To His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT.

The loyal and dutiful Address of the Lord Provost, Magistrates, and Council of the City of Edinburgh, in Council assembled.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, the Lord Provost, Magistrates, and Council of the City of Edinburgh, feel ourselves imperiously called upon in the present crisis, humbly to approach your Royal Highness, and to express our sentiments of sorrow and indignation at the attempts which continue to be made in different parts of this kingdom, by means of wicked, seditious, and blasphemous publications, and of meetings held under the specious pretence of obtaining parliamentary reform, to bring our unrivalled Constitution into hatred and contempt, to excite disobedience to the laws, and to undermine the principles of the Christian Religion.

But while it is to be deplored that persons should be found capable of such base and dangerous designs, we are convinced that they form but a small part of His Majesty's subjects.

We have much satisfaction in assuring your Royal Highness, that notwithstanding the pressure of the times, which has borne hard upon the lower orders, the great body of the inhabitants of this ancient metropolis of Scotland, remain unshaken in their principles of loyalty, as well as of Religion, that they are firmly attached to the Person and Government of your Royal Highness, and to that Constitution, under which they and their forefathers have enjoyed as perfect a degree of liberty and security, as any human institution is capable of affording.

We most respectfully beg leave to assure your Royal Highness, that individually and collectively, we shall use every endeavour to encourage sentiments of loyalty towards our venerable and beloved Sovereign, and to your Royal Highness, as his representative, and to suppress every attempt to shake

the religious principles of our fellow citizens, or to render them disaffected to the laws of our country.

To His Royal Highness George Prince of Wales, **REGENT** of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

WE, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Mayor, Recorder, Commonalty, and other Inhabitants of the Borough and Foreign of Walsall, in the county of Stafford, beg leave to assure your Royal Highness of the sincere affection we bear to your illustrious Family, and of our unalterable attachment to the Constitution of these realms.

We deeply lament the continuance of that heavy calamity with which it has pleased Divine Providence to afflict your venerable Parent, the remembrance of whose virtues will ever be cherished by us with reverence; but while his sufferings will always call forth our sympathy, and while we regret the cessation of that intercourse between the Monarch and his people which formerly afforded us so much delight, we find a mitigation of our sorrows in witnessing the wisdom and patriotism of your Royal Highness's Government.

We have the satisfaction to acquaint your Royal Highness that although the population of this Borough and Foreign have felt and still feel more than an ordinary portion of that distress which has so generally pervaded the manufacturing districts, yet have they not in the slightest degree manifested a spirit of disaffection similar to that which has disgraced other places. We are convinced that the distress alluded to arises from causes unconnected with any system of Government, at the same time we have the fullest confidence in your Royal Highness and Parliament, that if it should appear that the state of commerce can be improved, or the sufferings of the poor diminished by any legislative measures, such measures will speedily be adopted.

We will express our hope that those of our fellow subjects who have been seduced from the paths of loyalty and subordination by evil designing men will be convinced of their error; but should our expectations in this respect unhappily be disappointed, we assure your Royal Highness that we shall always be ready to co-operate with the lawful authorities in endeavouring to repress all illegal and seditious practices.

The dutiful and loyal Address of the Provost, Magistrates, and Council of His Majesty's Ancient Royal Burgh of Ayr.

WE, His Majesty's loyal and dutiful subjects, the Provost, Magistrates, and Council of his

ancient royal burgh of Ayr, notice with horror the attempts made throughout the country by desperate and designing men, who for their own selfish purposes take advantage of the distress of the times which not only exists in this country but is universal, to infuse into the minds of the people a spirit of infidelity and sedition, calling large assemblies of these together under the pretence of a reform quite incompatible with the Constitution, but really to poison the minds,—mislead the understanding,—irritate the feelings,—traduce the laws,—ridicule our Religion,—and scoff at the Clergy, both by their speeches, and by an active circulation of seditious and blasphemous publications, which if not resisted must end in anarchy and confusion.

