Palermo, June 25.
E have an account from the Town of Torto-rica, That on the fixth Instant about seven a Clock in the Evening, after lo great a dark ness that no object could be distinguished at the distance of four Paces, there arose a great Storm of Rain, Lightning and Thun-der, which lasted 36 hours; That about one a Clock the next morning, great Torrents of Water, caused by these Rains, fell from the neighbouring Mountains with so great Rains, fell from the neighbouring Mountains with so great Rapidity, that they carried with them Trees of an extraordinary bigness, which theew down the Walls and Houses of the Town they happened to beat against. The Waters were so violent that they overthrew the Church of St. Niebo ss, and the Archdeacon of the Town, who retired this there perished there with many other persons: There, only remained one Abby, and about 50 Houses, and those so shall need that they fell one after another. There were about 500 of the Inhabitants drowned, the rest being abroad in the Field gathering their Silk, sied to the Mountains, where they suffered very much for want of Provisions. were in so great abundance, that they made a Bank above the Water, two Miles in length, near the Mouth of the River, where before the sea was very deep. This Town is fituate in that part of Sicily called the Valley of D mona, on the side of the River Tortorica, about 25 Miles from the Tuscan Sea. The Towns of Randuzzu, Francaville, and several others, have likewise been destroyed by this great flood. It is added that Mount Etna casts out such abundance of Water, that all the Neighbouring Country is drowned Florence, Fuy 10. Stockholme, July 13. Our Fleet is now quite teady, and wants nothing but Orders to put to Sea. There is a List of the Forces of this Kingdom, according to the present Establishments, by which the King has in Sweden, Finland, and Livonia, 17729 Horie, 38326 Foot, and 12000 Scamen; and in Pomeren and Bremen 6864 Horse and Foot: and belides these, the Militia of this Kingdom, who have the Kings Pay, amount to 26304. The Marquis de Feuquieres, the French Ambassador, has taken his Icave, and will depart to fuon as his Successor, Monsieur Bazin, arrives.

Ratubonne, July 13. The Electoral Colledge ha-ting in April 1alt, upon the Memorial of Monsieus Verjus, the French Minister, declared, That in the prefent conjuncture, and circumstances of affairs, they thought it best and most advantageous for the Empire, That the Peace with the Crown of France be preserved by all the ways and means that may be conducing thereunto; The faid French Minister has ever since been labouring to obtain a like Declaration from the Colledge of Princes, and that of the Towns; and for that purpole has presented feveral Memorials, but hitherto he has not been able to succeed therein, and is therefore much difFrancfort, July 18. Count Waldeck arrived here fome days fince, and having been in conference with the Imperial Ambailadors, he parted again-the next day for Cassel. There passes nothing of moment in the Conferences here.

Cologne, July 24. Bruffels, July 28 His Excellency returned hither from Flanders on Sunday lait, very much satisfied with the Proceeding of the States of that Province, who have given 22000 Rations a day, for the next year, which amounts to a very great Sum, and is too Rations a day more than they gave the Prince of Parma, which is very extraordinary. considering the Loses that Province has lottered. His Excellency has been at Oftend and N. wport, to see in what forwardness the long that the province has lottered a great Sluyce to be made at N. wport, after the manner of that at Oscind, by means whereof all Vessels may pass from thence to Bruge, and 500 Men are daily at work upon it; they are likewise making a great Baltion to compand the River and the said sluyce, which will add very much to the strength of that place. From Liege we have advice that they have chosen their new Magisfrates, and that the Party which has all along opposed their Prince, the Elector of Cologne, is now in possession of the Government Hague, July 31. The Prince and Princes of Olange are now at Diness, near which place his Highness will take a review of 16 Regiments of Horse and Poot, which for that purpose ders on Sunday last, very much fatisfied with the Proceeding

