encamped, with a Body of French Horfe, near Conde, having caten up all the Forage in his two former Camps, near Cambray and Valenciennes : Monfigur Sourdis has likewife for the fame reafon ichanged his ground, and is now Encamped near Pont Espieres. From Luxemburg they write, That a Body of French Horfe and Dragoons continues encamped near that place, but that all the French Troops that were Quartered in the Towns and Caffles of that Province, are Marched towards Thionville. The diforders at Liege continue very high,

Bruffels, July 21. Yetherday in the Evening the Marquifs de Grana parted from hence for Flanders, and will be this night at Bruges, where the States of that Province are to affemble the 23 Inflant, to fattle the matter of the extraordinary fupply which his Excellency has demanded of them; The States of this Province are feparated, but are to meet again after his Excellencies return from Flanders. It is belived his Excellency will make a flep from Bruges to Newport and Oftend, to fee what forwardnels the new Fortifications that are making there are in. We have Letters from Lille which give an account, That the French have Quitted Chevre, near Aeth, as likewile Antoin, near Tournay, and fome other places which they have poffeffed themfelves of fince the Peace of Nimeguen, but upon what motive we know not. \* Whitebal, Fuly 13. We do withvall Humilury Attanility Trefume so declare, That we will lav cur Lives at Your Majellies Peet, in the defence of Your Sacred Perion and Authority, the Rights of Your Lawlul Succeffors, and the true Protectant Religion as it is Established by Law, againit all Oppolers of the fame, without exception of any Quality, Principles, or Perfuedions whatloever.

This done, the Lord Mayor and the Aldermen withdrows and the Honourable Dudley North Efq; Elected by my Lord Mayor, according to ancient Cultom, to be one of the Sheriffs of the City of London and County of Middlefex for the year enfuing, was put up by the Common-Sergeant to be confirmed, which was done accordingly ; and then

out Mr. North to take upon him the Office of Sheriff, ordered a Poll, as was demanded, berfleen the other three, which his, Lordlhip afterwards Adjourned till this morning, that the Proceedings might be orderly and regular, and Right done to all Parties; and appointed the Common-Serjant, the Town-Clerk, the two Secondaries, and the four Attorneys of the Mayors Court, the Iworn Officers of the City, to take the Poll, which being taken and call up in the prefence of Mr. Ellis, and othersappointed by the Sheriffs in behalf of Mr .- Papillion and Mr. Dubois, Report thereof was made by the Common-Serjeant to the Lord Mayor and Aldermen, in the Mayors Court, according to antient uage; and thereupon his Lordship and the Alderern came down to the Hustings, and Declared the Election by majority of Voices to have fallen upon Mr. Box, who after Proclamation, was called out, to take upon him the Office of Sheriff. The other Proceedings, by way of Polling in another place, being contrary to the antien: Ulages of the City, and without any Warrant or Authority from my Lord Mayor.

Mr. North and Mr. Box being thus declared She-riffs for the year enfuing, the Common-Hall was Diffolved, and my Lord Mayor returned to his Houle, accompanied with the Aldermen, and feveral hundred of the most eminent and substantial Citizens.
