

received the Complements of the whole Court, and we are informed that Don *Antonio de Medrano*, and Don *Balthazar de Euen Mayor*, the Spanish Minister at the Hague, have had the Titles of Marquisses of *Castile* conferred upon them. The States of *Holland* have granted his Excellency a Subsidy of 22 thousand Florins, the one moiety to be paid presently, and the other within six Months.

*Brussels, Aug. 11.* The States of this Province have at last agreed to give his Excellency a Subsidy of 800 thousand Florins, which they presented to his Excellency in the usual form on Saturday last. Towards the end of this Week his Excellency intends to go for *Antwerp*, but before he goes, he will endeavour to compose the differences between the Princess Dowager of *Ligne*, and the Prince's Son. We have advice from *Hungary* that Count *Tekely*, since the expiration of the Truce, has begun Acts of Hostility, having attacked a Castle near *Caschau*, in which were 50 Imperial Soldiers, who were all killed the Word; That it was believed he would in the next place besiege *Caschau*; That the Turks were Marched from their Camp at *Buda*, towards *Kaab*, and that thereupon Count *Caprara* was gone to take care of the Island of *Schantz*.

*Hague, Aug. 7.* The States of *Holland* are going to separate for some time. From *Amsterdam* we have an account, That a certain person, an inhabitant of that City, has undertaken to take away the Bank of Sand and Mud on the *Pampus*, that renders the passage of the great Ships difficult, which will be a good Work if he can perform it. The *West-India Company* has resolved to make a Dividend of Five per Cent. The matter of the Convoys is not yet settled, by reason of the opposition which the City of *Amsterdam* makes thereunto.

*Paris, Aug. 12.* Here has been great rejoicing for three days together, for the Birth of the young Duke of *Burgundy*. The Dutchess de *Bullion* is returned to Court. Some days since arrived here an Express, sent by the Marquis de *Chasseau-reaux*, to give the King an account, That being come, with the Ships under his Command, before *Argiers*, that Government had sent off to him, to know his Intentions, and to offer a Treaty for a Peace; but that he had answered, That his Orders were to lay before the Port, and to hinder all Vessels from going in, or coming out; That he expected every day his General, the Sieur du *Quegne*, to whom they must address themselves, if they desired a Peace, and that in the mean time they would do well to keep their Ships in Port; for if they came out, he would attack them. Our last Letters from *Tunis* left the Duke of *Savoie* very much indisposed with his Ague.
