

unparalleled, (and we fear with too much success) to seduce the people from their allegiance, to eradicate from their minds all moral and religious feelings, all love for the Constitution, all reverence for the laws, and to bring into contempt the Judges of the Land and the Magistracy in general, call aloud on every loyal and well disposed man in the Kingdom to unite with a firm and determined spirit in frustrating designs which can gather strength only from supineness and apathy on the part of the well affected.

We place the firmest reliance on the vigour and promptitude of your Majesty's Government to defeat the traitèrous attempts of these enemies to our land, and we have the fullest confidence on the Royal promise made by your Majesty on ascending the Throne of this Realm, "that your Majesty would maintain unimpaired, the religion, the laws and the liberties of the Empire."

We indulge the most sanguine hopes and expectations, that the present delusion will be quickly dispelled, and that those who have been misled will again feel the great and only safeguard of their own happiness and of the prosperity of the country, to be a strict adherence to that precept of our holy Religion, whereby we are enjoined to "fear God and honour the King."

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Bailiffs and Burgesses of the Town and County of the Town of Southampton.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Mayor, Bailiffs and Burgesses of the Town and County of the Town of Southampton, humbly beg leave to renew our assurances of the firmest attachment to your Royal Person and Government, at a moment in which wicked and factious men are striving by every art of malice and falsehood to pervert the minds and alienate the hearts of your faithful people.

Impressed as we are, with the utmost conviction, that we cannot hope for happiness or safety as a nation but by obedience to that divine law which enjoins submission to the constituted authorities under which we live, we solemnly assure your Majesty of our determination to support, by every means in our power, the religion, laws and government of our country.

We humbly implore that your Majesty will not authorise your official servants to reagitae a question which can only tend to alienate the affections of your dutiful and loyal subjects.

And we earnestly pray that your Majesty may long reign in the hearts of a grateful and affectionate people as the guardian, under heaven, of these invaluable blessings to us and our children.
