## From Cburstap July 27. 5 , chenday July 31. 1682.

## Palermo, fune 25.

WE have an account fron the Town of Yortorica, Tpat on the fixth Inttant about feven a Clock in the Evening, after lo grear a darknefs that ne objedt could be diftinguithed at the diltance of four $\mathrm{Paces}_{\mathrm{a}}$, there arofe a great Storm of Rain, Lightning and Thunder, which laited 36 hours; That abjut one a Clock the dext morning, great Torrents of Water, caufed by theie Rains, fell from the neighbouring Mountains with fo grear Rapidiry, that they ca. ried with them Trees of an extraordinary bizaets, which thew down the Walls and Houles of the Town they happened to beat againft. The Waters were So violent that they overthrew the Church of St. Nicho as, and the Archdeacon of the Town, who retired thither pewifhed there with many other perfons : There, only remained one Abby, and about 50 Houfes, and thofe fo flatiered that they fell one atrer another There were about 600 of the Inhabitants drowned, the reft being abroad in the Field gathering their Silk, tled to the Mountains, where they fuffered very much for want of Provifions. The Goods, Trees, Stones, Sand, and other Rubbilh which the Waters carried away, were in fo great abundance, that they made a Bank above the Water, two Miles in lengrb, near the Mouth of the River, where before the sea was very deep. This Town is ituate in that part of Sicily called the Valley of $D$ mona, on the fide of the River Tortorica, about 25 Miles from the Iufcan Sea. The Towns of Kanduzz ${ }^{\mu}$, Francaville, and feveral others, have likewife seea deftroyed by this great flood: It is added that Mount Retna calts out fuch abundatce of Water, that all the Neighbouring Country is drowned

Elorencr, fuy 10. Our Lerters from Rome of the fourth Inltant tell $n$, that after having been two Months withont Rain, it began to Rain on Sunday the. 25 ch palt at night, and that an hour before day there fell a Thunderbolt in the Popes Palace of St. Perer;, which entring firft into the Apartment of Signior Mugafibi, from thence pafled into the Anticamera, where the Prelates meet, thence into the Chamber where the private Grooms lye, and afrerwards into that where the Pope gives Audience, and through a Gallery behind the faid Chamber, and thence into the Aparment of Cardinal Csba, and broke down the Chimney-piece, fo that the Cardinal was forced to rile and go into another Room, becaule of the Stink.

Stockbolme, fuly r'z. Our Fleet is now quite teady, and wants nothing but Orders to put to Sca. There is a Lilt of the Forces of this Kingdom, according to the prefent Eitablifhments, by which the King has in Sweden, Finland, and Livjnite, $177^{2} 9$ Horie, 383.26 Eoot, and $\$ 2000$ Seamen; and in Fomeres and Eremen 6864 Horfe and Foot: and befides there, the Militia of this Kingdom, who have the Kings Pay, amount to 26304 . The Marquis de Feuquieres, the French Ambalfador, has taken his Ieave, and will depart fo foon as his Succeffor, Monficur Bazin, arrives.

Ratisborne, Fuly 13. The Electoral Colledge haTing in Aprif lalt, upon the Memorial of Monfieur Verjus, the French Minifter, declared, That in the prefent conjuncture, and circumfances of affairs, they thought it beft and molt advantageous for the Empire, That the Peace with the Crown of Fratce be preferved by all the ways and means that may be conducing thercunto; The faid French Minilfer has ever fince been labouring to obtain à like Declaration from the Colledge of Princes, and that of the Towns; and for that purpole has prefenced feveral Memorials, but hitherto he has not been able to fucceed therein, and is therefire much dif. atisfied.

Francfort, Fuly 18. Count Waldeck arrived here fome days fince, and having been in conference with the Imperial Ambaliadors, he parsed again the next day for Caffel. There palfes nothing of moment in the Conferences here.

