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Constantinople, June 15.

THe French have at last yielded to the demand of the Grand Vizier, for the reduction at *Scio*, and have agreed to give 160 Purfes, that is 80000 Dollars, which Monneys they take up at Interest here, and that at a very dear rate, giving 20 per Cent. On the 30th past, the Count of *Caparra*, the Imperial Minister, had his Audience of the Grand Signior: It is said that he offers a great Sum of Money to have the Peace renewed; but that the Grand Vizier, not contented therewith, demands several places in *Hungary*, &c, which makes us believe a War will ensue.

Cadix, July 27. We are now, with great impatience, expecting the arrival of the Gallions, and the more, because of a report which is abroad, That after their departure from *Cartagena*, they had met with very bad Weather, in which they had received so much damage that they were forced to return to *Cartagena*, but we hope there is no ground for it. Two Advice-Yachts will be the next Week dispatched from hence for *New Spain*, with an account that the Fleet bound thither will not Sail from hence till *February*.

Florence, Aug. 4. The Duke of *Savoy* is now at *Moncalier*, but the change of Air has not yet had the wished-for effect upon him, for his Highness continues very ill and weak. We have advice that a Turkish Galliotto Landed lately some Men near *Galipoli*, and took away 50 persons in sight of the Town; That afterwards they came within shot, and put out a Flag of Truce, pretending to Treat about the Redemption of the Captives, and not agreeing of the Price, seemed to stand out to Sea again, but the next morning Landed on the other side of the City, and took as many more. There were eight Spanish Gallies at *Naples* when this happened, and two days after the *Matiba* Gallies arrived, who went in search of the Galliot. The *Bristol* and *Saphir* Frigats Sailed yesterday from *Leithorne* for *Tangier*, intending in their way to touch at *Argiens*.

Vienna, Aug. 13. The Express which was lately sent with Orders to Count *Strasoldo*, returned hither the 11th Instant, and brought an account, That the said Count was advanced, with the Forces under his Command, as far as *St. Benedict*, near *Lewens*, and that he had made a Detachment of 500 men, who were got into the City of *Caschau*, and had very much encouraged the Garison and the Burghers to make a brave Defence; That Count *Teckley* had quitted the Fort or Cittadel of *Caschau*, having taken out of it all the Cannon that was there which he made use of against the City, and had for that purpose Planted on a Hill near it; That Count *Teckley* had sent to the several Counties, to Summon the Gentry to take Arms, and to joyn with him, and had appointed the 10th Instant for the day of their appearance. And we have advice, by other hands, That the Bassa of great

Waradik, with some Troops of *Transylvania*, has invested *Zaimar*, a very important place, in the upper *Hungary*; in the mean time the Imperial Troops march with all possible diligence towards *Hungary*, and we hope they will in a short time be in a posture to make head against the Enemy, and to defeat all their Enterprizes.

Strasburg, Aug. 18. The 13th Instant arrived here the Marquis of *Courtenvaux*, Son to the Marquis de *Louvois*, to view the new Fortifications that have been made here, and at other places in *A Saxe*. The Canal of the *Preusch* is finished, and is made Navigable from the Mountains of *Lorraine* to the Ditches of the new Cittadel here; and on Tuesday last the first Boat was seen on it; (in which were Monsieur *Faubon*, the Ingenier, and several Persons of Quality) it was followed by others, and they all passed, amidst the sounding of Trumpets, and the discharging of several Pieces of Cannon, to the very Ditches of the Cittadel.

Coigogne, Aug. 21. We are expecting here the Deputies of *Liege*, who, it's said, will bring with them ample Powers and Instructions to do whatever his Electoral Highness can reasonably require of them; and in the mean while the Sieur *Fodoci*, the Imperial Ambassador, does employ his best Offices favourably to dispose his Electoral Highness towards the said City. From *Francfort* they write, That the Imperial Ambassadors there did declare, they doubted not but the Peace between the Emperor and the Grand-Signior would be renewed for 20 years, But our Letters from *Vienna* do not speak in that Style, and give a melancholy account of the state of things in *Hungary*, *Caschau* being besieged by the *Hungarians*, and *Zaimar* invested by the *Turks*: the former had laid a design to surprize the Fortress of *Tuitz*, eight Miles from *Tranckheim*, which they were to have executed the 7th Instant, but they within having notice of it, put themselves into so good a posture, that they beat them off, with the loss of about 50 of the Assaultants. Here is arrived an Envoy from the Duke of *Fullers*, whose business is not yet known.

