THE following Addresses, having been transmitted to Viscount Sidmouth, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by the several persons whose names are respectively subjoined to each Address, were presented by His Lordship to His Majesty, who was pleased to receive the same very graciously:

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Bishop, Dean and Chapter, Archdencon and Clergy of the Diocese of Ely.

SIRE.

WE, your Majesty's most loyal and dutiful subjects, the Bishop, Dean and Chapter, Archdeacon and Clergy of the Diocese of Ety, feel ourselves particularly cailed upon to avow our firm and unshaker attachment to your Royal Person and Government at this crisis, when, in defiance of every loyal, moral and religious principle, desperate and designing men, aided by a licentious press, are using their utmost efforts to excite and diffuse throughout the kingdom a spirit of insubordination and disaffection.

We, Sir, have not so soon forgotten, nor can we ever forget, from what dangers this country has been rescued, and to what an unexampled height of honour and glory it has been raised under your Majesty's auspicious rule; and in proportion to our gratitude for benefits received, so will be our endeavours to uphold and support that Government from which (under Providence), these benefits have been derived After having witnessed the dreadful calamities in which a neighbouring country has been involved, it might have been supposed that while these revolutionary horrors were still fresh in our remembrance, we could have nothing to apprehend from any attempts of a similar description; but we can no longer indulge so pleasing an expectation, when we observe the unceasing efforts which are made to propagate systems of infidelity and immorality, when we remark the rancorous malignity with which the constituted Authorities of the realm are vilified, and the insolent attacks which are made upon every venerable and sacred insti-

tution. Most deeply, Sir, do we regret that the high and moral character of the nation, without-which all human laws and restraints are inefficient, should have been thus degraded

In this hour of "trouble, rebuke and blasphemy," we consider it our bounden duty to endeavour, by every means in our power, to stem the torrent of impiety and disloyalty. We therefore beg leave to assure your Majesty that no exertion shall be wanting, on our parts, to disseminate such principles as may best tend to counteract these evils, and to inculcate with all possible earnestness the truly Christian doctrine, "fear God, and honour the King."

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Parishes of Kirby-moorside and Helmsley, in the North Riding of Yorkshire.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, being principal Inhabitants of the Parishes of Kirbymoorside and Helmsley, and their Vicinity, consider it our duty, at this crisis of difficulty and peril, to approach your Majesty with the greatest humility, and to offer our earnest assurances of attachment to your Royal Person and Government, and to the Religion and Laws of our country.

Impressed with veneration for our civil and religious establishments, we cannot but observe, with the deepest concern, the unparalleled efforts of the unprincipled and disaffected that are daily employed to withdraw the unwary from allegiance to their Sovereign, with a view ultimately to disorganize and overthrow our justly admired Constitution. For this base purpose, calumnies of the most mischievous tendency have been directed against all the constituted Authorities of the realm: the Parliament, the Courts of Judicature, the Altar and the Throne have alike been the objects of profligate abuse and insulting derision

We feel, Sire, that with a view of frustrating the mischievous designs of the infatuated and seditious, it becomes the bounder duty of your Majesty's

faithful and loyal subjects at once to come forward and avow their determination to support the principles of the British Constitution, to rally round the Throne, and to guard the Religion and Laws of

the country from outrage and insult.

We therefore, Sire, are most anxious to testify to the country at large, our resolution to defend the Monarchy as well as all the other branches of the Constitution, and to our utmost endeavour, under the sanction of the laws, to transmit to posterity the blessings which we have derived from the wisdom and bravery of our ancestors.

We pray that your Majesty, as the legitimate source of authority, may long continue, in peace and happiness, to be the guardian of our liberties and laws; and that we may be ever impressed with a due sense of the blessings we enjoy under your Majesty's mild and paternal Government.

The Declaration of the Inhabitants of Wolverhampton, December 13, 1820.

WE, the undersigned Clergymen, Gentlemen, Mcrchants, Manufacturers and other Inhabitants of the Town of Wolverhampton, viewing with deep regret and abhorrent indignation, the Throne, the Altar, and all the constituted Authorities assailed by the turbulent and factious, and insulted by the most seditious and blasphemous publications ever issued from a profligate and licentious press, misleading the ignorant and inciting the lawless to acts of violence and destruction, feel it our duty unequivocally to declare that we are attached by the strongest ties of gratitude and unalterable affection to His Majesty's most sacred Person; that we will strenuously oppose, by every means in our power, the dangerous designs of the seditious and disaffected against all the ancient and valuable institutions of the Government; that we will unite our firmest energies to insure the peace and security of the Realm, the stability of the Throne, the blessings of our established Religion, and the perpetuity of our unrivalled Constitution; and we do resolve, that the Members for the County be requested to transmit the above declaration to the Right Hon-ourable Lord Viscount Sidmouth, one of His Majesty's principal Secretaries of State, beseeching him to convey to His Majesty the sentiments contained herein, in the way he shall deem most proper.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

WE, your Majesty's loyal subjects, Gentlemen, Clergy and Inhabitants of Blandford, in the County of Dorset, and its Neighbourhood, beg to approach your Majesty with this assurance of our unaltered attachment to your Majesty's Throne and Government.

