Vienna, July 12.

TWO days since we received Letters from Hungary, which gave an account, that the Troops of Count Teckley were on their March in order to their Encampiing in a Body near *Serrenz*, and that it was believed the Turks and Transilvians would joyn them there; at the same time that we have these advices from Hungary, we are told here that the Palatine of Hungary is going to Marry with the Emperor's leave, with the Sister of Count Teckley, and that great Preparations are making for the solemnizing the Marriage at *Eysenstadt* in Hungary. The Imperial Troops in the meantime are on their March towards the *Theis*, and Count *Caprara*, who is to Command them, will part from hence in few days. The Emperor has declared Count *Strafoido* Lieutenant-General of his Forces in Hungary; he is at present Posted with a Body of Men near the *Berg-Towns*, to secure them against the attempts of the Turks, who have set several small places under Contribution, and Plundered and burnt some that refused it. As to the affairs of Germany, we cannot at present write much from hence, things seeming to be at stand upon these motions in Hungary. The Duke of *Lorraine* recovers his strength but slowly; wherefore his Physicians have advised him to go to *Baden* to use the Bath, which his Highness intends to do, and, as we are informed, will be accompanied by the Empress Dowager, and his Wife the Queen of *Pols*.

Strasbourg, July 17. Our Bishop parted from hence some days since for France, whither he will stay about six Weeks, and expect the Pope's Bulls to confirm him in this See. The French Troops, Encamped near *Lindax*, increase daily, and they have now there between seven and eight thousand Men. The new Forts on the *Rhine* are almost finished; and they begin to furnish them with Cannon and Ammunition. From *Francfort* they write, That Count *Waldeck* will very suddenly have a Body of 6000 Men together, and that he will Post himself with them on the *Rhine*; and at the same time the French give out, That if the Imperial Troops take the field, they will quickly have an Army together to make head against them. However, the general opinion here is, that things will not come to extremities, and that the Peace will be maintained.

Hamburg, July 21. We have Letters from *Helmstedt*, which is the Elector of Brandenburg was sending an Envoy to Vienna, and another to *Stockholm*, but upon what Commission was not known. From *Copenhagen* of the 14th Instant they write, That Monsieur *Bazin*, Ambassador from France, was arrived there in his way to Sweden; That the King of Denmark intended to part from thence the 23 Instant, for *Holsteyn*; and we have other Letters which tell us that the King is expected in *Oldenburg* about the latter end of this Month, to be pre-

sent at a general Review of his Troops, which is appointed to be held there.

Cologne, July 21. The Emperor has again written to our Elector, to advise him to accommodate matters with the City of *Liege*, before a third Party does concern himself therein: and his Electoral Highness, as we are informed, has answered that he is very desirous of a Composure, but that he expects the City of *Liege* should treat him with that Submission and Reip Et as becomes Subjects to their Prince. From Vienna we have advice, That an Express was arrived from Count *Caprara*, the Imperial Minister at *Constantinople*, and that it was said, he had not yet made any great advance in his Negotiation.

Brussels, July 22. His Excellency the Marquis *de Grana* is now at *Bruges*, where the States of *Flanders* are assembled; it is not doubted, but he will settle matters to his satisfaction, those States shewing a great disposition to do to the utmost of their power for the assisting his Excellency, who, since his coming to this Government, has so zealously employed himself for the putting these Countreys into a posture of defence and security. His Excellency is expected here again the latter end of this Week, at the beginning of the next, and soon after it's believed he will go and visit the Province of *Hainault*. The *Sieurs de Prado* and *Afferden*, late Secretaries to the Prince of *Parma*, are kept under very close confinement, and it's said that in few days Sentence will be given against them.

Hague, July 24. The States of *Holland* are now assembled, but we do not hear that they have any matters of great moment before them. Our Letters from *Hamburg* tell us, That the King of Denmark is expected again in *Oldenburg* about the end of this Month, or the beginning of the next, and that his Majesty will have in that Countrey, and in *Holstein*, 12 or 14 thousand Men and that the Elector of *Brandenburg* was sending Ministers to the Emperor's Court, and to Sweden. The Commissioners of our *West-India* Company have been at *Hamburg*, to Treat with those of Denmark for the adjusting the differences concerning the Ship *Cornelisz*, which was formerly taken on the Coast of *Guinea*, and having had several Conferences, are come back to make report to their Principals.

