

here of the Designs of the King of Denmark, are quite removed by that Kings return to Copenhagen, after having separated the Forces he had drawn together at Coldingen, and caused them to retire to their several Quarters. From Stockholm they write, that the imperial Minister, the Count d'Alheim was very well received there; That he had often, and long Conferences with the Swedish Ministers, and that it was not doubted but he would engage the King of Sweden in closer measures with the Emperor, than was yet between them. The Letters add, That the King summoning the States of the Kingdom to meet in October next, had at first occasioned much Discourse, and an Opinion in some, that a Foreign War would be proposed to them; but since People have changed that belief, and all now conclude, they are called together merely to confirm the Decrees of the High Commissioners, which have laid very great Fines upon many of the Nobility and others, who were in publick Employments, during the Kings Minority.

*Brussels, Sept. 2* The next Week the Marquis de Grana intends for Flanders, to change the Magistrates at Bruges, and from thence his Excellency will go and visit Ostend and Newport, where several new Fortifications are making by his Excellency's Order. While his Excellency is in Flanders, our *Maisire de Camp* General will go for Luxembourg, to see in what posture things are there, and in his return he will visit Limburg and Guelderland. Positive Orders are come from Spain, requiring all Colonels and *Maisires de Camp* to obey the Governors of the places where they are in Garrison, though they are not Generals of Battalia, and his Excellency is very strict in this point, and hath made some severe examples of such who have not yielded obedience to their Orders. The Scotch Regiment of *Coups Grachal* is gone from Malines to Ostend in their head. Don Juan de Prado, late Secretary to the Prince of Parma, is removed from *Vilvord* to *Bort-Montere*; the Commissioners, appointed by his Excellency to examine the Charge against him, continue in the mean time to meet very frequently, and will now in a short time have finished his Process. The last Letters from Liege gave an account, that those Magistrats were unwilling to send their Deputies to Cologne, unless they have first an assurance from his Electoral Highness that they shall be favourably received; and on the other hand his Electoral Highness declares he will not see them, except they are fully empowered to conclude upon such points as he shall propose to them.

*Paris, Septemb. 5.* The 28th past, the Earl of Feverham, and Mr. Grabam, sent by His Majesty of Great Britain, and his Royal Highness, to Compliment our King upon the Birth of the Duke of Burgundy, were Conducted by the *Sieur de Bonneuil*, Introducer of Ambassadors, with the usual Ceremonies, for their Audiences of the King, the Queen, the Dauphin, and the Duke and Dutchess of Orleans, &c. And the 29th the Dauphiness quitted her Child-bed, and heard Mass, which was celebrated by the Bishop of Maux, her chief Almoner; since the account which we had from the *Sieur du Quefne*, of the Action at *Sarcelle*, there are other Letters from him, which say, That the whole Fleet was before *Argiers*, and that all things were preparing in order to their Attacking the place with their Cannon and Bombs, which they would begin to do

on the first Instant; so that we are hourly expecting to hear what they have done. Monsieur de Louvois will part from hence in few days for *Alsace*, and from thence it's believed he will go for *Italy*; and the rather, for that there begins to be some discourse at Court, as if the King intended a Journey to *Lyon*. It was said, on Saturday last, that a Courier was arrived from the Court of *Savoy*, who brought a very ill account of the state of that Duke's health, and thereupon a report has been raised, that he is Dead; but not having received any farther News since, we look upon that report as false and groundless. Monsieur de Montefpan is to Marry the next Week with Madamoiselle de *Navailles*, and upon this Marriage, the King gives him the Honour and Title of Duke de la *Vallelle*. We have not as yet had any certain account how Matters stand between this Court and that of *Rome*; many People had persuaded themselves, that upon the Dissolution of the Assembly of the Clergy, things would easily have been disposed to an Accommodation, but it seems otherwise: For we are told by the last Letters from *Rome*, that the Cardinal d'Esiree does not advance in his Negotiation as it was wished, and expected he would.

*Falmouth, Aug. 24.* The 22d Instant, arrived here the *Friends Adventure*, from *Tangier*, the *Hope-wel* from *New-York*; and the *Dispatch* bound from *London* for *Lisbon*, having about 60 Leagues to the Westward of this place, sprang a great Leak, so that with much difficulty she got into this Harbour, where she will be forced to unlade most of her Goods, in order to have the Leak stop.

*Deal, Aug. 28.* Yesterday arrived in the Downs Sir John Berry, in His Majesties Ship the *Henrietta*; and this Morning the *Ann*, and the *George*, from the *East Indies*; they will sail again the next Tide for the River.

*Deal, Aug. 29.* This Morning arrived in the Downs, another of the *East India* Companies Ships, called the *Cesar*, and the next Tide she sailed for the River.

*Windsor, Aug. 27.* An humble and Loyal Address has been presented to His Majesty from the Sheriff, Justices, of the Peace, Gentlemen, and Grand Jury of the County of *Amrum* in *Ireland*; which His Majesty received very graciously.
