of Dundee.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, the Provost, Magistrates and Council of the Burgh of Dundee, beg leave to approach your Royal Highness, with sentiments of the highest veneration for our aged and beloved Sovereign, the King, and of profound respect and attachment to your Royal Highness's Person and Government.

We feel ourselves imperiously called on in the present state of the country, to assure your Royal Highness of our steady and unshaken loyalty, of our inviolable regard to your Royal Highness's illustrious Family, whose accession to the British Throne has brought so many inestimable blessings to these Realms, and of our admiration of and love to the laws and Constitution of our country.

We do most sincerely regret the hardships that press more or less on all classes of His Majesty's subjects, owing to the failure of some of the ordinary sources of our national industry and wealth, hardships not confined to the people of this country alone, and we will always be ready to co-operate in the use of such means, as wisdom and experience may suggest for removing or alleviating the sufferings of our countrymen.

But we deprecate the conduct of those visionaries, who under pretence of zeal for the Constitution, plot its destruction, and we deeply lament the not unnatural, but baneful union of infidelity and impiety with disloyalty and sedition, for the purpose of overturning the fabric, both of our present

happiness and our future hopes; we have not forgotten that it was by such a union as this, the ground work was laid in a neighbouring nation, for that long protracted and horrifying scene of rapine and bloodshed, which desolated one of the fairest portions of Europe, and rendered France for a long time an object of pity or of terror to the civilized world; and therefore we learn with unspeakable concern, that wicked and blasphemous publications, have been industriously circulated in various parts of the kingdom, urging the ignorant and unwary to become at once traitors to their God and to their King, and to trample under foot that glorious Constitution, the work of ages, the envy or the admiration of the world, the best inheritance we have derived from our fathers, and the equal safeguard of the rights and privileges of the prince and of the peasant, of the palace and of the cottage.

At such a crisis, when every exertion is made by designing men to poison the minds and to shake the allegiance of the people, we think it our duty to express to your Royal Highness, our detestation and abhorrence of practices like those equally subversive of public and private virtue and happiness; and to pledge ourselves to your Royal Highness, and to our country, to give our steady and determined opposition to all such proceedings, and to support by every means in our power the Throne, the Religion and the Laws of the Kingdom.

We feel it to be indispensably necessary at the present moment to guard against the machinations of those, who under the specious pretext of an unnecessary and impracticable reform for the benefit of the people, only seek their own base and selfish ends, at the risk of all that is dear to us as men, as Christians and as Britons; and that it is the duty of all the true friends of their country to rally around the Throne and the Constitution, and to unite their efforts in stemming that torrent of atheism, of infidelity, of impiety and disloyalty, which if left to accumulate strength, might one day stain our national glory, and shake the pillars of our prosperity, virtue and happiness.

Impressed with these sentiments, we humbly proffer to your Royal Highness, all our best exertions, to check an evil of such magnitude and to

maintain that regard to the Constitution of our country so essential to its welfare.

We are at the sametime neither alarmed nor intimidated by the aspect of the times, satisfied, that the great body of the people, not only of this town and neighbourhood, but of the nation at large duly value our Constitutional privileges, and that they will not consent to exchange them for anarchy and impiety, and we would conclude with expressing our firm reliance on the care of an over-ruling Providence, on the wisdom of the great Council of the Nation, and on the prudence and vigour of His Majesty's paternal Government, to avert from our happy land those calamities with which we are threatened, and to preserve to us and to our posterity the inestimable blessings of religion and liberty, of loyalty and civil order throughout this great empire.

Unto his Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT.

The Address of the Ministers of the Presbytery of Abertarf, met in Presbytery at Fort Augustus, the 13th day of November, 1819.

May it please your Royal Highness,

AT a time, perilous like the present, when whatever is valuable and dear to the heart of all the wise and good in the nation is overhung by a cloud impregnated with wasteful elements. At a time when the cloud which originally was not bigger than a man's hand, but which has been gradually gathering in silence and thickning all around into a furious tempest, is ready to burst and to involve in its tremendous desolating crash, both the Altar and the throne: at a time when the enemies of the human race are prepared, and preparing to despoil us of all the temporal advantages of the best poised Constitution upon earth, or that the accumulated wisdom of successive generations could devise, and tear from the breast all those indiscribable sympathies, consolations, and encouragements unfolded by the gospel, and which sooth the afflicted, animate the pious, and shed around the bed of death the most substantial comforts and exhilarating hopes: at a period when traitors and atheists have conspired and combined their force to accomplish their feat of robbery, dilapidation, and murder—to achieve the ruin of present enjoyment and future felicity:—at a conjuncture so awful, so alarming, and so eventful, we consider it to be our bounden duty thus to, proclaim aloud our abhorrence of all such principles as are subversive of the now existing and happy order of things in Church and State, and beg leave most humbly to approach the throne, to prefer these our sentiments to your Royal Highness.

