Florence, Sept. 26.

Everal Souldiers and Officers of the Italian Regiment, which has been lately Disbanded in France, are arrived at Leghorn, and other Places, The Duke of Savoy continues under his Indisposition; and the Duke of Cadaval is preparing to return to Lisbon with the Fleet, Three Slaves having made their efcape from Argiers, in a fmall open Boat, having no Sail, and only two Oars, are arrived at Legborne, after having been 22 Days at Sea, and three Days without any Provisions.

Vienna, Octob. 4. Our Letters from the Camp of General Caprara, of the 27th past, give an account, That the Imperial Army was to couliderably reinforced, that it was in a condition to march towards the Enemy, but that they wanted Wagons to carry Provisions, and other necellaries, the Country People who were coming in with them, having been forced to return home, becaute of the diforders committed by the Militia raifed by the Palatine of Hungary, who live without any Order or Disciplines That for this reason General Caprara was obliged to continue in his Camp between Trenchin and Leopo fladt, on the Wasg. Levies are making in all the Emperor's Hereditary Countreys, to recruit the old Bodies that are on Foot, and it's faid Commissions will in few days be given out for the raifing of feveral new Regiments, The lite Governor of Cafebaw is dead; his accusation was, That that place was loft by his negleft, from whence to many ill accidents have fince refulted. Just now arrive Letters from Ge-neral Caprara of the first Instant, which fay, That Lieutenant-Colonel, Heyfler, being abroad with tooo Imperial Horse and Dragoons, had surpri-zed 1000 Foot and 200 Horse of the Rebels, had killed 300 of them upon the place, and had taken 45 Priloners, and 19 Colours; That the Prifoners reported that Count Teckeley had refolved to abandon Atfol, Newfol, Chremnitz, and other places in the Mountains ; and that the Turks and the Rebels were not leparated, as had been reported, but that the Vizier of Buda had, by realon of hisilinels, left the Army under a good Convoy, which had occalioned that report.

Francfort, Oltoh. 6. On the 28th paft the French Ambaliadors here prefented a Memorial to the Imperial Ambaffadors, and to the Deputies of the Impire, in which they declare, in the name of the King their Mailer, That his Majelty is willing to ftand to the Offers which he has made by his Minifer's for determining amicably his just Rights and Pretentions, till the faft day of November, ; but in case the laid Offers are not accepted before that eime, his Majefty will be at liberty to purfue his own fatisfaction in fuch manner as he fhall think fit: and the furth Initant the French Ambaffadors gave in another Memorial, by which they rian Froops, Commanded, by the Palatine of declare. Strayburg, Ollob: 9. The Marquils de Courten-vaux, Son to Monlieur de Louvoy, parted from hence the second Instant for Mentz, and the same day arrived here the Baron de Monchar, the French King's Lieutenant-General in Alface, but made no flay here. The French work with all possible ap-plication on the new Fortifications of this City, and on the Canal of Moltzbeym, and give out that they will have finished all these Works before Winter. Four Regiments of Horfe, drawn out of Friburg and Brifac, marched yefferday for Saverne, from whence they are to continue their March towards the Saar and Lorrain; and all the Horfe which, upon the breaking up of the Carrp at Lan-dam, were Quartered in the Villages in Alface, are to follow the 15th Inflant. From Francfort we have advice, That the French Ambasiadors have declared to those of the Emperor, That if the Offers his Majefly has made for the determining the differences between him and the Empire be not accepted before the last of the next Month, his Majelly will not, after that, be obliged to fland to the faid Offers,

Cologne, OEob. 9. On Friday laft it was known, that our Elector had refolved to admit of the Deputation, which the City of Liege will fend hither, upon condition that the faid Depu ies come not only from the Magiftrates, but from the Reopl, that to the Commonalty may not diapprove of what they shall do. And the fame day his Ele-choral Highness font to the Sieur Fodoci, the Imperial Minifter, to acquaint him with the Refolution he had taken, and to defire , him to give notice of it to the Magistrates at Lieg?, The Syndic of this City, which our Magistrates sent to the Directors of the Circle of Westphalia, is come, back, and has given the Magifirates an account, That the D'rectors of the faid Circle, have promifed to have 1000 Men ready for the Service of this City, and that they will cause them to March hither whenever our Magifirates shall defire it. We do not yet certainly hear when the Bilhop of Strasburg will be here. From Municke we have advice, That the Elector of Bavaria had held a general review of his Troops, and that he had reloaved to fend 8000 Mentoche affiftance of the Emperor a-gainst the Turks. Prom *Fienna* they writed That General Caprara was Encamped with the Imperial Army, between Trenchin and Leopolfadt, on the Waag; but that he would have removed from thence. and marched rowards the Enemy, had he not wa a ted Carriages, which the Country People had not brought in, being in as much fear of the Hunga-