To be silent in cases of impending national danger, is in some degree to be criminal; and now that infidelity and sedition are no longer confined to the closets of speculative men, but have become almost the watchwords of the populace; now that they stalk abroad and force their way into the cot-

tages of the poor, stirring them up to disloyalty and irreligion, we feel it necessary thus publicly to declare our sentiments, and to enter our protest against the nefarious arts by which our most sa-

cred institutions are endangered.

We are aware that the strength of the designing increases with the supineness of the loyal, and therefore while wicked men leave no artifice untried to accomplish their object, it becomes doubly incumbent on the loyal and well disposed part of your Majesty's subjects to emulate their zeal though in a better cause, to rally round the Altar and the Throne, and to pledge themselves to the most strenuous and effective support of such measures as are now imperiously requisite for checking the growing evil.

At this crisis we rely on the wisdom of your Majesty's Councils, and we presume to express a hope that they will meet with suitable energy the exigences of the times, and thus afford a pledge that, under the Divine blessing, we may be enabled to transmit unimpaired to our posterity that admirable Constitution which provides at once for the liberty of the subject, the dignity of the Throne,

and the honour of God.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's faithful subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common Council of the Borough of King's Lynn, in the County of Norfolk, in Council assembled, beg permission to approach your Throne with sentiments of the most perfect loyalty and attachment to your Royal Person, and to the illustrious House of Brunswick.

With hearts warmly glowing for the honour and prosperity of our country, and with every sentiment of faithful devotion to your Majesty, we fervently hope that your Majesty may long continue the Constitutional King of a free and loyal people.

We grieve to add that our invaluable right of petitioning the Throne and the Legislature in public meeting, has been abused by frequent assemblies of the people, for purposes in which no good subjects could join, and from which men of the soundest judgment and highest character were excluded, by their unwillingness to subject themselves o the certain insult offered to all who oppose popular clamour. Public meetings can therefore no longer be respected as conveying a legitimate expression of the general voice; they are convened and mul-tiplied at the pleasure of factious demagogues as convenient occasions for diffusing political poison among the multitude, and for overawing all the measures of Government. Although our minds are duly impressed with this view of the state of the country, we beg leave to express our conviction that your Majesty's ancient Borough of Leeds still abounds in loyal hearts, glowing with sincere attachment to your Majesty's Person, and to assure your Majesty that we are animated with a strong resolve to defend our Sovereign, and the invaluable blessings of our glorious Constitution, against all opposers.

Proceed, Sire, firm in the love of your faithful subjects, to confound the malice of your enemies, by a prudent, vigilant, and constitutional administration of the high duties of the Crown; and may the Almighty long preserve and protect your Majesty with his favourable kindness, and bless your Majesty's Government to the prosperity and happiness of a loyal people. Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's faithful subjects, the Bailiff, Jurats and Commonalty of the Town and Corporation of Lydd, with the Vicar and other principal Inhabitants, humbly beg leave to lay at the foot of your Throne the unfeigued expressions of our attachment to your Majesty's sacred Person and duti-

ful obedience to your Government.

Your Majesty's never-to-be-forgotten declaration, at your accession to the Throne, that you would tread in the steps of your Royal Father, is to us an ample pledge and security that we shall remain in undisturbed possession of those blessings we have so long enjoyed under the auspices of your illustrious House, together with the maintenance of that Constitution which, by the Providence of God, has raised this kingdom and nation to a height of prosperity, power and glory unparalleled, we believe, in the annals of the world. Under such circumstances we humbly conceive it to be the duty of the inhabitants not only of every county and populous town and city, but of every village, however inconsiderable, to stand forward at the present crisis with an open declaration of their abhorrence of all such pernicious principles and practices, and of unshaken loyalty to your

Majesty's Throne and Government.

And we feel confident that the general voice thus pronounced would be more than sufficient to drown the clamours of faction, and utterly to discomfit the machinations of the enemies of your Throne and of your Majesty's loyal subjects.

That your Majesty may long live to reign, as you now do, in the hearts of a free and loyal people we offer up our fervent prayers to the

Almighty Disposer of all events, and that He w is be mercifully pleased to avert every thing which may tend, in the remotest degree, to disturb the public tranquility or affect your Majesty's personal prosperity and happiness.
