WE, His Majesty's most loyal and dutiful Subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Presbytery of Hamilton, in Presbytery assembled, beg leave most respectfully to convey to your Royal Highness, at the present alarming crisis, our sentiments of unshaken attachment to our revered Sovereign, and to your sacred person.

As friends of humanity, we view, with unfeigned commiseration, the severe distresses in which many of our countrymen have been long involved; and as these unfortunately still continue, notwithstanding the laudable and general efforts which have been made to alleviate them, we confidently trust, that by the judicious exertions of His Majesty's paternal Government, they will soon be effectually removed.

As friends of loyalty, we deplore the daring attempts of disaffected and seditious men, to exasperate the feelings of the necessitous, at this period of commercial embarrassment, to lead them on to outrage and insurrection, and to excite them to forego the numerous blessings of our unrivalled Constitution, for chimerical plans of reform, equally unattainable and ruinous.

As friends of Christianity we regard, with indignation and horror, those impious and blasphemous sentiments which have been circulated among the lower orders with a malicious industry, and which have been avowed, with unparalleled audacity, before the insulted Tribunals of our country.

And, as ministers of Jesus Christ, we pledge ourselves to your Royal Highness, that we shall continue, by every effort in our power, to counteract

the influence of such demoralizing sentiments, and to inculcate by our example and our instructions, upon all ranks committed to our care, a sacred regard for the Oracles of God, an increasing respect for the institutions of Christianity, and the habitual practice of that "pure and undefiled religion," upon which, we are convinced, must ever depend, the stability and prosperity of His Majesty's Government, and the welfare of the human race, both "in the life that now is, and in that which is to come."

That the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ may impart the consolations of his grace to our afflicted Sovereign; that he may direct your Royal Highness in the administration of the Government, and that he may bless all the branches of the Royal Family, are the earnest prayers of, may it please your Royal Highness, the Ministers and Elders of the Presbytery of Hamilton.

WE, the Chancellor, Rector, Principal and Professors of the University and King's College of Aberdeen, feel it to be our duty, at the present time, humbly to approach the Throne, offering to your Royal Highness the renewed expression of our unshaken loyalty to our revered Sovereign, and of our dutiful attachment to the Person and Government of your Royal Highness as the Regent of these Realms.

Deeply sensible of the value of those blessings, which all ranks of men in this highly favoured land enjoy under the influence of pure and undefiled religion, and the protection of just and equal laws, we cannot contemplate, without feelings of amazement and abhorrence, the recent attempts of unprincipled men to corrupt the religious and moral sentiments of the people, and to excite a general spirit of disaffection and hostility to the civil establishments of the kingdom. leave to assure your Royal Highness that in this County they will meet with every assistance which loyalty and Constitutional principals can call forth.

We feel perfectly convinced that your Royal Highness, with the advice of your Council, will endeavour to alleviate the existing distresses that pervade many districts of the Kingdom, in which measure we shall cheerfully assist as far as our means permit.

The loyal and humble Address of the Magistrates and Town-Council of the Royal Burgh of Selkirk, in Council assembled.

*May it please your Royal Highness,*

WE, the Magistrates and Councillors of the Royal Burgh of Selkirk, for ourselves, and as representing the community of said Burgh, beg leave humbly to approach your Royal Highness, and in the present eventful crisis of public affairs, to express our sincere, devoted, and unshaken loyalty and attachment to the person and family of our venerable Sovereign and your Royal Highness, and to the Government, Constitution, and laws of our country. Entertaining these sentiments, we have the happiness of assuring your Royal Highness, that we believe, that they are participated by the inhabitants of this town and district, and that here, neither disloyalty, nor disaffection have shewn themselves. With great sorrow, however, we have seen that the case is very different in other parts of the kingdom. We have viewed with the utmost abhorrence, those attempts which have been made by wicked and designing persons, to sap the foundation of our holy religion, and to render the people discontented and disaffected to the established government in Church and State. Annual Parliaments, Universal Suffrage, and what is termed Radical Reform, we consider to be objects incompatible with the existence of our invaluable Constitution, and the advocates for these objects, when they attempt to obtain their accomplishment by immense assemblages of people marching in martial array, and under banners, bearing the most seditious inscriptions, to meetings where the passions of the people are sought to be inflamed by language, the most violent and intemperate, and every thing connected with our representative government and institutions is held up to odium, detestation and contempt, we cannot look upon, but as persons dangerous to the state. We know that it is the birthright, and the inestimable privilege of Britons to meet and freely to discuss the merits and measures of Government, and to petition the Throne, and the Parliament of Great Britain for a redress of grievances, real or imaginary, and we glory that it is so. But the best of privileges may be abused, and while on the one hand we wish to see this privilege exist to the utmost latitude consistent with the safety of the State, yet, on the other hand, we humbly presume to think, that those who like us are of opinion, (and we sincerely hope that they form a vast majority of

his Majesty's subjects), that under our venerable Constitution, the people enjoy more of substantial happiness and rational liberty than is enjoyed by any other nation on earth, and as much as is to be expected under any system of government, have a right to look to their rulers for that protection, and that preservation of peace and order in the State, which it is the first duty of every government to maintain and secure to its subjects. We know, and lament that much distress exists in many parts of the kingdom, particularly among the manufacturing part of the population. That distress however, we most decidedly do not consider to be the consequence of corruption or misrule on the part of Government, as is anxiously endeavoured to be instilled into the minds of the people, but of that long and arduous, and most necessary contest, which this country maintained for its very existence as a nation, and of other causes, over which no government can have either command or controul, and we firmly believe, that it will be the earnest desire of your Royal Highness now, as it has always been, to alleviate that distress by every means in the power of government. We trust that this distress will be only temporary—that, that unrivalled Constitution, which has come to us from our forefathers, will be handed down by us to our posterity, uninjured by the attempts of those, who under pretext of radically reforming, would destroy it; and that the august family of your Royal Highness will long continue to rule over a free, a contented, and a loyal people.

