**W**E Your Majesties Loyal and Obedient Subjects, the Mayor, Bailiffs, and Burgeſſes of Your Burrough of Abingdon, in the County of Berks, out of the due acknowledgment of the great Benefits we and this whole Nation have, and ſtill do enjoy under Your Majesties moſt happy Reign, cannot but with great Aſſerity embrace every opportunity of returning Your Sacred Majesty our moſt unfeigned Thanks; and in particular for Your Vigilance in diſcovering, and Prudence in preventing the deſigns of ill-minded Men, who make it their buſineſs to diſturb and diſquiet the minds, and diſturb the affections of Your Majesties Peaceable Subjects, that so they may reduce this Kingdom into that Commonwealth-Slavery, from which, by Your Majesties happy Reſtauration, we were ſo lately delivered. And as we cannot but with aſtoniſhment take notice of the diſſenſion of ſome of Your Majesties Subjects, to be the ſecond time impoſed on by the ſame pretences, ſo do we with Abhorrence and Detestation obſerve the Malice and Miſchievous Practices of thoſe, who under any colour whatſoever, do endeavour the Subverſion of Your Majesties Government, or Alteration of the Succeſſion thereof in the Right Line; and therefore do heartily and unfeignedly promiſe to bear Faith and true Allegiance unto Your Majesty, Your Lawful Heirs and Succeſſors, and to the utmoſt hazard of all that is dear unto us, to aſſiſt and defend Your Majesty and them againſt all attempts, Combinations, and Conſpiracies, which are, or ſhall be made to the contrary, and eſpecially againſt that Damnable and Traiterous ASSOCIATION, produced at the late Proceedings againſt the Earl of Shaftsbury, beſeeching God to enable Your Majesty to overcome all the diſcouragements of theſe wicked Practices, and with conſtancy and reſolution to Aſſert and Maintain the undoubted Right of Your Crown, and the Liberties of Your People, to the Terror and Confuſion of all ſuch as have evil will to either, and Joy and Comfort of us, and all other Your Majesties good Subjects. In Teſtimony whereof, we have hereunto ſet our Common-Seal, the ſeventh day of May, in the 34th year of Your Majesties moſt happy Reign.

**W**E Your Majesties Loyal and Obedient Subjects, being fully ſenſible (as any of Your Majesties Loyal Subjects who have numerouſly but of moſt of Your Majesties Counties, Cities, and Burroughs, already Adreſſed Your Sacred Perſon upon the like occaſion) of the fatal conſequence of all Aſſociations, not grounded upon the Royal Authority, We do utterly Detest and Abhor all Leagues, Covenants, Engagements and Aſſociations whatſoever, againſt Your Majesties Sacred Perſon and Government, and particularly that

moſt Malicious, Treafonable, and Deſtructive Confederacy and Aſſociation purpoſed in a Paper found in the Earl of SHAFTSBURY'S Cloſet. And we do likewiſe declare our Abhorrence of that Publick Invitation lately made in the City of London, of great numbers of People out of City and Country, by Private Tickets, or ſome other way, under the ſpecious Pretence of a publick Feaſt or day of Thankſgiving; which we conceive did tend only to raiſe Diſtinctions and Confederacies amongſt the Subjects, againſt the Laws and Peace of the Kingdom, and doth derogate from the Right of the Crown; it being Your Majesties Prerogative alone to appoint publick days of Thankſgiving or Humiliation, as Your Pious Wiſdom ſhall think fit, according to the diſpenſation of Gods good Providence to Your Perſon and Kingdom.

We humbly crave leave once more to aſſure Your Majesty, That when in Your great Prudence You ſhall think fit to call a Parliament, we will make choice of ſuch Representatives for this Burrough, who ſhall be well affected to the preſent Government eſtabliſhed by Law, and ſhall declare, that they will conſtantly adhere to Your Majesties Perſon and Lawful ſucceſſors; and ſhall manifeſt their Abhorrence of theſe and all other Seditious Practices and Treafonable Attempts whatſoever: And we heartily pray to the great God of Heaven, That he will conſtantly preſerve Your Royal Perſon and Government from all Plot and wicked Conſpiracies whatſoever, and give you a long and happy Reign here, and an eternal Crown of Glory hereafter.