Francfort, Aug. 23. We can write nothing from hence but what we receive from other parts, the Conferences here being for the present wholly at a stand. Our Letters from *Vienna* give an account, That Count *Teckley*, with 14000 Hungarians, and 6000 *Turks*, did press the City of *Caschau* very close; That these and other advices from *Hungary* occasion the holding of frequent Councils of War at *Vienna*, and that the Danish and *Brandenburg* Ministers at that Court make use of this juncture of affairs to persuade the Emperor to accept of the French Proposition, made at *Francfort*, for the establishing a firm Peace between the Empire and the Crown of *France*. On the 16th Instant General *Leslie* arrived at *Philipsburg*; and had a long conference with Count *Staremberg*, the Governor of that place, which has at present a Garison of 4000 Men in it. From *Ratibonbe* they write, That the Dr. puty

puty of *Ments* had acquainted the Colledge of Princes that his Electoral Highness was content that the Resolution taken by the Deputies of the Empire, assembled here, upon the last Reply of the French Ambassadors, should be published; and this difficulty being removed, it's not doubted but the Conferences here will be reassumed.

P. S. We just now receive Letters from *Vienna*, which give an account, That Count *Teckley* had quitted the Siege of the City of *Caschau*, upon the news he had that General *Strafolds*, having received a Succour of 5000 Men, was marching to the relief of it, of which we must expect a confirmation.

Copenhagen, Aug. 24. The ninth Instant the King of *Denmark* parted from hence for *Goldingen*, to be present at a Review of his Troops in those parts, which was appointed to be held the 14th. His Majesty is now on his return hither, and the Troops are ordered into their several Quarters. The *Sieur Brandt* is in few days expected here, in his way to *Sweden*, whither he is sent by the Elector of *Brandenburg*, to endeavour to persuade that Crown to enter into the Alliance between this Crown and his Electoral Highness, and to approve of the Propositions made, some Months since, by the French Ambassadors at *Frankfort*; but if we may believe the advices we receive from *Stockholm*, he is not like to succeed in his Negotiation, all our Letters assuring us that the King of *Sweden* is resolved to remain firm in the Interests of the Emperor and the Empire, and to pursue the same measures which they do.

Hamburg, Aug. 24. The King of *Denmark* having taken a Review of his Forces in these parts, has ordered them again into their Quarters, and is himself returning to *Copenhagen*, which is a very welcome piece of News to us here, who cannot but be alarmed at every motion of the Danish Troops this way. From *Sweden* they write; That the *Sieur Bazin*, the French Ambassador, had not yet had his publick Audience of the King, because of some dispute about the ceremonial part of it.

Brussels, Aug. 25. Yesterday his Excellency the Marquis de *Grana* parted from hence for *Mons*, from whence he intends to go for *Aeth*, and having visited those places, to return hither. The *Sieur Hulst*, and the *Sieur Eckart*, appointed by the States-General, and the Prince of *Orange*, to adjust some matters with his Excellency, have frequent Conferences with the Persons his Excellency has appointed to Treat with them. We begin to have great hopes that the Confiscations, which the Estates of the Spanish Subjects in the French Conquests now lie under, will be taken off, and the Baron *Delval*, who has negotiated this matter, is returned to *Paris* to finish it. The City of *Liege* have resolved to make all becoming submission to their Prince the Elector of *Cologne*, to whom they are sending a Deputation for that purpose, so that it's hoped a happy end will be put to the differences between his Electoral Highness and that City, which have been the occasion of so much disturbance and disorder at *Liege*.

Hague, Aug. 25. The States-General, as we are informed, have answered the Count de *Avaux*, upon his late Memorial concerning his Reception at his Audience, That the things he desires are wholly new,

and never practised, and that therefore they cannot comply with them, so that his Excellencies intended Audience is quite put off. The States of *Holland* are separated for 14 days, having first adjusted the matter of the Convoys, and made a Regulation therein, which is to take place for a year, and this the City of *Rotterdam* was with much difficulty brought to agree to.

Plimouth, Aug. 15. Yesterday morning the *Morocco* Ambassador came ashore; at his Landing he was received by the Deputy-Governor, and all the Officers of this Garrison, except those that were upon Duty, who conducted him to the Cittadel, where the whole Garrison was in Arms; and the Officers in their several Commands saluted his Excellency as he passed: He walked round the Line, saw the Store-house, the Artillery, and Arms, and our Governor the Earl of *Bath's* House; after which his Excellency, without going into the Town, returned on Board, having both at his coming and going, been saluted with a discharge of 21 Guns from the Cittadel. This Morning His Majesties Ships the *Woodwick*, (on Board of which is his Excellency) the *Centurion*, and the *Pearl*, sailed with the Merchant Ships under their Convoy.
