affifting thereat; and that day, and the two following, nothing was omitted that might express the Publick Joy.

Paru, Aug. 15. Some days fince was published the Kings Declaration, which was verified in Parliament the fourth Initant, and contains, among other things, That His Majelly having underflood that con rary to feveral Oiders made in his Council, most of the Officers of the Protestant Religi--on, that have difpoled of their Offices, have put Roman Catholicks. in their places which are at their Devotion, and that they get themselves called to be Affiliants at the Sentences upon Process, and fo render themselves the Masters of Affairs, his Majefty does ordain, That for the future no Officer of Indicature than call to his affiflance any perfon of the Protestant Religion, on pain of forfeiting his Office, and being Fined in Appop Livres, and that the Sentence shall be void. That-fuch Noblemen and Gentlemen of the Protestant Religion, who have absolute Right of Judicaoure within their own Effates, shall be obliged to effablish Roman Catholick Officers in the leveral Offices thereunto beloaging; and if they do not, the Lieutenants of the Royal Prefidials and Baliwicks thall appoint them; That luch perfons of the Profestant Religion as do not dispose of the places they have Title to, within the time that has been granted them, shall lose their faid Offices : And that the Roman Catholick Officers shall not directly or indirectly let. their names be made use of by fuch Protestants as have refigned their Places to them, nor shall suffer the faid Protestants, their Fathers or Children, to act with them in any capacity whatever in the faid Offices, on pain of Porteiting the fame-We have Letters from Marseilles of the fourth Inflant, which inform us, That the Sieur du Quefue Sailed the a Inflant, with the Ships and Galleys under his Command, from the life of Frementiere near Ivica, for Argiers; and that the Mafler of a Veffel arrived at Marfeilles from Cadiz, seported, That pailing on the 26th paft, within 15 Leagues of Argiers, he had heard great Shooting from Morning to Night, but could give no farther account thereof.
