The humble and dutiful Address of the Magistrates, acting in and for the Liberty of Peterborough, in the County of Northampton.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Magistrates for the Liberty of Peterborough, with every mark of profound respect, humbly approach your Royal Highness for the important purpose of testifying our utmost abhorrence of the machinations of factious and designing men, associated for the formidable object of dissolving that social compact by which society is firmly bound, and of involving, in one common ruin, both Church and State, by every means which sedition can employ or impiety suggest.

Impressed with a full conviction of the alarming extension of this revolutionary spirit, so hostile to the tranquillity of the nation, which demands the utmost vigilance and activity to arrest its progress, we deem it our indispensable duty thus publicly to avow our sentiments of fidelity to our gracious King, and our principles of ardent attachment to our unrivalled Constitution, and our firm determination, by a prompt, discreet, but resolute exercise of that authority with which we are invested, collectively and individually to enforce the due execution of the laws against all who, either by their inflammatory writings or seditious conduct, shall incite the ignorant and incautious to acts of violence, and thereby endanger the peace and security of the realm.

We humbly hope that this tribute of regard for

the public weal, and respect for the sacred person of your Royal Highness, may be as graciously accepted as it is loyally offered.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, the Lord Provost, Bailies, Dean of Guild, Treasurer, and Council of the Royal Burgh of Elgin, for ourselves and as representing the community, beg leave to approach your Royal Highness with humble assurances of our unalterable loyalty and attachment to your Royal House.

While we feel in this peaceful corner of the country, all that confidence and security which the conduct of a loyal and contented population inspires, we cannot view without concern, the present agitated state of some parts of the kingdom; and our first impulse is, to express our abhorrence of the attempts of those unprincipled men, who wish to sap the foundation of our most holy faith, and to destroy in our minds the principles of loyalty and submission to our rulers. We beg to assure your Royal Highness, that our best exertions shall never be wanting to maintain our Sovereign's Throne, and that Constitution under which we have so long enjoyed the most valuable privileges that can fall to the lot of any people.
