To His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT

*May it please your Royal Highness,*

WE, His Majesty's most loyal and dutiful subjects, the Magistrates and Council of the Royal Burgh of Lauder, in Council assembled, impressed with the strongest feelings of loyalty to our beloved and venerable Sovereign, beg leave to express our attachment to our Sovereign, and to the Constitution under which we enjoy such envied liberty and happiness, and our veneration for the Christian religion, as established in this country.

We are convinced that more real happiness and pure liberty has been enjoyed under the British Constitution than any other system of Government in the known world, and that under it this country has attained a height of national glory, prosperity and power unrivalled in the history of any nation.

We have observed with the deepest regret, that attempts have been made by turbulent and unprincipled men, under the pretext of reform, to overturn that Constitution which we must ever consider the most precious and glorious inheritance derived from our ancestors, and to bury in one common abyss, the Cottage, the Palace, the Throne of our King, and the Altar of our God.

Impressed with feelings of the uttermost abhorrence of such principles and attempts, we beg leave to present to your Royal Highness, assurances of our unfeigned loyalty to our King, our unalterable attachment to the Constitution, and our unshaken and dutiful regard to your Royal Highness as Regent of these Realms.

Acting under a deep sense of public duty, we request your Royal Highness will be persuaded that every effort shall be used by us for maintaining order and tranquillity, and that we shall endeavour by our example and influence to counteract the progress of impiety and disaffection.

To His Royal Highness George Prince of Wales, REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

The loyal and dutiful Address of the Provost, Magistrates and Town Council of the Royal Burgh of Forres, in North Britain.

*May it please your Royal Highness,*

WE, His Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Provost, Magistrates and Town Council of the Royal Burgh of Forres, beg leave, at this momentous crisis, to approach your Royal Highness with sentiments of devoted and unshaken loyalty.

When under the specious pretext of reform, doctrines tending to produce anarchy and impiety are so industriously propagated in various parts of the kingdom, we should betray an insensibility to the blessings we enjoy under your Royal Highness's paternal Government, were we not most decidedly to declare our utter abhorrence of designs alike inimical to the welfare of society, and incompatible with the public tranquillity.

Situated in a part of the Empire, happily unsullied by infidelity, or insubordination, we entertain the fullest confidence, that the approved loyalty of the inhabitants of this Ancient Burgh, will ever stand opposed to principles and practices, no less hostile to the Constitution than manifestly calculated to aggravate the condition of the people.

Thus impressed, we humbly and dutifully renew the assurance of our unalterable fidelity to our venerable Sovereign, and to your Royal Highness's Person, our unanimous determination to resist the malignant efforts of the emissaries of sedition and our entire reliance on the counsels of your Royal Highness, for the adoption of such measures as shall preserve those civil and religious institutions, which have hitherto, constituted the pride, the happiness and the security of the nation.

To His Royal Highness George Prince of Wales, REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

The loyal and dutiful Address of the Portree, Burgesses and Inhabitants of Callington in the County of Cornwall.

WE, His Majesty's loyal and dutiful subjects, the Portree, Burgesses and Inhabitants of the Borough of Callington, feel it to be our duty, in common with other public bodies of our fellow subjects, to declare that we are duly sensible of the blessings we enjoy, under the protection of the laws, and the principles of religious and civil liberty which distinguish our happy Constitution, and we cannot see without alarm the dangers to which this envied state of society is exposed, by the machinations of turbulent and factious men.

We would not be forward to speak in such terms of political differences of any ordinary kind; but when the leaders and instigators of tumultuous
