Strasburg, Offob. 16. On Tuesday last the Marquifs de Courtenvaux returned hither from Mentz, where he had been to confer with that Elector concerning the prefent affairs; he will remain here this Month, and then intends to go to Francfort. Our Governor the Marquifs de Chamilly, has obtained leave from Court to be absent two Months from his Government, to look after his private Affairs. The Sleur de la Grange, Intendant of Allace, arrived here two days fince, and yesterday he began to affign Winter-Quarters for feveral Re-giments of Horfe in this Country, from whence fome Troops are to march for Burgunds, and others are to come from thence hither in their flead.

Cologne; Oflob. 13. The Saturday laft we received an account from Liege, That the French Refident had, on the eighth Inflant, delivered to the Magi-firates of that Ofly, a Letter from the French King, and at the fame time had told them by word of mouth, That the Elector of Cologne having be bught the King his Mafter to interpole his Offices, and even his Royal Authority, in order to oblige the City of Liege to give him jult fatisfaction, his Majelty had commanded him the faid Relident to let them know, That he defired the differences they had with his Electoral Highnels may be speedly accommodated, and that, for that purpole, they would forthwith fend Deputies to Co ogne, who might addtels themfelves directly to his Electoral Highness, through the Interposition of the Bishop of Straburg, and Monsieur Tambomeau, the French Minister theres the faid Refident adding, That the King's inter-tion was not to deprive them of their antient Pr = viledges, but to procure them a reafonable accommodation.