Cologne, Oltob. 13. The Commonalty of this City, give our Magistrates frequent disturbances, and if a timely remedy be not applied, it's to be feared, they will at last bring us into great Disorders. The Count de Starenberg, Governor of Philipsburg, observing the Preparations the French make at Strasbourg, has put all the Country round Philipsburg under Water, and has made fuch other Provision for the fecurity of the Place, as to be out of Year of any Force whatfoever.

Bruffe s, Oflob. 13. His Excellency has been at Vilvord, which place he intends to fortifie, and to fettle a Manufacture of Cloth there, and for the encouragement thereof has granted the Inhabitants very great Priviledges. His Excellency having changed his refolution of going for Guelderland, went yefferday to Aeth, to Visit that Garifon, not having been there fince his coming to this Government: he is expected back this night or to morrow; and then our Maistre de Camp General will go and vifit Guelderland, Limburg, and Luxemburg; and as for this last place, his Excellency intends to have fo good a Garifon there, and the place to well furnified with Provisions, that if the French should attack it, or block it up, it may hold out a long time.

Bruffels, Ottob. 16. We have Letters from Lille, which give us an account? That the Mareschal d'Humieres is returned thither, and hath ordered all the old Troops that are Quartered in the new Conquests, with the Fuschiers on Horse-back, to March towards Lorrain, and the Franche Comte; and from Alface they write, That the Baron, de Monclar has commanded feveral Regiments from Frj. burg, Brifac; and other places in those parts, to march towards the Saar, and the Country of Chimay, which gives us apprehensions that the French are preparing for fome great defign on that file. Our Letters from Cologne tell µs, there is fome diforder in that City, occafioned by the differences between the Magistrates and the People. Our Spanish Letters of the first Instant, brought us little confi erable : The Bills of Exchange, which his Excellency expects, are promifed by the next, and they tell us, That the Marquils de Liebe has declined the Government of Naples, and that the Duke d'Uceda is made Viceroy of Galicia. Our Letters from *Vienna* give us an account, That the Imperial Troops had fallen upon a Detachment of the Turks and the Rebels; That they had killed 300 of them upon the place, and had taken eight Colours, which had been brought to *Figuna*; That the Emperor's Troops continued to march with all diligence for Hungary, and that the Emperor was going to raile feveral new Regiments?

Hague, Oftob. 13. The States-General having written to the Elector of Brandenburg concerning the affair of Orange, have received an answer from his Electoral-Highnels, who declares he is very much concerned at these Proceedings of the French, and that he will not be wanting to do whatever lics in him for the obtaining the Prince of Orange fatisfaction therein. From Hambarg they write, That the Dukes of Luneaburg do labour very carneftly to compose the differences between the King of Denmark and the Duke of Holflein, that to the ill confequences, which the March of the Darith Troops into Holftein to Winter there swill have, may be prevented. Off Friday laft arrived here

the Hoer Canterstein, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Sweden.

Paris, Oftob. 17. The 15th Inftant their Majefties arrived at Fontainbleau from Chambor, having been met by the Dauphin and Dauphinefs five or fix Miles from thence. Two days fince the Sieur du Bois, an Ecclesiastick, was seized, and carried to the Bajlile, for he fame caufe that feveral others are there for, viz. their speaking or writing against the late Declaration of the Clorgy. We have not of late had any particular account of th flate the prefent diff rences between our King and the Pope are in, but many apprchend they are as far from an accommodation as ever, and that things will at last come to extremiti s. It is believed Monfieur du Luesne is by this time arrived at Thoulon, from whence we have advice, That the Algierines have lately taken two Barks very fichly laden, belonging to Marfeilles.