Impressed with a deep sense of the many blessings we enjoy under our admirable Constitution, as established by law both in Church and State, we view with serious alarm such proceedings which if not checked must tend to subvert all we hold dear as men and as christians.

From what we have seen, or can learn, the population of this town and parish is perfectly quiet and loyal; nevertheless we are firmly resolved to watch over and maintain the peace of the country inviolate, as far as in us lies, by a due execution of the laws against those who shall endanger the public tranquillity, as well as to counteract the dissemination of those insidious and blasphemous publications in all their shapes. We tender to your Royal Highness the assurance of our unshaken loyalty to our venerable Sovereign,—our attachment to the Throne and to the Constitution, and our regard for the sacred person of your Royal Highness.

A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE, P. R.

WHEREAS the Parliament stands prorogued to Tuesday the second day of November next, We, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, that the said Parliament shall be further prorogued on the said second day of November to Tuesday the twenty-third day of said month; and We have given order to the Lord High Chancellor of that part of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland called Great Britain, to prepare a Commission for proroguing the same accordingly. And We do further hereby, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice aforesaid, publish and declare, that the said Parliament shall, on the twenty-third day of November next, be held and sit for the dispatch of divers urgent and important affairs: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required and commanded to give their attendance accordingly, at Westminster, on the said twenty-third day of November next.

Given at the Court at Carlton-House, the eleventh day of October one thousand eight hundred and nineteen, in the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty's reign.

GOD save the KING.

AT the Court at Carlton-House, the 17th of September 1819.

PRESENT,

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to enable His Majesty to direct the distribution of any reward awarded by the Commissioners of the Customs or Excise to the Officers of the Army, Navy, or Marines, for apprehending smugglers, in such manner as His Majesty shall be pleased to appoint," reciting, that by the laws now in force for the prevention of smuggling,

it is lawful for the Commissioners of Customs or Excise in England, Scotland, and Ireland respectively, and they are thereby required, in certain cases, to award, to every Officer or other person arresting any person for breach of those laws, so that he shall be convicted or committed to prison on account thereof, any sum not exceeding twenty-pounds for each man so convicted or committed to prison; and that it is expedient that His Majesty should be empowered, in certain cases, to direct the distribution of such reward, by His Order or Orders in Council, or by His Royal Proclamation in that behalf, in such manner as He shall be pleased thereby to appoint; and, therefore, enacting that in all cases wherein the Commissioners of the Customs or Excise of England, Scotland, and Ireland respectively, shall award any sum not exceeding twenty pounds as afore-said to any Officer or Officers, non-commissioned Officers, petty Officers, seamen or privates of His Majesty's Army, Navy, or Marines, or acting under the Orders of the Lord High Admiral, or of the Commissioners for executing the office of the Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, for any person so arrested, convicted, or committed to prison as aforesaid, the same shall be divided and distributed in such proportions, and according to such rules, regulations, and Orders as His Majesty shall, by His Order or Orders in Council, or by His Royal Proclamation in that behalf, be pleased to direct and appoint.

In pursuance of the powers so vested in His Majesty, His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, is pleased to Order, and it is hereby Ordered, that the bounty money, awarded for the arrest of any person or persons, arrested, convicted, and committed to prison, according to the provisions of the laws above recited, by any Officer or Officers, non-commissioned Officers, petty Officers, seamen or privates of His Majesty's Army, Navy, or Marines, or acting under the Orders of the Lord High Admiral, or of the Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland as aforesaid, according to the rules and regulations directed and provided by His Majesty's Order in Council of the fourteenth of October one thousand eight hundred and sixteen, for the distribution of the shares of any such seizures, as are or shall, by virtue of any Acts relating to the trade and revenues of His Majesty's dominions, be payable to and amongst the Commanders, Officers and crews of any of His Majesty's ships or vessels of war.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lord Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to cause His Royal Highness's pleasure, hereby signified, to be duly complied with.

