A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE, P. R.

WHEREAS the Parliament stands prorogued to Tuesday the second day of November next, We, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, that the said Parliament shall be further prorogued on the said second day of November to Tuesday the twenty-third day of said month; and We have given order to the Lord High Chancellor of that part of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland called Great Britain, to prepare a Commission for proroguing the same accordingly. And We do further hereby, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice aforesaid, publish and declare, that the said Parliament shall, on the twenty-third day of November next, be held and sit for the dispatch of divers urgent and important affairs: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required and commanded to give their attendance accordingly, at Westminster, on the said twenty-third day of November next.

Given at the Court at Carlton-House, the eleventh day of October one thousand eight hundred and nineteen, in the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty's reign.

We profess ourselves to be untainted with the prevailing rage for innovation; and we will, to the utmost of our power, disown every attempt to lessen the respect due to our holy religion, and to the institutions and government of the country, and use every exertion for the maintenance of public order and tranquillity.—Dated the 26th day of October in the year of our Lord 1819.

To His Royal Highness George Prince of Wales,
REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great
Britain and Ireland.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, His Majesty's faithful subjects, the Provost, Magistrates, and Town Council of the Burgh of Haddington, approach the throne with the renewed assurance of our duty and loyalty.

We deplore the distresses which produced by causes uncontrollable by human wisdom, have

afflicted so considerable a portion of our fellow-subjects.

But we lament, far more deeply, that among a people, hitherto distinguished by their regard for the duties of civil society, of morality, and of religion, there should be found men capable of the enormous wickedness of arraying our suffering fellow-citizens against the venerable institutions under which Britain has flourished for ages; of conspiring, under the specious pretext of reform, to plunge this happy country in anarchy and ruin, and even of deliberately endeavouring the subversion of our holy religion.

The distresses of the people, we hope and trust, will speedily pass away, and be forgotten; but the lapse of ages will hardly efface the stain which the crimes of these guilty men have affixed on our national character.

We feel an unshaken reliance on the wisdom and the firmness of your Royal Highness that the powers entrusted to you by the Constitution will be employed effectually in checking the spirit of disaffection, which has been so extensively manifested.

And we trust also, that the wisdom of Parliament will be successfully employed in devising the necessary measures for relieving the distresses, and allaying the distractions of the nation.

But, above all, we have the most assured confidence that the mass of the British people is untainted by the poison of disloyalty and of infidelity; and that, at this season of peril and alarm, all who know and value the privileges of Britons and of Christians will, with one heart and hand, stand forward to defend them.

While we rejoice that public opinion can make itself heard for good as well as for evil, we trust that, ere long, when the frantic clamours of faction are drowned in the general voice of patriotism and of loyalty, the efforts of the disaffected will appear as contemptible and impotent, as they are atrociously wicked.

That the Government and Legislature may be directed, by a wise Providence, to those measures which may best secure the peace and prosperity of our country, and that your Royal Highness may long rule in the hearts of a faithful and loyal people, is our earnest prayer.

To His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT.

The humble Address of the University of Glasgow.

WE, His Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Chancellor, Vice-Chancellor, Rector, Principal, and Professors of the University of Glasgow, beg permission at the present moment of turbulence and alarm, to approach your Royal Highness with assurances of our profound respect for your Royal Person, and of our attachment to that admirable Constitution in Church and State, which you have been called upon by Providence to administer.

We have seen with deep regret, the distress in which some orders of the people are involved, by one of those fluctuations of trade which must occasionally occur in a commercial country; and we hope your Royal Highness will do us the justice to believe, that, in conjunction with others of His Majesty's subjects, we shall spare no exertion which humanity prompts and prudence recommends, to relieve the innocent and unfortunate part of the community. We have also seen with astonishment and abhorrence, the cruel and insidious attempts which are indefatigably making to aggravate the calamity of the sufferers, by taking advantage of their distress to irritate their feelings into a malignant and menacing discontent, and to rob them of the best consolations in adversity, by misleading them into a hatred of that faith, on which their eternal hopes and of those salutary laws on which their temporal comforts essentially depend. While we rejoice to think that few above the lowest rank are so destitute of understanding or benevolence, as to countenance this conspiracy against human happiness, we cannot shut our eyes to the facility with which a large proportion of the ignorant and uninstructed suffer themselves to be seduced by doctrines which ought to be impotent from their absurdity, and by guides whose meanness, both of character and talent, betrays the lamentable weakness of their followers; and this fact convinces us, that to protect these infatuated men from the ruinous consequences of their own folly, by a strict but constitutional controul, is the most important benefit which they can at present receive. We have no doubt that this controul will be applied by the Legislature, with so firm and temperate a hand, that the measures adopted will receive the support of all who have ability to discern and virtue to promote the real interests of the country, and consequently of every class of its inhabitants. It shall be our care to co-operate with the great body of our loyal and intelligent countrymen, by watching over the moral and religious principles of the youth committed to our charge, and by training them in those habits of just reasoning, which will shew them that obedience to equitable laws is indispensable for securing the portion of liberty compatible with human imperfection; and that acquiescence in the will of Providence, which assigns to men a diversity of stations, proportioned to the virtuous exertions of themselves or their ancestors, is the most necessary constituent of national and individual happiness.

