WHereas by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to enable His Majesty to direct the distribution of any reward awarded by the Commissioners of the Customs or Excise to the Officers of the Army, Navy, or Marines, for apprehending smugglers, in such manner as His Majesty shall be pleased to appoint," reciting, that by the laws now in force for the prevention of smuggling, it is lawful for the Commissioners of Customs or Excise in England, Scotland, and Ireland respectively, and they are thereby required, in certain cases, to award, to every Officer or other person arresting any person for breach of those laws, so that he shall be convicted or committed to prison on account thereof, any sum not exceeding twenty-pounds for each man so convicted or committed to prison; and that it is expedient that His Majesty should be empowered, in certain cases, to direct the distribution of such reward, by His Order or Orders in Council, or by His Royal Proclamation in that behalf, in such manner as He shall be pleased thereby to appoint; and, therefore, enacting that in all cases wherein the Commissioners of the Customs or Excise of England, Scotland, and Ireland respectively, shall award any sum not exceeding twenty pounds as aforesaid to any Officer or Officers, non-commissioned Officers, petty Officers, seamen or privates of His Majesty's Army, Navy, or Marines, or acting under the Orders of the Lord High Admiral, or of the Commissioners for executing the office of the Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, for any person so arrested, convicted, or committed to prison as aforesaid, the same shall be divided and distributed in such proportions, and according to such rules, regulations, and Orders as His Majesty shall, by His Order or Orders in Council, or by His Royal Proclamation in that behalf, be pleased to direct and appoint.

In pursuance of the powers so vested in His Majesty, His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, is pleased to Order, and it is hereby Ordered, that the bounty money, awarded for the arrest of any person or persons, arrested, convicted, and committed to prison, according to the provisions of the laws above recited, by any Officer or Officers, non-commissioned Officers, petty Officers, seamen or privates of His Majesty's Army, Navy, or Marines, or acting under the Orders of the Lord High Admiral, or of the Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, shall be divided and distributed amongst such Officers, non-commissioned Officers, petty Officers, seamen or privates of His Majesty's Army, Navy, or Marines, or acting under the Orders of the Lord High Admiral, or of the Commissioners for executing the office of the Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland as aforesaid, according to the rules and regulations directed and provided by His Majesty's Order in Council of the fourteenth of October one thousand eight hundred and sixteen, for the distribution of the shares of any such seizures, as are or shall, by virtue of any Acts relating to the trade and revenues of His Majesty's dominions, be payable to and amongst the Commanders, Officers and crews of any of His Majesty's ships or vessels of war.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to cause His Royal Highness's pleasure, hereby signified, to be duly complied with. *Jus. Butler.*

And it is further ordered, that every such British vessel, arriving as aforesaid, shall be permitted to export to any such foreign country in amity with His Majesty, a cargo consisting of any articles of the growth, produce, or manufacture of the Island of Mauritius, or its dependencies, or of any other articles which shall have been legally imported

there, on payment of such duties as may be payable thereon:

And it is hereby further ordered, that vessels belonging to the subjects of any foreign state in amity with His Majesty, which foreign state shall allow British vessels to carry on trade as aforesaid between the ports of such state and the Island of Mauritius, on the same terms as in vessels of such foreign state, shall be permitted in like manner to import into the ports of the Island of Mauritius, or its dependencies, from any port of the country to which such vessel shall belong, any articles of the growth, production, or manufacture of such country (excepting all articles composed of cotton, iron, steel, or wool of foreign manufacture), and to dispose of the same in the ports of the said Island and its dependencies, on payment of the same duties as shall be payable on the like articles when imported from such foreign port in British vessels; and that every such foreign vessel shall be permitted to export a cargo consisting of any articles of the growth, produce, or manufacture of the Island of Mauritius, or its dependencies, or of any other articles which shall have been legally imported there, on payment of the same duties as shall be payable on similar articles when exported to such foreign ports in British vessels:

It is, however, hereby further ordered and declared, that no foreign vessel, allowed by the terms of this Order to export a cargo from the Island of Mauritius, or its dependencies, shall be permitted to export such cargo to any of His Majesty's possessions, or to any other place than a port or place belonging to the state or power to which the vessel itself shall belong:

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

from the thirtieth of this instant May), presume to transport any gunpowder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, to any port or place on the Coast of Africa, or in the West Indies, or on any part of the Continent of America (except to a port or place, or ports or places in His Majesty's territories or possessions on the Continent of North America, or in the territories of the United States of America), or ship or lade any gunpowder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, on board any ship or vessel, in order to transporting the same into any such ports or places on the Coast of Africa, or in the West Indies, or on the Continent of America (except as above excepted), without leave or permission in that behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring and suffering the respective forfeitures and penalties inflicted by an Act, passed in the twenty-ninth year of His late Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of salt-petre, and to enforce the law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of gunpowder, or any sort of arms or ammunition, and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying coastwise of salt-petre, gunpowder, or any sort of arms or ammunition;" and also by an Act, passed in the thirty-third year of His Majesty's reign, cap. 2, intituled "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the exportation of naval stores, and more effectually to prevent the exportation of salt-petre, arms, and ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council."

THE following Address, having been transmitted to Viscount Sidmouth, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, has been presented by His Lordship to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, who was pleased to receive the same very graciously:

To His Royal Highness George Prince of Wales, REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, &c. &c. &c.

The humble and respectful Address of the Ministers and Elders of the Presbyterian Synod of Ireland, distinguished by the name Seceders, assembled in the City of Londonderry, July 6th 1819.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, the Presbyterian Ministers and Elders, distinguished by the name Seceders, embrace with much pleasure the occasion offered us by our annual meeting, of laying before the Throne renewed assurances of our inviolable attachment to His Majesty's Person, Family, and Government, and the sincere expressions of our unfeigned gratitude for the many blessings with which we, as a body, have been favoured.

The much lamented and long protracted indisposition of our venerable and beloved Monarch continues to awaken our liveliest sympathies. That the Father of the people, whose uniform care was to promote, by every wise means, their improvement, happiness, and piety, should share in their keenest regrets when visited with the kind, though deeply mysterious infliction of His Heavenly Father, was only what might be expected. The anguish which Seceders, in common with others have felt, though heart-rending, has not been diminished by the continuance of the stroke, while they cherish the fond anticipation, and offer their most fervent prayers that the Father of Mercies and God of all Consolation may continue to support him, and finally to raise him to a kingdom that cannot be moved, and a crown of glory that shall not fade away.

We rejoice that our country, with the rest of Europe, delivered from the horrors of war, continues to enjoy the blessings of repose. We cannot but attribute this favourable change, under God, to the wise and enlightened counsels that seem to influence most of the European Courts; and we

beg leave to assure your Royal Highness that the distinguished part which the British Cabinet continues to take in maintaining the general tranquility, a part suitable to the high rank our country holds among the nations that surround her, calls forth our liveliest gratitude, and affords to our hearts a joy, not inferior to that with which we beheld her, when forced to assert her rights and struggle for her existence; repel the attacks of the man of blood, and stand forth the arbitress of nations and the mistress of the world.

That the Ruler of a free and enlightened people, who have been taught by Christianity to love the family of mankind as brethren without regard to colour, country, or clime, should be the enemy of cruelty and oppression in every form, does not surprise us; that the long oppressed, much injured, and deeply degraded African should continue to interest the benevolence of your Royal Highness fills us with gratitude and joy; while that joy is diminished by the mournful reflection, that the meritorious efforts to abolish the infamous traffic in human flesh should, for the present, be in a great degree neutralised; yet we firmly believe and confidently hope that these efforts will never be relaxed, till every chain is broken and every African free.

To contemplate the triumphs of the Gospel in heathen lands, and the unparalleled extent to which the Holy Scriptures are circulated, gladdens our hearts as men and Christians; believing that true religion and real happiness are inseparable, and advance with simultaneous movement; and we beg to express our warmest thanks to your Royal Highness and the servants of the Crown for the Christian anxiety that has ever been manifested to facilitate the diffusion of the Scriptures and the preaching of the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ.

It pleases the God of Providence for the wisest and most merciful ends, not to bestow unmingled prosperity on individuals or on nations, we contemplate with heartfelt regret, the pressure of poverty and famine on a large portion of the manufacturing poor; but here also the parental tenderness of the administration is displayed, and we trust an abundant season with the beneficent aids of the Government, will greatly diminish, if not wholly remove these distresses, under which they labour.

May the God of Heaven long spare your Royal Highness to bless the people of these lands by a wise administration of justice tempered with mercy; and may the exalted portion of your Royal Highness be the choicest of his favours on earth, and at length the joys and uninterrupted glories of His Heavenly kingdom.