Cologne, fuly 24. Some days fince arrived here the Sieur Lente, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Denmark, and yefterday he had Audience of the Elector of Cologne: His butio fs, as we are informed, is to defire his Electoral Highne[s's confent for the fetting up a Toll at Gluckifadt, on the River Elbe, but it's believed he will hardly obtain it. To morrow or nexc day the Electorefs Dowager Palatine is expected here. The Elector of Cologne intends to go the nexr week to Bomme, to pals lome days there. The Prince of Parma conti.,ucs fill here.

Brulfils, fuly 28 His Excellency returned hither from Flanders on Sunday lalt, very much fatisfied with the Proceeding of the States of that Province, who have given 22000 Rations a day, for the nexc ycar, which amounts to a very great Sum, and is 100 Rations a day more than they gave the Jrincs of Parma, which is very extraordinary. confidering the Lofles that Province has Coffered. His Excellency bas beephat offend and N. wopnt, to fee in what forwardnefs the on wit for dations that are making there are in, and has ordered a great Sluyce to be made at $N$, woport, after the manner of that at oftind, by means whereof all Yeffels may pafs from thence to Bruge', and 500 Men are daily at work upon it; they are likewife making a great Baltion to commapd the giver and the faid sluyce, which will add very much to tre (trength of that place. From Liege we have advice that they have chofen their new Magiltrates, and that the Party which has all along oppofed their Prince, the Elechor of Crlogze, is now in pofielion of the Goverament

Hague, fuly 31. The Priace and Princels of 0, ange are now at Dienen, near which place his Highnefs will take a review of 16 Regiments of Horfe and Foot, which for that purpole are drawn together there. Before his Highnefs returns hither it's faid he will have another Interview with the Governor of the Spanill-Netherlands. There is now before the States-General a Projedt of a Treaty between the Emperor of Miorecto and this State, and the Ceveral Provinces are togive in their opinions upon it.

fide vob, And we do affure Your Majefty, That we thall never torget the Calamitien that befiel cue Koyal Martyr Your Farber, and condequently his whole Iamily and three Kingdoms, by the Malice and fpecious"Prererices of his Enemies, under colour of zeal and Keligion, laying afide Loyalty and Peace, the true houndation of all found Religion and good Government. To this we humbly Subfcribe.

The time of starting is at four of the Clock in the Afternoon, and His Maj: fly bath for His own conyeniency a Power of altering it to any other hour of the day, upon giving notice thereof to the Mayor of Wincfisfter two days before the day of their Ruming, and having it then cryed in the Market-place; And for the conyeniency of fuch as will concribute to eicher of thefe Plates, and that they may be brought in according to the value of what the Fown giveth, and is, and will be given by reveral Perions of Honor and Quality; it is herebp defired, that tuch as will conifibute to either or, both of the $f_{5}$ Plates, will make kuown their minds in riting, to Mr. Coward the pref.nt Mayor of Wincbetter, Mr. Franci Cbild Goldimith at Temple-Bar, London, or the Honorable Bernard Howard of Norfolk (at Mo Cbild's Shup) whom the Myyor and Ald rmen of Wincbester have defired to take the trouble on him of propiding this years Plates to be Bun for, on the laff of August, and filt of September. It was forgot to be inferted in the laft Gazette, That nof oniy the Horle that comes in firt, but the fecond glio, thall win a plate, and the third the Non-Contributors Stakes, both for the one and the other Plate; and that the Mayor and Alder, men of winton have obliged themeelves to fet fuch Ratcs on Horlc-mear, and Lougings, as that from a tortnight before the faid Plates, till a Month aff ter, and at all other fuch-like meetings, nq Perion of what Quality foever, thall pay above fixy pence a night fer Horle for the beft old Hay, Straw, and Stable-room, nor abovo eight Pence a Peck for Oats, in any hn or Publick-houre, where no man is to pay any thing for his Lodging, nor abjuce 12 pence a night for a Mafters Bed, and $¢$ pence for a Servant's, in a Privace-Lodging; as may by fach more at large by the Town-Articles.