That Almighty God may minister his divine consolations to the mind of our Most Gracious Sovereign the King; that he may bless your Royal Highness, and direct and prosper your Councils in the administration of the Government of these realms; and that our invaluable Constitution may be handed down inviolate to late posterity, is our earnest prayer.

To His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT.

WE, His Majesty's most loyal and dutiful subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Provincial Synod of Merse and Tiviotdale, convened at Kelso this 26th day of October 1819, beg leave to approach your Royal Highness, and to express our most sincere sentiments of unaltered and undiminished regard for our most excellent Constitution in Church and State; and we at the same time declare our cordial attachment to the illustrious House of Hanover, and our unshaken loyalty and warmest affection to the Person of our most gracious Sovereign the King, whose long and continued affliction we sincerely deplore, and earnestly pray God to remove or alleviate.

It is with strong feelings of regret, we have witnessed for some time past that spirit which has gone abroad in certain districts both of Scotland and England, of insubordination and sedition, of deep-rooted disaffection and determined hostility to the Government of the country; and we are the more convinced of the dangerous and destructive tendency of this disposition to turbulence and tumult, from the circumstance of its being closely combined with principles of infidelity, impiety, and irreligion; and from its being in several instances accompanied with an avowed disregard and insolent contempt for the institutions, the doctrines, and duties enjoined by our holy religion.

Men who have not the fear of God before their eyes, unprincipled in their morals, and profigate in their practice, have attempted, and have been too successful in the attempt, to abuse the ears, to poison the minds, and to inflame the passions of an unthinking and ignorant multitude. Numerous assemblies have frequently been collected together for the pretended purpose of petitioning for annual parliaments and universal suffrage, but with an evident design and direct tendency to destroy the authority of law, to dissolve the bonds of society, and to involve the nation in anarchy and ruin. In the temper and conduct of their assemblies, we recognise with abhorrence several of the worst features of the worst times of the French revolution.

To check and suppress this contagious delusion; to prevent the dangers which, if neglected, we have just reason to dread; to preserve the internal peace and good order; and to prolong the prosperity of the country, we rely, under Providence, on the wisdom, justice, and vigour of your Royal Highness's Counsels. To support and enforce these Counsels, and to strengthen the hands of the Civil Magistrate, we consider to be the best interest, as well as the bounden duty of every intelligent and well-disposed and right-hearted man throughout the kingdom.

We have the high and heartfelt satisfaction to inform your Royal Highness, that within the bounds of our Synod, comprehending the counties of Berwick, Roxburgh, and Selkirk, there has not appeared a single spark of that fire which rages with such violence, and presents such a threatening aspect in some of the manufacturing districts of the country. That this flame shall never be kindled among us, we trust in the Grace of God, and in the religious and moral habits of our people. To improve and perpetuate these habits, as far as our

influence may extend, shall be our constant study, our zealous, active, and unwearied endeavour.

That the Almighty, in his abundant mercy, may impart suitable consolation and relief to our much-revered but afflicted Monarch; that he may continue to prosper the Administration of your Royal Highness, and bestow on you every earthly and every heavenly blessing, is our most fervent prayer.

To His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, and Common Council of the City of Exeter, in Chamber assembled, feel it our indispensable duty in this eventful crisis of public affairs, to make a solemn declaration of our unfeigned devotion and attachment to your Royal Highness's Person and Government.

We have observed with considerable alarm the industrious dissemination of the most wicked and seditious publications tending to inflame the minds of the lower classes of society, and to seduce them from their allegiance to their Sovereign, and their dependance on the laws of their country.

Whilst we feelingly deplore the distress occasioned in some districts by what we trust will prove only a temporary stagnation of commerce, we cannot but consider the tumultuous meetings lately held, though assembled under pretence of affording relief to the sufferers, were in most instances convened for the sole purpose of enabling the leaders of the disaffected to circulate more extensively doctrines subversive of every principal of the British Constitution.