Deeply impressed with the belief that your Royal Highness watches over our invaluable Constitution with care and anxiety, we cannot withhold from your Royal Highness the expression of our liveliest gratitude and sensibility for the measure adopted of summoning Parliament to continue to us our envied lot, and to transmit the same inestimable heritage with increasing benefits to after ages. By the magnanimity, the foresight, and the perseverance of your Royal Highness's Administration, not only has our own Constitution been preserved entire amidst former volcanic shocks from without and from within, but the rule of law and of legitimacy has been established among foreign nations. From past experience we augur auspiciously as to futurity, and in common with millions of our fellow subjects we contemplate a continuance

of the same men in office, and look to them with confidence, under the blessing of Him who overrules the affairs of the world, for once more steering the vessel in safety through the troublous sea of dangers with which it is environed. They have proved themselves trust-worthy, and to be possessed of pre-eminent talents, and genuine unequivocal patriotism. Their conduct in the most critical times, and on the most trying occasions, affords a most ample and precious pledge that they shall hereafter labour with zeal and success, in support of the dignity and honour of the Crown, and of the Constitutional rights of the subject. And the Presbytery will rejoice to co-operate, in their humble sphere, with your Royal Highness's government, and to give their most cordial aid in protection of that Throne on which have sat monarchs of your Royal Highness's illustrious line, whose first wish it was to dispense to their subjects the blessings of a free Constitution, and in defence of that divine religion which inspires by example and precept, loyalty and love of country, and which assures to the observers of its commandments a peaceable possession of the goods of life, and a reward hereafter that is imperishable.

As ministers of the gospel of peace, it shall therefore be our delightful and unwearied employments, as it is an obligation sacred and inseparable from a faithful discharge of our honourable vocation, to impress the people committed to our pastoral oversight with a sense of the never to be sufficiently admired privileges they now enjoy, and of their duty eventually to make considerable sacrifices for the preservation of them. As they value His favour, who, from a circumstance contrived by the seditious to ensnare him, had enjoined to render to Cæsar the things which are Cæsar's, and to infuse into them an ardour in their country's cause, from His amiable example, who wept over the impending desolation of His beloved Jerusalem: to enforce on them as Britons and as Christians, the imperious necessity of obeying the laws, of honouring the king, and of loving God, and thus to qualify them to act their part aright as citizens here, and to prepare them for eternal bliss hereafter.

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in Council.

WHEREAS the time limited by the Orders of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent in Council of the twenty-eighth May and the twelfth July last, for prohibiting the exportation of gunpowder, arms, or ammunition, to the places there-

in specified, will expire on the thirtieth day of this instant November; and whereas it is expedient, that the said prohibition should be continued for some time longer; His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, doth hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no person or persons whatsoever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's service) do, at any time during the space of six months (to commence from the thirtieth day of this instant November), presume to transport any gunpowder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, to any port or place within the dominions of the King of Spain, or to any port or place on the Coast of Africa, or in the West Indies, or on any part of the Continent of America (except to a port or place, or ports or places in His Majesty's territories or possessions on the Continent of North America, or in the territories of the United States of America), or ship or lade any gunpowder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, on board any ship or vessel, in order to transporting the same into any such ports or places within the dominions of the King of Spain, or into any such ports or places on the Coast of Africa, or in the West Indies, or on the Continent of America (except as above excepted), without leave or permission in that behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring and suffering the respective forfeitures and penalties inflicted by an Act, passed in the twenty-ninth year of His late Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of salt-petre, and to enforce the law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of gunpowder, or any sort of arms or ammunition, and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying coastwise of salt-petre, gunpowder, or any sort of arms or ammunition;" and also by an Act, passed in the thirty-third year of His Majesty's reign, cap. 2, intituled "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the exportation of naval stores, and more effectually to prevent the exportation of salt-petre, arms, and ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council:"

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to enable His Majesty to direct the distribution of any reward awarded by the Commissioners of the Customs or Excise to the Officers of the Army, Navy, or Marines, for apprehending smugglers, in such manner as His Majesty shall be pleased to appoint," reciting, that by the laws now in force for the prevention of smuggling, it is lawful for the Commissioners of Customs or Excise in England, Scotland, and Ireland respectively, and they are thereby required, in certain cases, to award, to every Officer or other person arresting any person for breach of those laws, so that he shall be convicted or committed to prison on account thereof, any sum not exceeding twenty-pounds for each man so convicted or committed to prison; and that it is expedient that His Majesty should be empowered, in certain cases, to direct the distribution of such reward, by His Order or Orders in Council, or by His Royal Proclamation in that behalf, in such manner as He shall be pleased thereby to appoint; and, therefore, enacting that in all cases wherein the Commissioners of the Customs or Excise of England, Scotland, and Ireland respectively, shall award any sum not exceeding twenty pounds as aforesaid to any Officer or Officers, non-commissioned Officers, petty Officers, seamen or privates of His Majesty's Army, Navy, or Marines, or acting under the Orders of the Lord High Admiral, or of the Commissioners for executing the office of the Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, for any person so arrested, convicted, or committed to prison as aforesaid, the same shall be divided and distributed in such proportions, and according to such rules, regulations, and Orders as His Majesty shall, by His Order or Orders in Council, or by His Royal Proclamation in that behalf, be pleased to direct and appoint.

In pursuance of the powers so vested in His Majesty, His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, is pleased to Order, and it is hereby Ordered, that the bounty money, awarded for the arrest of any person or persons, arrested, convicted, and committed to prison, according to the provisions of the laws above recited, by any Officer or Officers, non-commissioned Officers, petty Officers, seamen or privates of His Majesty's Army, Navy, or Marines, or acting under the Orders of the Lord High Admiral, or of the Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, shall be divided, and distributed amongst such Officers, non-commissioned Officers, petty Officers, seamen or privates of His Majesty's Army, Navy, or Marines, or acting under the Orders of the Lord High Admiral, or of the Commissioners for executing the office of the Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland as aforesaid, according to the rules and regulations directed and provided by His Majesty's Order in Council of the fourteenth of October one thousand eight hundred and sixteen, for the distribution of the shares of any such seizures, as are or shall, by virtue of any,

Acts relating to the trade and revenues of His Majesty's dominions, be payable to and amongst the Commanders, Officers and crews of any of His Majesty's ships or vessels of war.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to cause His Royal Highness's pleasure, hereby signified, to be duly complied with.
