THe Duke of Cadaval is come hither in sognito，and is Lodged in the Houlc on． the Envoy of Portugal：He has feen the Duke and Durchefs of Savoy． There is not as yet any difcourle of bis Highaifs＇s departure，becaule his indifpofition continues apon himy to the great trouble of this Court．
Erufels，Fuly ro，The Marquifs de Grama has de－ clared，That he will accept of the 800 thourand Florins，which the States of this Province are wile ling to grant for au extraordinary fupply，upon conty dition no abatements be made for the marching and lodging of Troops；which the States，it＇s believed will confent to，finding that the moneys given by＇ the feveral Provinces are wholly employed for the Fayment of the Forces，and not diverted to any 0 － ther ufe．His Excellency intends to go from hence the beginning of the next Weck，to vifit Aetb， mons，and the other Garifons on that fide；but be－ fore be begins this Journey，be will order another Months Pay to the Army．His Exceilency conti－ bues refolved that all Maiftres de Camp，and Color nels，fhall obey the Governors where theyare in Garifon，though they are not Generals of Battaile； and Colonel Vanderput，who was committed Pri－ foner to the Cittadel of Antwerp，for refufing to pbey the Gaverner of Leire，where his Regiment is，has upon his fubmiflion obtained his Liberty． From Lille we have advice，That Monfieur Montbron is now Encamped，＂with a Body of French Horfe， near Conde，having eaten up all the Forage in his two former Camps，nead Cambray and Falenciennes： Monfieur Sourdis has likewile for the fame reafon uchanged his ground，and is now Encamped near Poms．Efpieres．From Luxemburg they write，That a Body of Erench Horic and Dragoons continues encamped near that place，but that all the French Troops that were Quartered in the Towns and Calles of that Province，are Marched towards Thi－ onville．The diforders at Liege cortinue very high，

HIs Majefly baving been infurmed by the Lord Mayor，and divers of the Ahdermen of London， Tbat the Diforders and Riots arifen in that City upon Ihe day appointed for sbe Election of Sberiffs，bave boes cbiefly occafoned by the Proceedings of the Common－ Hall in an irregular way，conthary to pubat burb been －anciently accujtomed，Bi Majefly，by the Advice of Hi Council，batb thougkt fit，for the better keeping of the Peace of the City， 10 Direat，and bereby Require the Lurd Major，to maintain and preferva intire tbe Ancient Cuptoms of the City in and for the better doing tbereof，to take effectul order，that at the Common－ Hall to be beld to morrow，all Proceedings be begurs anew，and carried on in tbe $\mu$ fual manner，as they ought to bive been upon tbę 2 atb of June laft．

This done，the Lord Mayor and the Aldermen withdrows and the Honourable Dudley Nortb Efq； Ekected by my Lord Mayor，acciording to ancient Cuttom，to be one of the Sheriffs of the City of London and County of Middlefex for the year en－ fuing，was put up by the Common－Sergeant to be confinmed，which was done accordingly ；and then Mr．Papiliom，Mr．Duboir，and Mr．Box were like－ wife put up in order to the choice of the other Sheriff；and the Election not being able to be de－ termined by the View，a Poll was demand：d，which being Reported to iny Lord Mayor in th；phat form，his Lordhip with the Court of Aldermen came down to the Hufings，and baving firf called
out Mr．North to take upon him the Office of sheritt，ordered a Poll，as was demandet，betmeen the other three，which hia Lordthip afterwards Adjourned till this morning，that the Proceedings might be orderly and regutar，and Right Hone to all Parties；and appointicd the Common－Serjant the Town－Clerk，the two Secondaries，and the four Attorneys＂of the Mayors Cout，the fworn Officers of the City，to take the Poll，which being taken and calt up in the prefence of Mr． 2 tilis；andothers appointed by the Sheriffs in behalf of Mr．－Papillion and Mr．Dubois，Report thereof was made by the Common－Serjeant to the Lord Mayor and Alder－ men，in the Mayors Court，according to antient n － fage；and thereupon his Lordfhip and the Alder－ cen came down to the Hustings，and Declared the Eleclion by majority of Voices to have fallenup． on Ms．Box，who after Proclamation，was called out，to take upon him the Office of Sheriff． The other Procecdings，by way of Polling in another place，being contrary to the antien：Lifages of the City，and without any Warrant or Authori－ ty from my Lord Mayor．

Mr．North and Mr．Box being thus＇declarcd She－ riffs for the year enfuing，the Common－Hall was Diffolved，and my Lord Mayor returned to his Houle，accompanied with the Aldermen，and feve－ ral hundred of the molt eminent and fubstantial Citizens．
