

Carlton-House, November 22, 1820.

This day the following Ambassadors and Ministers had audience of His Majesty, their Excellencies the Count de Lieven, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from the Emperor of All the Russias, the Baron Fagel, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from the King of the Netherlands, and His Highness Prince Esterhazy, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from the Emperor of Austria, to deliver letters from their Sovereigns; His Excellency the Duke de Frias and Nuda, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from the King of the Spains, to deliver his credentials as Minister Plenipotentiary from the Grand Duchess of Lucca; His Excellency the Duke de Cazes, Ambassador from His Most Christian Majesty, to deliver a letter; His Excellency Monsieur de Souza, Ambassador Extraordinary from the King of Portugal and the Brazils, to deliver his credentials and a letter of congratulation upon His Majesty's accession to the Throne; the Count de Bourke, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from the King of Denmark, to deliver his new credentials to His present Majesty; Baron Just, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from the King of Saxony, and Count de Ludolf, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from the King of the Kingdom of the Two Sicilies, to deliver letters from their Sovereigns. The above Ambassadors and Ministers were introduced to their respective audiences by Lord Viscount Castlereagh, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, and conducted by Sir Robert Chester, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.

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The King was this day pleased to confer the honour of Knighthood on Colonel Charles MacCarthy, Lyragh, Captain-General and Governor in Chief of Sierra Leone, and Colonel on the Staff commanding the Forces on the Western Coast of Africa.

THE following Addresses, having been transmitted to Viscount Sidmouth, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by the several persons whose names are respectively subjoined to each Address, were presented by His Lordship to His Majesty, who was pleased to receive the same very graciously:

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble and dutiful Address of the Corporation of Harwich.

May it please your Majesty,

TRUE to those sentiments of fidelity and attachment which have, for a series of past years, signalized this ancient Borough; the Mayor, Aldermen, and Capital Burgesses, in their collective and corporate capacity, presume to address your Majesty, and again to renew the assurances of their profound and affectionate regard for your august House and Person.

The fame of your Majesty's Royal Progenitor,

the many virtues which encircled and adorned his character, were but so many pledges that in his immediate Descendant and Successor, the first object of his anxious solicitude would be the preservation of external peace, and internal tranquillity.

On the assumption of the Regal character, your Majesty in the first exercise of authority, openly manifested such desire, and the voice of gratulation, which on that occasion was first heard in the center, struck upon the heart of every faithful subject, and was quickly reverberated from the remotest extremities of the empire.

Lawless and designing men have, however, since availed themselves of extrinsic and adventitious circumstances, and with unceasing vituperation sought to disturb your Majesty's repose, to deride your councils, to trample under foot our holiest institutions, and to undermine the fabric of our happy Constitution.

Enlinked with blasphemy, disloyalty dares to rear a shameless front, and under the feigned terms of reform in Parliament and melioration of Government, means only to level all orders among men, to dissolve the social compact, destroy the grand palladium of British freedom, and to institute in their stead a reign of terror and confusion.

That the upright and energetic measures of that council which now surrounds your Majesty may have their due effect in repressing every violation of our laws; that the administrative and executive departments of the State may retain their lofty superiority over their adversaries, and that your Majesty's reign may be happy, long, and glorious, is the ardent prayer of this incorporate body.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

The dutiful, unanimous, and loyal Address of the Mayor, Jurats, and Common Councilmen of the Town and Port of Dover, in the County of Kent, in Common Council assembled.

May it please your Majesty,

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Mayor, Jurats, and Common Councilmen of the ancient and loyal Town and Port of Dover, beg leave to renew to your Majesty our assurances of fidelity to your Majesty's Person, and of firm and unalterable attachment to our invaluable Constitution.

We feel ourselves imperiously called upon at this juncture to make an open and fearless avowal of our determination to rally round the Throne, and to maintain and uphold by every means in our power the Constitution in Church and State, as by law established.

The vile and infamous arts and machinations of a disloyal and desperate faction, which aided by the unbridled licentiousness of an unprincipled and profligate press, exerted with an activity hitherto
