THE following Address, having been transmitted to Viscount Sidmouth, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, has been presented by His Lordship to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, who was pleased to receive the same very graciously:

To His Royal Highness George Prince of Wales,
REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

The humble Address of the Provost, Fellows,
and Scholars of the College of the Holy and
Undivided Trinity of Queen Elizabeth, near
Dublin.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, His Majesty's faithful and dutiful subjects, the Provost, Fellows, and Scholars of the College of the Holy and Undivided Trinity of Queen Elizabeth, near Dublin, beg leave to approach your Royal Highness with sentiments of the most profound respect and veneration, and to entreat that your Royal Highness will condescend to accept our sincere and earnest assurances of unshaken loyalty to your illustrious House, and of zealous and unalterable attachment to that venerable Constitution in Church and State, to which the empire owes its greatness, and the subject his safety, by which our liberties have been preserved, and our Religion protected.

Devoted in our academic retirement to pursuits of which politics make no part, we have always been anxious to avoid the dissensions to which they too frequently lead; nor has this been the only cause of our reluctance to express any opinion on the great change in the Constitution of this United

Kingdom, which has been sought by our Roman Catholic fellow subjects; it has had another source in the peculiar circumstances of the relation towards them in which we are placed. Though instituted, endowed, and preserved for the purpose of defending the truth, and extending the influence of the Protestant Religion, our College has long received Roman Catholics among its Students, and we have therefore anxiously wished to avoid any interference in questions in which their interests are involved, lest we should diminish their attachment and their regard.

But while we humbly hope that your Royal Highness will condescend to approve of the motives which have thus influenced our conduct, we feel ourselves called upon solemnly to protest against the misrepresentations to which it may be liable, and to guard against the sophistry which arguing from our silence might impute to us political opinions which we do not hold.

Attached by the strongest ties to that happy form of Government established at the great triumph of civil and religious liberty, from which we date the completion of our Constitution, and zealous to perpetuate the inestimable blessing which we enjoy, in the primitive purity of our Holy Church, we beg leave with all humility to express our earnest hope that they, our best treasures, may be guarded from every danger, with anxious solicitude, and transmitted as we now possess them, and with securities unimpaired, to our latest posterity.

A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE, P. R.

WHEREAS William Earl of Errol was duly elected and returned to be one of the sixteen Peers of Scotland, to sit in the House of

Peers in the present Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and is since deceased; in order to the electing another Peer of Scotland to sit in his room, We do, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, issue forth this Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at Holyrood-House, in Edinburgh, on Thursday the eighteenth day of March next, between the hours of twelve and two in the afternoon, to nominate and choose another Peer of Scotland, to sit and vote in the House of Peers of this present Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, in the room of the said William Earl of Errol, deceased, by open election and plurality of voices of the Peers that shall then be present, and of the proxies of such as shall be absent (such proxies being Peers, and producing a mandate in writing, duly signed before witnesses, and both constituent and proxy being qualified according to law), and the Lord Clerk Register, or such two of the Principal Clerks of the Session as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his name, are hereby respectively required to attend such meeting, and to administer the oaths required by law to be taken there by the said Peers, and to take their votes; and immediately after such election made and duly examined, to certify the name of the Peer so elected, and sign and attest the same in the presence of the said Peers the electors, and return such certificate into the High Court of Chancery of Great Britain. And We strictly charge and command that this Proclamation be duly published at the Market-Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the county towns in Scotland, twenty-five days, at least, before the time hereby appointed for the meeting of the said Peers to proceed on such election.

Given at the Court at Brighton, the first day of February, one thousand eight hundred and nineteen, in the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty's reign.

GOD save the KING.

AT the Court at Carlton-House, the 31st of October 1818,

PRESENT,

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in Council.

