**T**HE remains of Her late Most Excellent Majesty Queen Charlotte, of blessed memory, having lain in state, privately, at Kew Palace, during the preceding day and night, were removed from thence to Windsor, on Wednesday last the 2d instant, at ten o'clock in the morning, in a hearse, adorned with ten Escocheons, and drawn by eight of her late Majesty's horses, preceded by the Knight-Marshal's Men on horseback, with black staves, and followed by seven carriages of Her late Majesty, each drawn by six horses, conveying the Lord Chamberlain, the Master of the Horse, the Treasurer and Secretary to Her late Majesty, the Ladies of the Bedchamber, and others of Her late Majesty's Establishment : The whole escorted by a Field-Officer's Guard, with a standard, consisting of one hundred and twenty men, of the 19th Lancers. At Longford (where the procession arrived at three o'clock, and halted during the space of one hour), the first escort was relieved by a similar guard of the 3d Regiment of Dragoon Guards, which escorted the Royal Body to Datchet-Bridge, where it fell into the rear, and formed the rear guard. A Field-Officer's detachment, of one hundred men, with a standard, from the Household Brigade, met the procession at Datchet-Bridge, and formed its escort to the door of the Royal Chapel of Saint George, at Windsor.

The procession halted at Frogmore to receive His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, with His Guard of Honour, and proceeded from thence, at half-past seven o'clock, to Saint George's Chapel, where it arrived at a quarter past eight, in the following order :

Upon arrival at the south porch of St. George's Chapel, the Grooms and Servants, the Trumpets and  
Drums, and the Knight-Marshal's Men filed off without the door. The Royal Body was removed from  
the Hears, and carried by ten Yeomen of the Guard, and followed by their Royal Highnesses the  
Chief Mourner and the Duke of York into the space prepared to receive them: at the entrance the  
Dean and Canons, attended by the choir, received the Royal Body; and the Procession (which had  
been previously formed under the direction of Sir George Naylor, Knt. York Herald, executing this part  
of the duty on the behalf of Garter), being flanked by a party of the Grenadier Regiment of Foot  
Guards, every fourth man bearing a flambeau, moved down the south aisle, and up the nave, into the  
choir, in the following order:

Upon entering the Choir, the Royal Body was placed on a Platform, and the Crown and Cushion laid on the Coffin.

The Chief Mourner sat on a chair at the head of the Corpse, the Supporters standing on each side.

The Princes of the Blood Royal proceeded to their respective Stalls.

The Lord Chamberlain of His Majesty took his place at the feet of the Corpse, and the Supporters of the Pall their places near the Royal Body.

During the service the Knights of the Garter present occupied their respective Stalls : The Judges, Ministers of State, Nobility, and Great Officers of the Household, were placed in the vacant and intermediate Stalls : The Ladies Attendants in the seat below the Stalls, on the north side, nearest the Altar : The Officers of the Duchy of Cornwall, the Grooms of the Bedchamber, Law Officers, &c. in the seat, below the Stalls, on the south side, nearest the Altar : The Physicians, Equerries, &c. in the front seats on either side : The Gentlemen Ushers, Pages, &c. were arranged, on each side, below the Altar.

The part of the Service before the Interment, and the Anthem being performed, the Royal Body was deposited in the Vault ; and the Office of Burial being concluded, after a short pause, Sir Isaac Heard, Knight, Garter, Principal King of Arms, proclaimed the styles of Her late Majesty, as follows :

THUS it hath pleased Almighty God to take out of this transitory life, unto His Divine Mercy, the late Most High, Most Mighty, and Most Excellent Princess CHARLOTTE, by the Grace of God, QUEEN CONSORT of The Most High, Most Mighty, and Most Excellent Monarch, GEORGE THE THIRD, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith, King of Hanover, and Duke of Brunswick and Luneburgh ; whom God bless and preserve with long life, health, and honour, and all worldly happiness.

After which His Royal Highness the Chief Mourner, their Royal Highnesses the Princes of the Blood Royal, the Great Officers, Nobility, and others, who had composed the procession, retired ; having witnessed that every part of this most mournful and afflicting ceremony had been conducted with great regularity, decorum, and solemnity.

**T**HE following Addresses, having been transmitted to Viscount Sidmouth, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by the several persons whose names are respectively subjoined to each Address, have been presented by His Lordship to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, who was pleased to receive the same very graciously:

To His Royal Highness the **PRINCE REGENT.**

*May it please your Royal Highness,*

**WE**, the Dean and Canons of His Majesty's Free Chapel of St. George, within His Castle of Windsor, beg leave to approach your Royal Highness with sentiments of sincere condolence and deep felt sympathy, on the recent loss sustained by your Royal Highness and the whole kingdom, in the death of Her late Excellent Majesty the Queen, your Royal Highness's mother. Since Her Majesty's first arrival in this country, the nation has had the uninterrupted gratification of admiring her pure and exemplary conduct, of which we who presume to address your Royal Highness, have for a series of years been eye witnesses. Still some consolation under the present heavy calamity is afforded by the reflection, that whilst Her Majesty assiduously cultivated in her own heart the many excellent qualities the loss of which we deplore, it pleased Providence to spare her to us till ripe in years as in virtues, time was allowed for the beneficial influence of her example on the hearts of others; an influence which we ardently hope may not be lost with the fountain from which it flowed, but continue to animate and direct the conduct of British females of every rank and condition in society.

This consolation your Royal Highness largely possesses; and it has been soothing to the public mind to reflect, that Her Majesty lived to reap the fruits of her parental tenderness, in an ample return of filial piety from your Royal Highness during her severe and protracted illness. Long may your Royal Highness continue to enjoy that satisfaction, which even amidst the arduous duties of your exalted station, cannot fail to result from the sense of having faithfully discharged those more private, but not less sacred obligations which attach to you as a son.

