AT the Court at *Carlton-House*, the 17th of September 1819.

PRESENT,

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in Council.

WHereas by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to enable His Majesty to direct the distribution of any reward awarded by the Commissioners of the Customs or Excise to the Officers of the Army, Navy, or Marines, for apprehending smugglers, in such manner as His Majesty shall be pleased to appoint," reciting, that by the laws now in force for the prevention of smuggling, it is lawful for the Commissioners of Customs or Excise in England, Scotland, and Ireland respectively, and they are thereby required, in certain cases, to award, to every Officer or other person arresting any person for breach of those laws, so that he shall be convicted or committed to prison on account thereof, any sum not exceeding twenty-pounds for each man so convicted or committed to prison; and that it is expedient that His Majesty should be empowered, in certain cases, to direct the distribution of such reward, by His Order or Orders in Council, or by His Royal Proclamation in that behalf, in such manner as He shall be pleased thereby to appoint; and, therefore, enacting that in all cases wherein the Commissioners of the Customs or Excise of England, Scotland, and Ireland respectively, shall award any sum not exceeding twenty pounds as aforesaid to any Officer or Officers, non-commissioned Officers, petty Officers, seamen or privates of His Majesty's Army, Navy, or Marines, or acting under the Orders of the Lord High Admiral, or of the Commissioners for executing the office of the Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, for any person so arrested, convicted, or committed to prison as aforesaid, the same shall be divided and distributed in such proportions, and according to such rules, regulations, and Orders as His Majesty shall, by His Order or Orders in Council, or by His Royal Proclamation in that behalf, be pleased to direct and appoint.

In pursuance of the powers so vested in His Majesty, His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, is pleased to Order, and it is hereby Ordered, that the bounty money, awarded for the arrest of any person or persons, arrested, convicted, and committed to prison, according to the provisions of the laws above recited, by any Officer or Officers, non-commissioned Officers, petty Officers, seamen or privates of His Majesty's Army, Navy, or Marines, or acting under the Orders of the Lord High Admiral, or of the Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, shall be divided and distributed amongst such Officers, non-commissioned Officers, petty Officers, seamen or privates of His Majesty's Army, Navy, or Marines, or acting under the Orders of the Lord High Admiral, or of the Commissioners for executing the office of the Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland as aforesaid, according to the rules and regulations directed and provided by His Majesty's Order in Council of the fourteenth of October one thousand eight hundred and sixteen, for the distribution of the shares of any such seizures, as are or shall, by virtue of any Acts relating to the trade and revenues of His Majesty's dominions, be payable to and amongst the Commanders, Officers and crews of any of His Majesty's ships or vessels of war.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to cause His Royal Highness's pleasure, hereby signified, to be duly complied with. *Jas. Buller.*

IT is this day ordered by His Royal Highness the Prince Regent in Council, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, that the Pay-

THE following Addresses, having been transmitted to Viscount Sidmouth, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by the Gentlemen whose names are subjoined to each Address, have been presented by His Lordship to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, who was pleased to receive the same very graciously:

To His Royal Highness George Prince of Wales, REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, Burgesses, and Commonalty of the Borough of Great Yarmouth in the County of Norfolk, in Common Council assembled.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, His Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, Burgesses, and Commonalty of the Borough of Great Yarmouth in the County of Norfolk, in Common Council assembled, humbly beg leave to approach your Royal Highness, and as a duty we owe to ourselves and the country at this momentous crisis, to express our detestation of the wicked and atrocious attempts of seditious and disaffected subjects in various (though from us remote) parts of His Majesty's dominions, now openly and avowedly meditating the subversion of our Laws and Government, and the annihilation of one of all distinctions of rank and the sacred rights of property.

Convinced as we are of the mischievous and criminal designs, and machinations of those who, under the specious pretext of reform and liberty, are industriously circulating blasphemous and seditious publications, with the view of poisoning the minds of the unwary, and of detaching them from their duty to God and their allegiance to their Sovereign, we feel it incumbent upon us, to repeat to your Royal Highness, the solemn assurance of our fidelity and loyalty to the King, our firm adherence to the Constitution, and our determination to enforce to the utmost of our power, the due execution of the laws against all who, by their writings or otherwise, shall endanger the public tranquillity by their endeavours to excite the ignorant and the poor to acts of sedition and violence.

To His Royal Highness George Prince of Wales, REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, the inhabitants of the Hundreds of Blackheath and Little and Lessness, in the county of Kent, humbly beg leave to approach your Royal

Highness with sentiments of most loyal attachment to the Person and Government of our beloved Sovereign; and grateful acknowledgment of the continued maintenance and protection of our religious and civil rights and liberties, through the whole course of his patriotic and benignant reign, and the no less patriotic and salutary Regency of your Royal Highness.

Appreciating as Britons the Constitutional right of the subjects of this realm to meet in a peaceable manner for the orderly discussion of their grievances and petitioning for redress; we view with indignation and abhorrence the glaring abuses of those disaffected persons who, of late, under the pretext of exercising this invaluable privilege, have convened meetings by inflammatory placards and advertisements, where they have marched under the banners of sedition, and addressed their followers in language manifestly intended to produce tumult and insurrection.

By means such as these, by other more private and insidious measures, and under the specious affectation of reform, doctrines have been propagated amongst the ignorant and unwary, directly calculated to confound the distinctions of civil life, and destroy the sacred institutions of our ancestors, through the instrumentality of treason and rebellion, for which, as it appears, large parties of the deluded populace have actually been trained by military drillings in bye places.

Fully aware of the revolutionary tendency of such proceedings, and sensible of the manifold blessings derived to us, through Divine Providence, from the excellent Constitution under which we live, we do resolve, that we will severally and collectively use our most strenuous endeavours to maintain it inviolate, by supporting a due execution of the laws against all those who may in any respect attempt its subversion; and by opposing ourselves, on all occasions and in every lawful way, to the principles and practices of the seditious, and the acts and machinations of all such persons as shall in any manner whatever strive to disturb the public peace, or endanger the safety of His Majesty's Government.

River Use Navigation.
