The Ladies to wear black silk, fringed or plain linen or muslin, white gloves, black and white shoes, fans and tippets, white necklaces and earrings, no diamonds.

Undress—White or grey lustrings, tabbies or damasks.

The Gentlemen to wear black, full trimmed, plain or fringed linen, black swords and buckles.

Undress—Grey frocks.

The Court to change the mourning further on Sunday the 24th of January next, viz.

The Ladies to wear black silk or velvet, coloured ribbons, fans and tippets.

The Gentlemen to continue in black, to wear coloured swords and buckles.

And on Sunday the 14th of February next, the Court to go out of mourning.

THE following Addresses, having been transmitted to Viscount Sidmouth, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by the several persons whose names are respectively subjoined to each Address, have been presented by His Lordship to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, who was pleased to receive the same very graciously:

To His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Citizens of the ancient and loyal City of Hereford, with sentiments of profound regret and sorrow, beg leave to approach your Royal Highness upon the recent

loss the kingdom has sustained by the death of your beloved and estimable Mother, Queen Consort of England, and to express our sincere condolence upon the melancholy occasion; and at the same time to assure your Royal Highness of our unfeigned attachment to His Majesty's Government and the Throne of these realms; and that we cannot fail to participate in whatever affliction Providence, in its wisdom, shall think fit to pour down on any of the branches of your illustrious House.

We most fervently hope your Royal Highness may enjoy all health and prosperity, and long continue to reign over an united and happy people.

To His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, His Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Nobility, Gentry, Clergy, and Freeholders of the County of Hereford, deeply sensible of the loss which your Royal Highness, the Royal Family, and the nation at large have sustained in the death of your Royal Mother, Queen Consort to our revered Sovereign, humbly address the Throne with sentiments of sincere regret and sorrow.

We are at the same time anxious to express the high respect we entertain for the memory of our late Gracious Queen Charlotte, founded in a grateful remembrance of her meritorious conduct, good example, and long practice of many virtues amongst us.

Strongly and duly impressed with a sense of the filial and praiseworthy attentions manifested by your Royal Highness, and indeed by the royal issue in general, towards your august Mother during her severe and long protracted illness, we beg to offer our respectful and hearty condolence on the melancholy, though not unexpected, event of her decease; and to assure your Royal Highness of our continued and unshaken loyalty to the King,