WHEREAS the time limited by the Order of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent in Council of the thirteenth of May last, for prohibiting the exportation of gunpowder, arms, or ammunition, to the places therein specified, will expire on the thirtieth day of November next; and whereas it is expedient, that the said prohibition should be continued for some time longer; His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and

by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, doth, therefore, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no person or persons whatsoever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's service) do, at any time during the space of six months (to commence from the thirtieth of November next), presume to transport any gunpowder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, to any port or place on the Coast of Africa, or in the West Indies, or on any part of the Continent of America (except to a port or place, or ports or places in His Majesty's territories or possessions on the Continent of North America, or in the territories of the United States of America), or ship or lade any gunpowder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, on board any ship or vessel, in order to transporting the same into any such ports or places on the Coast of Africa, or in the West Indies, or on the Continent of America (except as above excepted), without leave or permission in that behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring and suffering the respective forfeitures and penalties inflicted by an Act, passed in the twenty-ninth year of His late Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of salt-petre, and to enforce the law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of gunpowder, or any sort of arms or ammunition, and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying coastwise of salt-petre, gunpowder, or any sort of arms or ammunition;" and also by an Act, passed in the thirty-third year of His Majesty's reign, cap. 2, intituled "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the exportation of naval stores, and more effectually to prevent the exportation of salt-petre, arms, and ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council:"

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

KINLOCH BEQUEST.

Whereas, William Kinloch, Esq. late of Calcutta, did, by his last will and testament, bearing date the 7th day of March 1812 (after providing for sundry legacies), bequeath the residue of his estate to be vested in the public funds; directing that the annual interest thereof, together with a sum equal to one-fourth part of the interest, should be paid annually to poor and disabled Scotchmen in distress, who may have lost their legs, arms, eyesight, or otherwise wounded in the Army or Navy, in the service of their country; and whereas, the High Court of Chancery by a Decretal Order, dated the 27th day of June 1818, have found that the Scottish Hospital of the Foundation of King Charles the Second, is the charitable institution meant and intended by the testator, as trustees for the distribution of the fund; and have directed that the intention of the said testator shall be carried into effect, under certain regulations stated in the Decree; notice is hereby given, that applications will be received addressed to the Secretary of the Kinloch Bequest, at the Scottish-Hall, London, on or before the 30th day of June next ensuing, from all poor and disabled Scotchmen in distress, who may have lost their legs, arms, eyesight, or otherwise wounded and maimed in the service of their country; and it is particularly requested that none but such as come under that description will apply.

By the aforesaid Decretal Order, the pensioners of both Greenwich and Chelsea are excluded from applications; as are also all persons having an income, from whatever source derived, exceeding 20l. per annum.

And the relief to be afforded from this fund will be granted to the most distressed objects only who shall be selected, by annuities not exceeding 8l. nor less than 4l. per annum, payable at two periods in the year, viz. one half on the 5th day of August, and one half on the 5th day of February in each year.

All applications for participation in this charity must be accompanied with a certificate of the following particulars, signed and declared to, upon personal inspection and interrogation, by the Minister and Elders or Churchwardens of the parish wherein the applicant resides, and to whom his instructions or certificates from Chelsea or Greenwich Hospitals must be exhibited.

1. The name of the applicant.
2. The place of his residence and address.

3. In what year he entered the Army or Navy.
4. In what year he was discharged.
5. In what regiment or regiments, or in what ships he served, and the time in each.
6. In what battle or battles he was wounded or disabled.
7. The nature of the wound or wounds he may have received to be particularly described.
8. The effect of these wounds, whether they obliged him to quit the service, and whether they now disable him from any active employment, or from doing any labour or work.
9. If able to work, the nature of his employment, and how much he earns by it in the year.
10. The station the applicant held in the Army or Navy at the time of his being wounded and discharged.
11. When he passed the Board at Chelsea or Greenwich, and received his instructions or certificate.
12. The reasons assigned for his being discharged.
13. The amount of pension received by him.
14. Whether he has any annual allowance from the Waterloo, Patriotic, or other fund, or any means of subsistence besides his pension.
15. Whether the applicant is a bachelor, married man, or widower.
16. If married, the name of his wife, when and where she was born, and when and where they were married.
17. If any children alive, the number, their names, and when and where born.

It is further requested that the certificate of the above particulars be accompanied with a distinct certificate, extracted from the register of the Session books of the parish where the man was born, of his birth and baptism, which certificate must be authenticated by the Minister and Elders of the said parish, or where no register has been kept the best proofs upon oath may be substituted; and it is likewise necessary that the present condition of the applicant be certified by a surgeon belonging to His Majesty's service (if such in the neighbourhood of the place where the application is made), or by a regular and full surgeon upon view and examination of the man himself, without reference to his instructions, or any other document whatever.

It is earnestly requested that clergymen and others interesting themselves in the case of any poor soldier or sailor who may answer the description given in the testator's will, and thereby entitled to put in a claim for participation in Mr. Kinloch's bounty, will attend, that all the above particulars be clearly and distinctly stated, and properly and faithfully certified.