A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE, P. R.

**W**HEREAS by an Act, passed in the fifty-first year of His Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to provide for the administration of the Royal Authority, and for the care of His Majesty's Royal Person during the continuance of His Majesty's illness, and for the resumption of the exercise of the Royal Authority by His Majesty;" it was amongst other things enacted, that if Her Majesty the Queen should depart this life during the time that the care of His Majesty's Royal Person should be committed to Her Majesty, according to the provisions of the said Act, the Regent should forthwith order and direct a Proclamation, under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, to be issued and published declaring the same: and whereas by another Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to alter and amend certain of the provisions of an Act, passed in the fifty-first year of His Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to provide for the administration of the Royal Authority, and for the care of His Majesty's Royal Person during the continuance of His Majesty's illness, and for the resumption of the exercise of the Royal Authority by His Majesty;" it was amongst other things enacted, that if the case should happen in which it was enacted by the said Act, passed in the fifty-first year of His Majesty, that the Regent should forthwith order and direct such Proclamation to be issued and published as aforesaid, and the same should happen upon or after the day appointed by any Writ of Summons then issued, for calling and assembling a new Parliament, and before such new Parliament should have met and sat as a Parliament, then, and in such case, the Regent should forthwith cause such a Proclamation as aforesaid to be issued and published, declaring that such case had happened, and requiring the new Parliament either to convene and sit at Westminster immediately after such Proclamation should have been published, or upon some day to be mentioned in such Proclamation, and being within sixty days to be computed from the date of the said Proclamation; and in such case the Parliament so convening and sitting should be, and be deemed a Parliament to all intents and purposes, under the provisions of the said last mentioned Acts: and whereas the Parliament which was summoned to meet at Westminster on the fourth day of August last, hath not yet met and sat as a Parliament, but stands prorogued to the twenty-ninth day of December now next ensuing: and whereas Her Majesty the Queen departed this life on the seventeenth day of November instant, during the time that the care of His Majesty's Royal Person was committed to Her Majesty: now we do hereby by this Proclamation (ordered and directed to be issued and published, and issued and published under the Great

Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland), declare, that Her Majesty the Queen departed this life on the seventeenth day of November instant, and We do, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, publish, declare, and require, that the new Parliament shall be held, convene, and sit, at Westminster, on the fourteenth day of January now next ensuing, for the dispatch of divers urgent and important affairs, and the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses of the House of Commons, are hereby required and commanded to give their attendance accordingly on the said fourteenth day of January now next ensuing; and We do hereby further publish and declare, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, that the said Parliament shall on the twenty-ninth day of December now next ensuing, be further prorogued to the said fourteenth day of January now next ensuing; and We have, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, given Order to the Chancellor of that part of the United Kingdom called Great Britain, to prepare a Writ Patent, under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom, for proroguing the same accordingly.

In pursuance of an Act passed in the tenth year of Her late Majesty Queen Anne, and of another Act passed in the thirty-second year of His present Majesty, wherein provision is made for praying for the Royal Family in that part of Great Britain called Scotland; it is hereby Ordered in Council, that henceforth every Minister and Preacher shall in his respective Church, Congregation, or Assembly, pray in express words,

or place on the Coast of Africa, or in the West Indies, or on any part of the Continent of America (except to a port or place, or ports or places in His Majesty's territories or possessions on the Continent of North America, or in the territories of the United States of America), or ship or lade any gunpowder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, on board any ship or vessel, in order to transporting the same into any such ports or places on the Coast of Africa, or in the West Indies, or on the Continent of America (except as above excepted), without leave or permission in that behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring and suffering the respective forfeitures and penalties inflicted by an Act, passed in the twenty-ninth year of His late Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of salt-petre, and to enforce the law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of gunpowder, or any sort of arms or ammunition, and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying coastwise of salt-petre, gunpowder, or any sort of arms or ammunition;" and also by an Act, passed in the thirty-third year of His Majesty's reign, cap. 2, intituled "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the exportation of naval stores, and more effectually to prevent the exportation of salt-petre, arms, and ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council."

Act specified, either for any period His Majesty shall think proper, and to be in such case specified in such Order or Orders and Proclamation; or until any further Order of His Majesty in Council shall be issued for again carrying the said provision of the said therein-recited Act into effect and execution, and all the provisions, penalties, and forfeitures, in relation to such specified number of pilots constantly plying at sea, and clauses and regulations for enforcing the same, shall, upon the issuing of such Proclamation, remain and continue so suspended:

"A Tower and Light is situated on the highest part of the outer S. head of Port Jackson Harbour in lat. 53 deg. 51 min. 40 sec. S. and long. 151 deg. 16 min. 50 sec. E. from Greenwich. The height of the light from the base is seventy-six feet, and from thence to the level of the sea two hundred and seventy-seven feet, being a total height of three hundred and fifty-three feet. The inner S. head bears from the light house N. by W.  $\frac{3}{4}$  W. distant  $1\frac{1}{4}$  mile. The outer N. head bears from it N. by E. two miles. The inner S. head and outer N. head lay N. E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  E. and S. W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  W. of each other, distant one one-tenth mile. The light can be seen from S. by E. to N. by E. Those lines of bearing clearing the coast line  $\frac{1}{2}$  a point each way, and may be discovered from a ship's deck on a clear night eight leagues. The north end of the Sow and Pigs Reef bears from the inner S. head S. W. by W.  $\frac{1}{2}$  a mile.

"N. B. The bearings are magnetic and the distances computed in nautic miles. The var: 9 deg. E."
