To His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT

WE, the Noblemen, Gentlemen, and Freeholders of the County of Oxford, beg leave to approach your Royal Highness with unfeigned sentiments of veneration for the laws and institutions of our country, and of loyalty to your Royal Highness's Person and Government.

We cannot but behold with indignation and abhorrence the daring attempts of designing and turbulent men, who, under the specious pretext of considering of grievances, but more evidently for promulgating the most dangerous doctrines, and delivering the most inflammatory harangues, have arrayed under banners of sedition, and in various places have assembled together many thousands of the lower orders of the people, to the terror and dismay of the well disposed, and tending to overawe the constituted authorities of the law, and to endanger the peace of the country.

We have seen with feelings of horror the industrious dissemination of seditious and blasphemous publications, designed to promote discontent and disaffection to the Government, and to bring into contempt the holy religion of the country, and to extirpate from the minds of His Majesty's subjects every religious and moral principle, that they may be the more easily led to the perpetration of crime, and prepared for revolution and anarchy, with their unavoidable consequences, rapine, devastation, and murder.

We feel it our duty therefore at this time to declare our detestation of such practices, and that we will use our utmost endeavours to suppress them, and to assure your Royal Highness of our veneration for the Christian Religion, and our resolution to support and maintain that Constitution

which we have received from our ancestors, by which, under Providence, this country has enjoyed glory, opulence, internal peace and happiness, above all other nations.

Highness's Person and Government. In our re-
mote and humble situation we are proud to stand
forward with a declaration of our unshaken loyalty,
of our veneration for the religion and laws of our
country, and of our firm determination to support
them against the wicked and factious designs of
unprincipled disturbers of the public peace; we
see with indignation and abhorrence the attempts
which are making even in the most distant quarters
of the empire to undermine, by the dissemination
of seditious and profane publications, those sound
principles of loyalty, and of steady religious per-
suasion which have raised the character of the
British subject in the present age high in the scale
of moral excellence. We estimate the magnitude
of the danger from the value of the principles which
are attacked, and from the malignant zeal and
activity with which those pernicious doctrines are
spread through the empire, by agents, who could
not, without the support, countenance, and pecu-

niary aid of others in a more elevated station,
withdraw themselves from the ordinary cares and
avocations of life, in order to scatter over the
country the seeds of discontent and infidelity. We
rely on that wisdom and vigour tempered with
moderation with which the servants of your Royal
Highness, intrusted with the administration of
public affairs, conducted this nation through a war
of unexampled peril and duration to the glorious
issue of a permanent and a disinterested peace;
we look with confidence to that wisdom and vigour
for the preservation of public tranquility, and of
that sound state of public feeling which has hitherto
been the peculiar distinction of the country.

We humbly offer to your Royal Highness the
assurance of our unshaken loyalty, and of our zeal

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, His Majesty's loyal and dutiful subjects,
the Ministers and Elders of the Presbytery of Dum-
barton, desire at this crisis to approach the Throne
with the renewed expression of our attachment to
the Person and Government of your Royal High-
ness, and zeal for the maintenance of our Civil and
Ecclesiastical Constitution.

Participating deeply in the heartfelt sympathy
universally excited by those sufferings which the
present depressed state of trade has inflicted on a
large proportion of the labouring classes of the
community, and striving to alleviate them by every
effort in our power, we cannot sufficiently express
our abhorrence of the conduct of those audacious
and unprincipled men, who by goading on the
sufferers to discontent and outrage deprive them of
the resources of patient and persevering industry;
by exciting general apprehension and alarm, divert
into another channel the means which would have
afforded them relief; and by poisoning the reli-
gious principles bereave them alike of consolation
in time and hope for eternity.

While we rejoice in the conviction that those
attempts have as yet had comparatively little success
in the district under our charge, we feel that the
extent to which they have been carried in other
parts of the kingdom imposes on us an obligation
to redouble our diligence in inculcating the sacred
principles of christian truth, loyalty, and subordina-
tion; and we repose entire confidence, under the
blessing of Divine Providence, on the wisdom and
energy of the Legislature and Executive Govern-
ment, supported by the steady loyalty of the great
body of the nation, for arresting the progress of
tumult and disaffection, administering relief to the
really distressed, and restoring the benefits of tran-
quillity and sobriety of mind in every quarter of
the British empire.

While we reprobate their blasphemy and sedition, we most sincerely deplore the delusion of too many others, who, fretted by privations occasioned by the present (but we trust temporary) depression of manufacturers, are at once the dupes and the abettors of their mischievous arts.

For the suppression of these systematic and execrable enormities, we rely, with entire confidence, on the prompt and vigorous exercise of that authority with which your Royal Highness is invested, on the wisdom of His Majesty's Councils, and on the zealous co-operation of the great majority of His Majesty's subjects, who, with us regard the Constitution of our country as the noblest production of political wisdom, and the liberty which it guarantees as the most perfect that has existed or can exist among mankind.

We would do very imperfect justice to that part of His Majesty's subjects who are under our pastoral charge, did we merely say that they exhibit no symptoms of insubordination or tumult; for with much pleasure we can assure your Royal Highness of their loyalty and contentment, and respect for the ordinances of religion; and we shall

only add, that as it is our duty so it shall be our care to inculcate on them, both by exhortation and example, to "fear God, to honour the King, and not to meddle with them who are given to change."

The loyal and dutiful Address of the Ministers of the Presbytery of Abernethy, in Presbytery assembled.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, His Majesty's most loyal and dutiful subjects, the Ministers of the Presbytery of Abernethy, beg leave most respectfully to approach your Royal Highness, with the expression of our sentiments at the present alarming crisis.

While we rejoice that it is our lot to reside in a part of the country where all ranks, from the chieftain to the peasant, vie with each other in loyalty and attachment to our unrivalled Constitution; we have beheld, with feelings of grief and abhorrence, the daring attempts made of late by some wicked and designing men, to poison the minds of the ignorant and unwary, by seditious and blasphemous harangues and publications, and thus to disseminate the principles of insubordination, anarchy, and impiety among His Majesty's subjects.

We trust, however, that the triumph of the enemies of our religion, and of the peace of civil society, will be but of short duration, that the real object of the pretended reformers of our Constitution will soon appear in its proper light to those who may have been unhappily deluded by them, that the attacks which have been made on the Christian faith will eventually produce a more general and strict attention to the Bible, the Sabbath, and the ordinances of religion among all ranks in society, and that He, by whom Kings reign and Princes decree justice, will direct the councils of your