*May it please your Royal Highness,*

WE, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Gentlemen, Clergy and Freeholders of the County of Anglesey, humbly approach your Royal Highness with assurances of our affectionate attachment to your Royal Person, and of our veneration for the Kingly office which you bear. At this momentous crisis, we are also anxious to avow our reliance on the wisdom of Parliament, and to profess our devoted attachment to the matchless form of Government which we inherit from our patriotic ancestors, and which we deem better adapted than that of any other country to protect the liberty and property of the subject.

We view with just abhorrence the pernicious endeavours of an artful, daring, and restless faction, denominating themselves Radical Reformers, to excite hatred of a Constitution which has hitherto been the envy of the world, and lament that under the sanction of the sacred right of petitioning, they have seduced the manufacturing and more distressed

classes of the community from their accustomed occupations, and assembled them in tumultuous and hostile array against the constituted authorities of the Kingdom. As religion and morality impose restraints incompatible with their designs, vice and infidelity are the engines put in motion by these demagogues to reduce all that is exalted to their own level, and to subvert the glorious fabric of the British Constitution by thus sapping its foundation. To resist these machinations of the disaffected, being the imperious duty of all who prefer settled Government to revolutionary anarchy, and the established religion of the country, to deism and infidelity, we beg leave to assure your Royal Highness that our best endeavours shall be exerted to repress blasphemy and sedition, and to promote the resumption of those peaceful and industrious pursuits which are the only stable basis of individual prosperity and of national wealth.

*May it please your Royal Highness,*

WE, the Noblemen, Freeholders, Justices of the Peace, and Commissioners of Supply for the County of Lanark, at the present period of alarm and danger, feel it to be our duty to renew our assurances of sincere attachment to our revered Sovereign and your Royal Highness.

Zealously attached to that inestimable Constitution which is the pride and the glory of Britons, and by which liberty has been more secured, and national happiness more promoted, than by any form of Government that ever has existed, no exertion on our part shall be wanting, in order that the goodly inheritance we have received from our ancestors may be transmitted unimpaired and inviolate to our posterity.

It is with heartfelt pain we have seen in a country where the inhabitants have hitherto been distinguished for their regard and respect for religion, that blasphemous writings have been industriously circulated and encouraged, and that at public meetings which have been held in this district our holy religion has been openly reviled and insulted.

We have witnessed with deep regret in the manufacturing district around us the efforts of turbulent and factious demagogues to instil into the minds of the lower classes, principles false and pernicious, and to disseminate delusive theories, hostile to the laws and constitution of this realm, which if carried into practice, would deprive this nation of the blessings we enjoy, and bring upon us the horrors of anarchy.

The distress at present felt in this and other trading countries which has been borne by many of our fellow subjects with exemplary patience, and which we as individuals have used such means as were in our power to alleviate, has been employed as an instrument for exciting and spreading dissen-

tent, and for inculcating wild, extravagant and ill-founded notions respecting the existing institutions of the British Empire.

Whilst we rely upon the energy and wisdom of Parliament for adopting measures fitted to meet the exigency of the times, we beg to assure your Royal Highness that by our example and influence we shall endeavour to give support to lawful authority, and to counteract the designs of those wicked and disaffected men, whose efforts are directed to the subversion of the Constitutional Establishments of our country.

**W**HEREAS the time limited by the Orders of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent in Council of the twenty-eighth May and the twelfth July last, for prohibiting the exportation of gunpowder, arms, or ammunition, to the places therein specified, will expire on the thirtieth day of this instant November; and whereas it is expedient, that the said prohibition should be continued for some time longer; His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, doth hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no person or persons whatsoever, (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's service) do, at any time during the space of six months (to commence from the thirtieth day of this instant November), presume to transport any gunpowder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, to any port or place within the dominions of the King of Spain, or to any port or place on the Coast of Africa, or in the West Indies, or on any part of the Continent of America (except to a port or place, or ports or places in His Majesty's territories or possessions on the Continent of North America, or in the territories of the United States of America), or ship or lade any gunpowder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, on board any ship or vessel, in order to transporting the same into any such ports or places within the dominions of the King of Spain, or into any such ports or places on the Coast of Africa, or in the West Indies, or on the Continent of America (except as above excepted), without leave or permission in that behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring and suffering the respective forfeitures and penalties, inflicted by an Act, passed in the twenty-ninth year of His late

Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of salt-petre, and to enforce the law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of gunpowder, or any sort of arms or ammunition, and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying coastwise of salt-petre, gunpowder, or any sort of arms or ammunition;" and also by an Act, passed in the thirty-third year of His Majesty's reign, cap. 2, intituled "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the exportation of naval stores, and more effectually to prevent the exportation of salt-petre, arms, and ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council."