We are moreover at a loss sufficiently to express our horror and detestation at those profane and blasphemous productions in which bold and impious men, the more easily to effect their nefarious intentions, have not scrupled to attempt to traduce and vilify Christianity itself. Although we are persuaded that Religion is too firmly rooted in the hearts of Englishmen to be destroyed either by ridicule or sophistry, yet we cannot conceal from ourselves the imminent danger to be apprehended from the wicked plans of those, who thus deride and set at nought all obligations hitherto held most sacred in every civilized society.

We are convinced that the paternal care and watchfulness of your Royal Highness will alleviate, if not prevent the misfortunes that thus threaten this nation; and we implicitly rely on the wisdom of Parliament to adopt the necessary measures for the protection of all we hold most dear. We humbly request your Royal Highness will be graciously pleased to accept our strongest assurance that no exertions shall be wanting to defend and maintain to the utmost of our power that holy

To His Royal Highness George Prince of Wales, REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, His Majesty's, most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Mayor, Burgesses, and other Inhabitants of the Borough and Parish of Barnstaple and its neighbourhood, beg permission at this season of public apprehension and alarm, respectfully to approach your Royal Highness with assurances of warm attachment to your illustrious House, and of inviolable fidelity to our excellent Constitution.

The scenes of violence, outrage, and confusion which have been recently exhibited in different parts of the kingdom, have filled us with the deepest and most sensible concern, because they have displayed the operation of principles, which, if not speedily and effectually counteracted, threaten the most extensive and lasting mischief. Under specious, but false pretences, numerous meetings have been holden and directed by the malignant influence of aspiring demagogues, or pretended patriots, to the furtherance of their disparate designs, and by artful management the basest passions of a deluded populace have been irritated into acts of riot and disaffection, ruinous to themselves and tending to the ruin of the state.

The opinions asserted at these tumultuous assemblies are proved by reason and experience to be inconsistent with every form of good government, and subversive alike of private happiness and public security. The existence and progress of such opinions, we contemplate with sorrow and concern, for full of a generous but sober affection for liberty we abhor and detest licentiousness.

Nor is it Sir, in temporal affairs alone, however high and dignified, that these lawless disturbers of society, these missionaries of discord display their baneful activity. The solemn doctrines and awful truths of revelation are no more sacred from their unhallowed touch, than the rights of civil life. By seditious harangues and impious publications they labour not only to subvert the foundations of society, but to poison the chief sources of human happiness, and openly insult that religion which the wisest and best of men know to be of divine original, and reverence as the greatest blessing ever bestowed upon the human race.

For the suppression of these dreadful mischiefs, which destroy the comforts of private life, and strike at the very being of public freedom, we confide principally in the prompt and judicious exercise of the powers with which the Constitution is armed for its own defence; but when we avow our detestation and abhorrence of dissension, disloyalty, and irreligion, we are anxious to declare our af-

fectionate attachment to your Royal House, and our determination to contribute all we can towards vindicating our civil and religious institutions from insult and violation, and securing their inestimable blessings to ourselves and our posterity.

To His Royal Highness George PRINCE REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

WE, the Bailiff, Recorder, Justices, Bailiffs Peers, Burgesses and Commonalty of the Town and liberties of Wenlock, in the County of Salop, in Common Hall assembled, humbly presume to approach your Royal Highness with expressions of our unfeigned attachment to the Throne of your Royal Father, and to assure your Royal Highness of our firm and unshaken loyalty to the house of Brunswick.

In common with all good and faithful subjects, we observe with feelings of sorrow and indignation, the base attempts of factious and designing men, who have neither property or character to loose, to inculcate, under the specious but deceitful pretext of radical reform, doctrines subversive of all existing authorities, and having a direct tendency to undermine and destroy the sacred influence of our holy religion. We sincerely deplore the temporary distresses which press upon this and other countries, a feeling in which we are fully assured of your Royal Highness's participation, and whilst we express our anxious wish to promote every measure which can tend to alleviate them, we despise and abhor that mockery of suffering humanity which avails itself of the irritation produced by distress, aggravates what it affects to soothe and inflames the wound it professes to heal. Most faithfully attached to those principles of civil and religious liberty which placed your Royal Highness's family on the Throne of these Realms. We His Majesty's faithful subjects cannot view the systematic attempts of turbulent and dissaffected men in many parts of this kingdom to undermine and destroy our most invaluable constitution in church and state without assuring your Royal Highness of our firm determination to resist them. And we pledge ourselves to us our most active exertions to defend all that is dear to us as Englishmen and to oppose any attempts (should any such unhappily be made) to overawe the constituted authorities under a full reliance on the efficacy of the laws, on their power to maintain right and redress wrongs on the purity of their administration, on the wisdom of your Royal Highness's Counsels for retrenchment as far as retrenchment can be with propriety carried into effect, and for a permanent security of those invaluable privileges and blessings which are enjoyed by all good and loyal subjects in this great and free country.
