

ing to give the Emperor what assistance he can against the Turks, but wishes that a firm Peace may be first established between the Empire and the most Christian King.

Hamburg, Octob. 4. We have had a Report for several days, grounded upon some advices which come from *Danzick*, That in *Moscow* they are again fallen into great troubles; That Prince *Peter*, and many of the Boyars, and other great Men, have been killed; but our Letters from *Moscow*, of the 15th past, not making any mention thereof, we do not give any credit to it. The Dukes of *Lunenburg* are, as we are informed, endeavouring to compose the Matters in difference between the King of *Denmark* and the Duke of *Holsstein*, in which people here very heartily wish they may have the desired success, that so all occasions of disturbing the Peace, which we and our Neighbours at present enjoy, may be taken away.

Cologne, Octob. 6. Our Elector is highly offended that the City of *Liege* have not all this while made the Submission he expects from them, and therefore seems resolved to break off all Treaty with them, and to make use of his power to reduce them to their Obedience. It is reported, That the most Christian King has made his Electoral Highness an offer of his Troops, to be employed against that City, but that his Electoral Highness has not accepted thereof.

Brussels, Octob. 10. The Marquis de *Bedmar* having received his Commission from *Spain*, to be General of the Artillery in these Provinces, has thereupon received the Compliments of all Persons of Quality here. The Marquis de *Granada* has ordered the English Regiment, and that commanded by Count *Grimberg*, to March from *Aeth* to *Bruges*, where they are to Winter. The Dyke between *Ostend* and *Fok Albert*, which was broken through in several places by the last Inundation, is now very well repaired, and all the Works at *Ostend* are likewise finished, and in good order, but the new Fortifications that are making at *Newport*, advance but slowly, and will require time. We are much troubled at the ill news we receive by every Post from *Hungary*, where it's said the Turks, together with the Hungarian Rebels, and the Transilvanians, are 80000 strong, and that since the taking of *Pilleck*, they are separated, and intend for the future to act in distinct Bodies, and that Count *Caprava*, General of the Imperial Army, understanding that the Enemy advanced towards him, was retired to *Trenchin* on the *Waag* to expect the conjunction of the rest of the Imperial Troops. A Placact has been Published here, by his Excellency's Command, for the preventing the great excesses in Apparel. His Excellency intends to go very suddenly for *Gelderland*.

Paris, Octob. 10. We have Letters, Dated before *Argiers* the sixteenth of the last Month, which give an account, That the *Sieur du Quezno*, having caused the Gallies, under the Protection of five Men of War, and several Armed Barks, to come to an Anchor near *Argiers*, they had, the 20th past, and the third and fourth Instant in the night, shot a great many Bombs into that City, which had destroyed part of the great Mosque, and several Houses, and killed a great many Persons, but that this execution of the Lombes had not had any effect upon those people to

dispose them to a Peace, and that therefore the *Sieur du Quezno*, seeing the Winter season so far advanced, had thought fit to send home the said Gallies, and that he followed himself the sixteenth, the day the Letters were writ, leaving four Men of War, under the command of the Chevalier de *Leri*, to Cruise on the Coast of *Barbary*. From *Rome* we have advice, That the new General of the Jesuits, who has been in a great perplexity concerning his visiting the French and Spanish Ambassadors, each pretending to the first Visit, has at last resolved to visit the French Ambassador first: He would have accommodated the matter by visiting neither, but that would not satisfy. The Dauphine returned, the seventh Instant, to *Versailles*, from *Chambor*, from whence their Majesties part the 12th Instant for *Fontainebleau*.