Whitehall, July 26. The Address which follows has been Presented to His Majesty, who received it very graciously:

To the Kings most Excellent Majesty.

WE Your Majesties most Loyal and Dutiful Subjects, the Mayor, Bailiffs, Aldermen, Capital Burgeses, and Inhabitants of the Town of *Cardiff*, in the County of *Glamorgan*, whose Names are hereunto Subscribed, retaining great and due apprehensions of the happiness we enjoy under Your Majesties most excellent Government; and Your Gracious Com-

nuance of it, notwithstanding the daily Provocations offered You from an unworthy Generation of men, whom no Favours can oblige, nor the greatest Concessions, or highest Pledges of Royal Faith, satisfy; we cannot but look upon our selves bound to give Your Majesty and all the World an assurance, That we do from our hearts detest and abhor all such ill Returns and Treasonable Revivings of all or any of those once-experienced Devilish Projects, which under a Mask of Religion, would destroy the Church, and out of pretence of maintaining the safety of Your Majesties Royal Person, extirpate Monarchy; and in particular of that Mystery of Iniquity and Treasonable ASSOCIATION, Published in the proceeding at the Old-Bailey against the Earl of SHAFFSHURY, and of all other Popish and Republican Plots, and Seditious Confederacies of like nature whatsoever. And we do assure Your Majesty, That we will be ready upon all occasions unanimously to add the Testimony of our Lives and Fortunes to the Truth of this our Abhorrence, in the Obedient Service of Your Sacred Majesty and Your Lawful Successors, whenever required. And we humbly beseech Your Majesty to believe, that though we have not been amongst the first in this Declaration of our Duty, yet that we will not be behind any of Your Loyal and true Subjects in the real Performance of it, nor cease to pray for the long continuance of Your Majesties happy Reign over us, and that God would daily proceed to Bless Your Majesty with a dutiful, contented, thankful People, as some returns to Him and You for the exceeding Mercy of so Gracious and acceptable a Government. Dea. July 22. The Ambassador from the King of Bantam lay the last night in this Town. He is to go on board the *Kempthorne* one of the *East-India* Companies Ships, which is to carry him home.

London, July 20. This day the Renegado, who came over as an Interpreter with the *Morocco* Ambassador, having some of his Excellency's Money in his hand, got out at the Back-door in an English Habit, and absented himself just when the Barges were ready for the Ambassadors departure, which hindered his going for that time.

The search being made for him, he was found, and carried before Judge *Raymond*, who after Examination sent him to Mr. Secretary *Fenkins*, before whom, and some of the Lords of His Majesties Privy Council, he pretended to be returned to the Christian Religion, (though the reality thereof was not believ'd by any that knew him, because he had done the like at *Tangier*, in Colonel *Norwood's* time, whereby he got his Liberty, and made escape from thence to the *Moors* again;) but he was, by their Lordships remanded to Judge *Raymond*, to proceed with him according to Law.

The 22. the Ambassador writ him a Letter, promising him pardon and safety, if he would return; which, to avoid being sent to *Newgate* he chose rather to do; and so laying aside his pretence of Christianity, with his English Habit, he fairly put

on his Moorish Cloaths and Religion again, and returned to the Ambassador, who with him in his company (though after another attempt to escape) was the next morning conducted by the Master of the Ceremonies, in the King's Barge, the Tide falling early, on Board His Majesties Yacht the *Mary*, which is to carry him to the *Wolwich* Frigate, lying ready for him in the Downs.

London, July 22. His Majesty having by His Letters Patents, Dat d the 24th of June, 1680. authorized Sir *Henry St. George* Kt. *Clarenceux* King of Arms; by himself or his Deputies, to visit his Province, and to Register the Pedegrees and Arms of all the Nobility and Gentry therein, according to ancient usage; the said *Clarenceux* hath thereupon constituted *Thomas May* Esq. *Chester-Herald*, and *Gregory King*, *Rougedragon*, Officers of Arms, his Deputies for the Counties of *Northampton*, *Leicester*, *Warwick*, *Worcester*, *Glocester*, and *City of Bristol*, who will accordingly visit the same this present Vacation, having appointed their places of Session in manner following.
