

days since at *Aix-la-Chapelle*, and parted again the day following for the *spa*. Our Magistrates go on with Disbanding the Troops they lately raised.

Cologne, Aug. 14. The Magistrates of *Liege* have written a very respectful and submissive Letter to his Electoral Highness, who was at first very well pleased with it, and would have returned an Answer to it; but understanding afterwards that the Commons had publicly declared their dislike of what their Burgermasters had done, as well with relation to the said Letter, as the Powers and Instructions they had resolved to give the Deputies they were sending hither, his Electoral Highness changed his intention, and will not make any Answer to the said Letter till they are better agreed among themselves; and in the mean time his Electoral Highness has declared Prince *William of Furstemberg* (Bishop of *Strasburg*) Stadtholder or Governour, under his Electoral Highness, of the Country of *Liege*. From *Strasburg* they write, That the French are going to separate the Camps they have in *Alsace*, and that they will begin with that at *Landau*. And from *Vienna* we have an account, that the Rebels in *Hungary* did very vigorously attack the City of *Caschau*, but that the Governour hoped, not only to defend it, but likewise to recover the Citadel; and that the Imperial Troops which had had their Quarters in *Tirol*, were on their march towards *Augsburg*.

Hague, Aug. 22. The French Ambassador gave in a Memorial, two days since, to the States, wherein he endeavours to make good his Pretention concerning the manner of his reception at his Audience, and yesterday he had a Conference with the Deputies of foreign Affairs thereupon; but it seems the matter is not yet adjusted, for we do not hear that any time is appointed for the said Audience. In the mean time his Excellency causes great Preparations to be made of Fire-works, &c. against Tuesday next, when he will give a great Entertainment on the occasion of the Birth of the young Duke of *Burgundy*. From *Berlin* we have advice, That the Elector of *Brandenburg* is sending Chancellor *Brandt* for *Sweden*, to endeavour to persuade that King to come into the Alliance concluded between his Electoral Highness and the King of *Denmark*.

Paris, Aug. 22. The 18th and 19th Instant the Ambassadors, and other Foreign Ministers residing at this Court, had their Audiences of their Majesties, the Dauphin, the Duke of *Burgundy*, and the Duke and Dutchess of *Orleans*, to perform their Compliments upon the Birth of that young Prince. It is said that on the 15th of the next Month the King intends to go to *Nostre Dame de Chartres*, to acquit himself of his Vow upon the Birth of his Grandson; That from thence he will go to *Chambor*, and afterwards to *Fontainebleau*. Monsieur de *Louvois* is, as we are informed, preparing for a Journey to *Alsace*, and from thence it's said he will pass through the *Franche-Compe* for *Italy*. We cannot yet certainly learn what Progress the Cardinal *d'Estree* has made in his Negotiation at *Rome*: It is said he meets with great difficulties, and that on the 26th past he had an Audience of the Pope, which lasted many hours. The Duke of *Savoy*, we hear, continues very ill.

Falmouth, Aug. 10. The eighth Instant came in here the *Exeter* of *London*, *William Shaw* Master, from the *West-Indies*, and the *Providence* of *Scar-*

borough, bound with several Passengers for *Pennsylvania*.

Plimouth, Aug. 11. His Majesties Ships the *Woolwich*, the *Centurion*, and the *Lark* are still here, with the Merchant Ships under their Convoy. Some of the Fleet attempted to Sail yesterday morning, but the Wind proving contrary, they returned the same day.

Deale, Aug. 13. Yesterday about Noon passed by to the Eastward of the *Goodwin* about 50 Sail of Dutch Merchant Ships, bound for the *Sveights*; and this Afternoon about 30 of them came into the *Downs*, being forced therewith by the contrary Winds.

Whitehal, Aug. 17. Yesterday about seven a Clock in the Morning her Royal Highness, was safely delivered of a Daughter, at *St. James's*, and about Noon his Royal Highness, having received the News of it, came to Town from *Windsor*.

This Morning His Majesty came likewise to Town, to visit her Royal Highness, who, Thanks be to God, is in a very good state of Health. and after Dinner His Majesty returned again to *Windsor*.

This Afternoon the young Prince was constituted by the Lord Bishop of *London*, by the Names of *Charlotte, Mary*, his Grace the Duke of *Ormond* being Godfather, and the Countess of *Arundel*, and the Countess of *Clarendon*, being Godmothers.