SCHOOL OF PHYSIC IN IRELAND.

WHereas by an Act of Parliament, passed in the fortieth year of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for repealing an Act, passed in the twenty-fifth year of His present Majesty, intituled 'An Act for establishing a complete school of physic in this kingdom,' and also for repealing an Act passed in the thirty-first year of His present Majesty, intituled 'An Act to explain and amend an Act for establishing a complete school of physic in this kingdom, and also for extending and enlarging the powers of the President and Fellows of the King and Queen's College of Physicians, and establishing a complete school of physic in this kingdom;'"

It has been enacted, by the authority aforesaid, that every professorship mentioned in this Act shall become vacant at the end of every seventh year from the date of the election, provided further, that it shall and may be lawful for the said President and Fellows of the College of Physicians, if they shall judge it fit so to do, to direct, that the King's Professors in the city of Dublin, on the foundation of Sir Patrick Dun, or any of them, shall continue to hold their professorship or professorships for a further term of seven years, after the expiration of the term for which he or they was or were elected, provided always that the said President and Fellows of the College of Physicians do give three months notice, previous to the time at which the election to such professorship or professorships would otherwise have been held, in the Dublin and London Gazettes; and such their direction being duly entered in the books of said College, and said notice being duly published as aforesaid, it shall then be lawful to and for the professor or professors named in such direction, or notice, to continue to hold the professorship or professorships for a further term of seven years from the expiration of the term for which he or they was or were elected, without any further nomination or election.

And whereas the tenure of the King's Professorship of the Practice of Medicine, held by Martin Tuomy, M. D. as also of the King's Professorship of Materia Medica and Pharmacy, held by John Crampton, M. D. both on the foundation of Sir Patrick Dun, have now expired, in default of said notices or directions of continuance not having been published in the Dublin and London Gazettes, pursuant to the provision of said Act.

And whereas further it is enacted by the authority aforesaid, that previous to any election of the King's Professors, three months notice shall be given in the Dublin and London Gazettes, which notice shall be signed by the Register of the College of Dublin, and also by the Register of the said College of Physicians, and which notice shall set forth the emoluments and advantages, the time and the place of the election, and the qualifications of all persons intending to offer themselves as candidates.

Now the aforesaid President and Fellows of the College of Physicians do hereby publish, direct, and give notice, that the election for said King's Professorships of the Practice of Medicine, and of the Materia Medica and Pharmacy, both in the city

of Dublin, on the foundation of Sir Patrick Dun, and now vacant, will be held at the College Hall in Sir Patrick Dun's Hospital, on Tuesday the 8th day of June 1819, after such examination as the electors may require, which will begin at the hour of Ten o'clock A. M. of said day.

The following emoluments and advantages attend each Professorship. The Professor will receive a salary yearly of one hundred pounds sterling, to commence from the time of his election, and also may charge reasonable fees, to be paid by all such persons as attend his lectures; said fees to be paid on admission, and from time to time regulated by the President and Fellows of the College of Physicians.

The lectures of each professor are to commence on the first Monday in November and continue until the end of April, and shall be given for four days in the week at least, in the Hospital of Sir Patrick Dun.

Each Professor shall read and give clinical lectures upon the patients in said Hospitals, at least two days in each week during every session, for the space of three months, in alternate succession with the other Professors, or in such order as they shall agree upon amongst themselves, and each pupil shall pay to the Professor, whose lectures he shall attend, three guineas for each three months course of said clinical lectures.

Said several lectures by the King's Professors, and the clinical lectures shall be given in the English language, unless specially ordered by the President and Fellows of the said College of Physicians.

Such professorships as are on the foundation of Sir Patrick Dun, are open to persons of all nations professing their faith in Christ, provided they shall have taken medical degrees, or shall have obtained a licence to practise from the College of Physicians, in consequence of a testimonium under the seal of Trinity College, Dublin.

The electors are bound to the strictest impartiality by a solemn oath taken by every elector previous to each election, save only such preference as has been directed to be given by Sir Patrick Dun, deceased, to candidates related to him, on an equality of merit.

All persons intending to offer themselves should send in their names, the places of their education, the Universities in which they have taken medical degrees, and the places where they have practised, to the Registers of Trinity College, and of the King and Queen's College of Physicians, one month previous to the day appointed for the election.