The Inhabitants of this City being ambitious of the Honour of His Majesties Prefence, and defirous that many of the Nobility and Gentry of this Nation, who are Lovers of good Horses and Field-Sports, may meet there to attend Him, and recreate the history on their Downs; Have, pursuant to an African Quality of their Corpo-tembly, writ to a Perform Quality of their Corporacion, humbly to propole to His Majelly at Windfor, That in case He would please to intimate, That He had thoughts of honouring their City with His Presence, they would set up a Ten-Stone-Plate for feven years, to be Run for at fuch times as He fhould think He might most conveniently go thither from Windfor, and divert Himfelf on their Downs. To which His Majesty was graciously pleased to make answer, That He was so well satisfied with the Loyalty of that City, and good Affection and Duty of the Inhabitants, that He resolved to go thither as often in the feven years as His Occasions would permit, and appointed the day sevennight after Datchetferry-Plate, (which is Run for on St. Bartholomewday, the 24th of August) for the Plate to he Run for; and for the bettering of it, he the first City Ten Gailleas for this year, and a Premile of the like in every of the other fix years. And feveral Gentlemen to whom the faid City hath given their Freedom, and oth rs, have each of them promiled to subscribe Two Guineas yearly as Contributers to it. And it being believed that when the defign of this Meeting is made publick, several others will contribute, and none of the faid Freemen who with well to the Town will flick out; The Mayor and aldermen have defired, that the chief Conditions of the Articles of this, and a Fifteen-Stone-Plate to be Run for next day, may be herein inferred, that as many as with well to their Town, or are Incouragers of Sportly Meetings may hereby have notice, and come in Contributors to either or both of the aforefaid Plates.
The chief conditions are as follows. Any Man may be a Contributor to either of the Plates, that will Subscribe two Guineas to them yearly for seven years: And have the Priviledge of put-ting in one and but one Horse, Mare, or Gelding for nothing, so as it be really his own; and whoever is not a Contributor, is to pay five Guinea's, and whoever puts in either, is then to give in Writing to the Mayor of Winchester, the Colour and Mirks thereof, and the Places where they stand, and Names of the Owners a day at least before the day on which each Plate is to be run for, or not to be

The Plates are run for 3 times round the Round, Hegr, and half an hour allowed between each, the day fevennight after Bartholomew-day; and the Ly Stong-Place the day after. And if His Majesty, upon removing fooner or later from Windfor, or any other motive, thall think fitting to alter the days for the following fix years, then on fuch other times in August or September as He shall signific his Pleasure by giving notice thereof in the Gazette, a Month before the time now fixt, and at least three Weeks

before such time as He shall appoint.

The time of Starting is at four of the Clock in the Afternoon, and His Majesty hath for His own conyeniency a Power of altering it to any other hour of the day, upon giving notice thereof to the Mayor of Winelester two days before the day of their Runing, and having it then cryed in the Market-place; And for the conveniency of fuch as will contribute to either of these Plates, and that they may be brought in according to the value of what the Town giverh, and is, and will be given by several Persons of Honor and Quality; It is hereby defired, that such as will contribute to either or both of these Plates, will make known their minds in riting, to Mr. Coward the present Mayor of Winchester, Mr. Francis Child Goldsmith at Temple-Bar, London, ou the Honorable Bernard Howard of Norfolk (at M& Child's Shop) whom the Mayor and Ald rmen of Winchester have defired to take the trouble on him of providing this years Plates to be Run for, on the last of August, and first of September. And the Contributors are defired to pay in their resp chive Contributions of two Guinca's apiece to any of the three persons aforesaid on or before the Twenticth of August for this year, and by the first of August for the following years. And though no man can have the Priviledge of a Contributor to either of these Plates, for contributing under two Guineas per Ann. (and none but His Maifity gives more) yet any Man may be a Benefactor for contributing any other Sum that he shall think fitting, and may fignific his resolution, and pay his money to any of the thr e aforefaid perfons.

It was forgot to be inserted in the last Gazette, That not only the Horse that comes in first, but the second also, shall win a Plate, and the third, the Non-Contributors Stakes, both for the one and the other Plate; and that the Mayor and Aldermen of Winton have obliged themselves to set such Rates on Horse-meat, and Lougings, as that from a Fortnight before the said Plates, till a Monthaster, and at all other fuch-like meetings, no Person of what Quality foever, shall pay above fix pence a night per Horse for the best old Hay, Straw, and Stable-room, nor above eight Pence a Peck for Oats, in any Inn or Publick-house, where no man is to pay any thing for his Lodging, nor above 12 pence a night for a Masters Bed, and & pence for a Servant's, in a Private-Lodging; as may be feen more at large by the Town-Articles.
