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Moscow, Aug. 15.

E gave you formerly an account, That we had here two young Princes, who Governed jointly: Hitherto they seem to agree very well, and things are calm and quiet, but many fear they will not long continue so, and that we shall fall into new troubles. We are expecting here an Envoy from the King of Demmark, and another from the Elector of Brandenburg, who, it's said, come to engage this Court in the Interests of those Princes, but it is not believed that the Ministers here will much concern themselves with affairs abroad, while things at home are in the state they now are in.

Venice, Sept. 20. The illness of the Duke of Sary pay affords not only matter of Discourse, but of Concernment also, to these parts, because of the great consequences the Death of that Prince would in all probab lity have: Our last Letters from Turin toldus, That his Highness's Voyage for Portugal had been put off for this Year, and that People did much rejoyce at it. Some persons who are lately arrived from Turkey, inform us, That the Turks have been preparing these two Years for a War, which it's believed is now going to break out in Hungary; That the next Year the Grand Vizier will go into the Field in Person, and that he will be at the head of a very formidable Army. The Letters' we recieve from Conflantinole speak to the same effect; however they give us some hopes of Count Caprara's succeeding in his Negotiation there, which we wish there may be ground for. The Letters we recieve from Rome leave us very much in the dark, as to the present State of the ngs between that Court and the Crown of France.

Vienna, Sept. 27. Their Imperial Majesties are expected here the Third of the next Month. from Ebersdorf, and on the Sixth, the Duke and Dutchess of Newburg will part from hence to their Residence in the Empire. Our last Letters from Hungary give an account, That since the taking of Vil eck, the Turks and Hungarians were separated; That the first, under the Command of the Vizier of Buda, were marched towards Agrie, and that it was reported they intended to pass the Danube, and to fall into the Lower Hungary, while Count Teckeley continues to act with his Forces in the Upper, where he has possessed himfelf of the Gold and Silver Mines. The number of the Turks is reckoned at Sixty Thousand, and the Hungarian Rebels; at Twenty Thousand, besides the Troops of the Prince of Transitionality, which may be about Ten Thousand; and General Control of the Prince of Transitionality, ral Caprara, not being able to make head against a Force so much exceeding that under his Com-Militia of Hungary, which the Palatine of that Kingdom has raised, is found to be of no use, being without Experience or Discipline, and com-mitting great disorders in their own Country. The Governor of Caschaw is a Prisoner here, and will be tried by a Council of War for having dif-regarded the timely notice that was given him of the defigns of the Enemy upon that place. Count Strafoldo will likewise be questioned for his Conduct, which some blane very much. Several Regiments, which came from Bobenia, are passed by this place in their March towards Hungary.

Many people expected, not long since, the execution of some great design, which it was believed the French had in hand, and Monsieur de Louvoy's arrival in these parts confirmed them in that opinion, but at present they begin to think otherwise, and many Officers having obtained leave to be absent from their Commands here, a d in other places in Alface, it seems to be an Argument that no sudden Action is intended.
