

Highness expects the Deputies of the said City: At the same time the Sieur Fodoci, the Imperial Minister, has received an assurance from the Magistrates of Liege, that they will not do any thing to the prejudice of the Emperor's Mediation. The French Troops that are in Alsace, have Orders to March for Flanders, and those in Flanders are to March for Alsace, where 5000 Horse are to Winter. We have advice from Hungary, That Count Teckley was gone with 4000 Men towards Lepents, with design, as was believed, to make himself Master of that place: That two Regiments belonging to Count Teckley arrived the fourth Instant in the Imperial Camp, and delivered a Letter to General Caprara, by which Count Teckley desired a Pass, and a Convoy for his Cavalry, Lyons, and his Secretary, whom he would send to the Imperial Court to Treat of a Cessation of Arms; That General Caprara had sent this Letter by an Express to the Emperor, to let his Orders thereupon, and in the mean time kept the said Regiments under a good Guard. The 1<sup>st</sup> of the 2<sup>d</sup>, That the Turks were forming a Camp between *Jewbusek* and *Gomorra*.

*Hague Octob. 27.* The Herr Borgaert is arrived here in the quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Denmark; and thereupon the Sieur Petticum, who has been several years here with that Character, has taken his leave of the States in order to his return home. We are told that a Marriage is treating between Prince Casimir, Ssadholder of *Friseland* and *Groningen*, and the Daughter of the Count de *Roye* in *France*.

*Paris, Octob. 28.* The Court will continue at Fontainebleau till the 14<sup>th</sup> or 15<sup>th</sup> of the next Month, and we are told that the King, at his late being at *Chambor*, was so well pleased with the place, that he has resolved to finish his Buildings there, and has assigned a Fond of 500 thousand Livres for that Expence. Our last Letters from *Turin* gave us a very good account of the Duke of *Savoy's* Health; and here it is reported, That an Offensive and Defensive Alliance is concluded between our King and that Duke, and that his Highness is obliged by it to furnish Winter-Quarters for the Troops which the King shall send beyond the Mountains. The Affairs between this Court and *Rome* are more embroiled than ever; and among other things it is said, the Pope is much offended that our King (as he is informed) allows and countenances the Hungarian Rebels; and it is also said that his Majesty will send the Bishop of *Strasbourg* to *Rome* to remove the Impressions which the Pope has taken concerning the affairs of *Hungary*. Several Bales of Books, asserting the Pope's Authority, were lately seized here, and divers Ecclesiasticks, and others, suspected to be concerned therein, have since been imprisoned, and were three days since, Father *Preilly*, a man highly esteemed here, was made a Prisoner on the same account. Monsieur *Bazin*, an Ambassador from this Court to the King of *Sweden*, is returning home because he could not obtain to be received at his publick Entry and Audience in the manner he desired, and that he said he found that Court in no disposition to enter into any measures with our Crown. The Formalities at *Strasbourg*, and other places in *Alsace*, are carried on with all possible diligence, and 190 thousand Crowns a Week are sent thither for that Service.

*Whitehal, Octob. 20.* Having received the following Letter from Sir *William Paterson*, one of the Clerks of His Majesties Privy-Council of Scotland, we are Ordered to Publish the same.

HIS Majesties Privy Council here, taking notice of a scandalous Libel, published Weekly at London, by one singly artiss, under the Specious name of the True Prot. Fant Mercury, which is ordinarily stuffed with many and notorious Lyes and Calumnies upon the Administration of the Government of this Kingdom, and particularly of his Mercury, Numb. 182. of the Date, Saturday September 30: In the first Paragraph whereof he most maliciously charges His Majesties Privy-Council, and indeed the whole Government, of unparalleled Severities, against the Nonconforming khanatics, as if the steady, uniform, and gentle putting of the wholesome Laws of the Kingdom in a moderate Execution, against such as withdraw from the publick Worship of God in their Parish Churches, were Violence and Oppression. Sir, by the Blessing of God upon the endeavours of His Majesties Judicatures and Servants here, Conventicles are quite suppressed, and the Government finds daily the advantage of Punishing the Authors of our unreasonable Schism, most of the poor seduced People being now absolutely reduced to their Duty to God and the King, and to their Attendance on the publick Worship, by the late Regular Course taken by the Government here. This, by Command of His Majesties Privy-Council, is directed to you to be Published in the Authorized London Gazette, for Satisfaction of His Majesties good Subjects in England, some whereof may perhaps be imposed upon by this Infamous Libeller Curtis.
