A PROCLAMATION,

For adjourning the Solemnity of the Coronation of His Majesty.

GEORGE, R.

WHEREAS by Our Royal Proclamation, bearing date the sixth day of May last, We did (amongst other things) publish and declare Our royal intention to celebrate the solemnity of Our Royal Coronation, upon Tuesday the first day of August next, at Our Palace at Westminster; and whereas for divers weighty reasons Us thereunto moving, We have thought fit to adjourn the said solemnity until Our royal will and pleasure shall be further signified thereon, We do by this Our Royal Proclamation give notice thereof; and We do hereby further signify to all Our loving subjects whom it may concern, that all persons of what quality or rank soever they be, who either upon Our letters to them directed, or by-reason of their offices or tenures or otherwise, are to do any service at the time of such Coronation, are discharged from their attendance on Tuesday the first day of August next.

Given at Our Court at Carlton-House, this twelfth day of July one thousand eight hundred and twenty, and in the first year of Our reign.

Westminster, July 15, 1820.

THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod,

acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorised by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by His Majesty, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act for granting to His Majesty a sum of money to be raised by lotteries.

An Act for raising the sum of one million five hundred thousand pounds British currency by Treasury bills in Ireland, for the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and twenty.

An Act to continue certain duties on several articles the manufacture of Great Britain or Ireland respectively, on their importation into either country from the other.

An Act for the better securing the excise duties on paper and pasteboard.

An Act to continue until the fifth day of July one thousand eight hundred and twenty one, an Act of the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty for rendering the growing produce of the consolidated fund of the United Kingdom, arising in Great Britain, available for the public service.

An Act to amend the laws relating to smuggling and the coasting trade in Great Britain.

An Act to amend, revive and continue until the twenty-fifth day of March one thousand eight hundred and twenty five, an Act of the fifty-second year of His late Majesty, for regulating the separation of damaged from sound coffee, and for permitting dealers to send out any quantity of coffee not exceeding eight pounds weight without permit.

An Act to carry into effect certain licences, permitting the removal of negro slaves from the Bahama islands to Demerara.

An Act to amend and continue two Acts passed in the fifty-seventh year of His late Majesty King George the Third, for authorizing the issue of Ex-