WHEREAS it is deemed expedient, that the Order in Council of the twenty-eighth May last, prohibiting the export of any gunpowder or saltpetre, or of any sort of arms or ammunition from the ports of this kingdom to the places therein specified, should be extended to all the ports within the dominion of the King of Spain; His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, doth therefore hereby order, require, and command, that the prohibition laid by the aforesaid Order, of the twenty-eighth May last, be, and the same is hereby, extended to all ports within the dominion of the King of Spain, and made subject to all the conditions, regulations, and restrictions specified in the said Order of the twenty-eighth May last:

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain. *Chetwynd.*

AT the Court at *Carlton-House*, the 28th of May 1819,

PRESENT,

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fifty-seventh year of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act to continue and extend the provisions of an Act of His present Majesty, for regulating the trade and commerce to and from the Cape of Good Hope, until the fifth day of July one thousand eight hundred and twenty; and also for regulating the trade of the Island of Mauritius;" His Majesty is authorised, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, by any Order or Orders to be issued from time to time, to give such directions, and to make such regulations touching the trade and commerce to and from all islands, colonies, or places, and the territories and dependencies thereof, to His Majesty belonging or in His possession, in Africa, or Asia to the eastward of the Cape of Good Hope (excepting only the possessions of the East India Company); as to His Majesty, in Council, shall appear most expedient and salutary, any thing contained in an Act, passed in the twelfth year of the

reign of His Majesty King Charles the Second, intituled "An Act for the encouraging and increasing of shipping and navigation," or in an Act, passed in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of His Majesty King William the Third, intituled "An Act for preventing frauds, and regulating abuses in the plantation trade," or any other Act or Acts of Parliament now in force, relating to His Majesty's colonies and plantations, or any other Act or Acts of Parliament, law, usage or custom to the contrary in any wise notwithstanding; His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the date of this present Order, British vessels arriving at any port of the Island of Mauritius, or its dependencies, from any country in amity with His Majesty, laden with any articles of the growth, production, or manufacture of such country (excepting all articles composed of cotton, iron, steel, or wool of foreign manufacture), shall be permitted to enter and land their cargoes, and dispose of the same in the said ports, subject to such duties as may be payable thereon:

And it is further ordered, that every such British vessel, arriving as aforesaid, shall be permitted to export to any such foreign country in amity with His Majesty, a cargo consisting of any articles of the growth, produce, or manufacture of the Island of Mauritius; or its dependencies, or of any other articles which shall have been legally imported there, on payment of such duties as may be payable thereon:

And it is hereby further ordered, that vessels belonging to the subjects of any foreign state in amity with His Majesty, which foreign state shall allow British vessels to carry on trade as aforesaid between the ports of such state and the Island of Mauritius, on the same terms as in vessels of such foreign state, shall be permitted in like manner to import into the ports of the Island of Mauritius, or its dependencies, from any port of the country to which such vessel shall belong, any articles of the growth, production, or manufacture of such country (excepting all articles composed of cotton, iron, steel, or wool of foreign manufacture), and to dispose of the same in the ports of the said Island and its dependencies, on payment of the same duties as shall be payable on the like articles when imported from such foreign port in British vessels; and that every such foreign vessel shall be permitted to export a cargo consisting of any articles of the growth, produce, or manufacture of the Island of Mauritius, or its dependencies, or of any other articles which shall have been legally imported there, on payment of the same duties as shall be payable on similar articles when exported to such foreign ports in British vessels:

It is, however, hereby further ordered and declared, that no foreign vessel, allowed by the terms of this Order to export a cargo from the Island of Mauritius; or its dependencies, shall be permitted to export such cargo to any of His Majesty's possessions, or to any other place than a port or place belonging to the state or power to which the vessel itself shall belong:

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain. *Jas. Buller.*

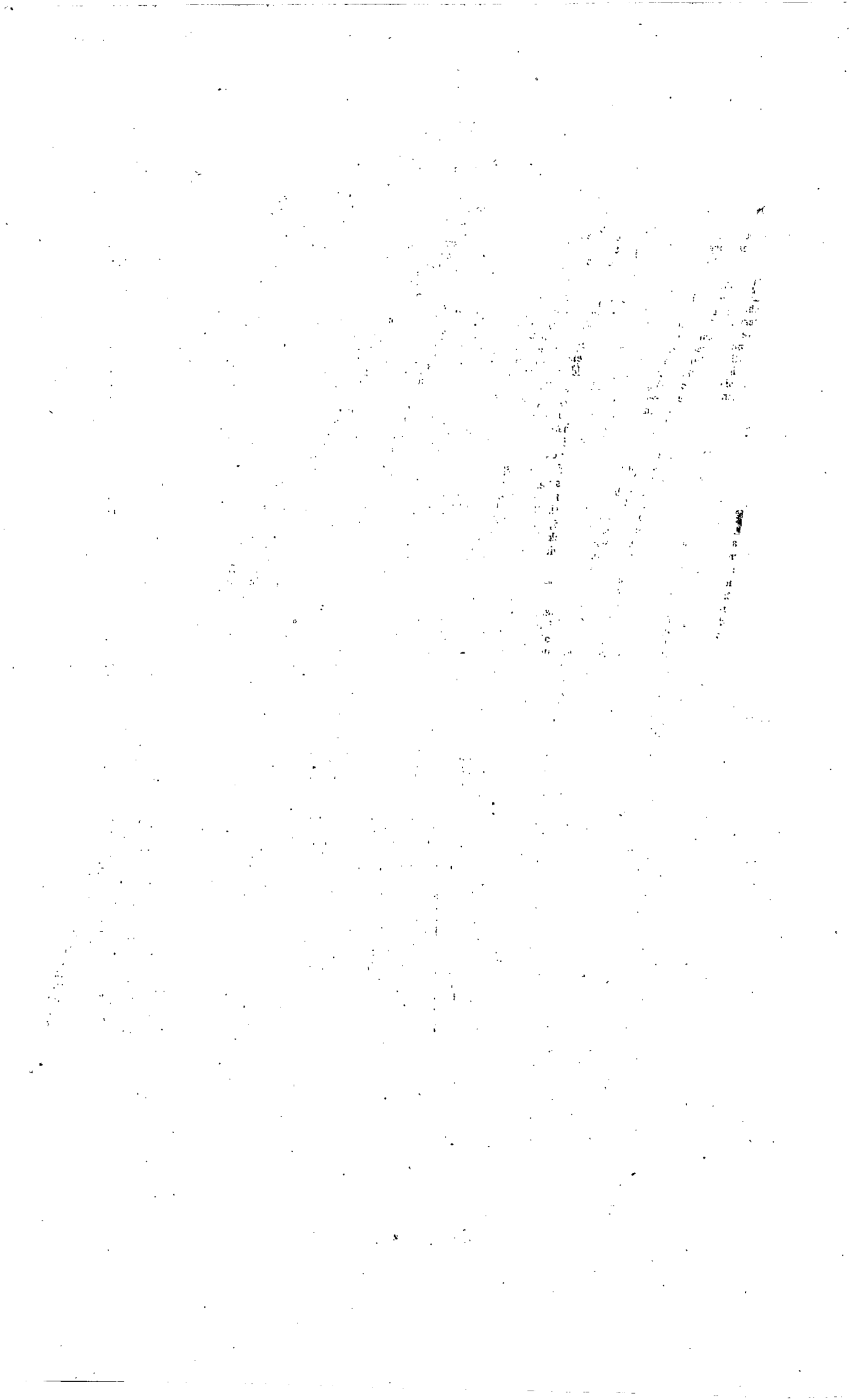
