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Stockholme, October 13.

THe departure of Monsieur *Bajen*, the French Ambassador from hence, upon the difference he had with this Court, concerning the Ceremonial of his publick Entry and Audience, has been the subject of much Discourse; and the more, because of the long and strict Friendship that has been between these 2 Crowns, in which there seems now a Breach to be made. Yesterday the meeting of the States of this Kingdom, was Proclaimed in the principal Streets of this City, by a Herald at Arms, accompanied by Six Trumpets and two Kettle-Drums. The Nobility, Gentry, Clergy, Burghers, and Peasants, which compose the States, are in the first place to deliver in their Commissions, and to enrol their Names; and that being done, the King will appoint the day of their meeting, which it's believed will be on Monday next; And in the mean time, his Majesty has named Baron *Fabian Wrede*, to be Land-Marshal, that is, Speaker, or President, in the Assembly of the Nobility and Gentry. Here is arrived an Envoy from the Dukes of *Lunenbourg*, he comes to Compliment their Majesties upon the Birth of the Prince; but it's believed he has likewise Instructions concerning the present Differences between the King of *Denmark*, and Duke of *Holstein*. The Sieur *Brandt*, the *Brandenburg* Envoy, talks already of returning home.

Genova, Octob. 14. There have not arrived any Ships here this Week from the Westward, but from the *Levant* is come in the *Friends-Adventure* Ketch. The *Blossome*, bound for *Legborne*, and the *Advice*, for *Sibra*, are now in Port. The *Unity* Sailed, five days since, for *Tabarca*. We have advice of Monsieur *du Quesne's* arrival at *Toulon*, and that he had found Orders there to return to Sea again, and to stand over for *Tripoly* and *Tunis*, and afterwards to go in search of the *Algerines* that are abroad. Here is a discourse that an Offensive and Defensive Alliance is concluded between the French King and the Duke of *Savoy*, which if true, will give this State great jealousy.

Vitna, Octob. 18. On Wednesday last, their Imperial Majesties returned higher from *Ebersdorf*, and on Thursday, arrived hese two Deputies from Count *Teckley*, who come to propose a Cessation of Arms; which many believe the Emperor will agree to. Yesterday arrived hese Count *Paisi* from *Hungary*, who brought an account; that the Rebels have ysted *Absol*, *Neufol*, *Schemnitz*, and *Cremnitz*; And that the Imperial Army under the command of General *Captara*, continues encamped within three Leagues of *Traschim*, on the *Weng*. There are Letters from *Hungary*, which say, That the *Turks* make great preparations against Spring.

Count *Martiniz*, whom the Emperor is sending to the Pope, and several Princes of *Italy*, to demand their assistance against the *Turks*, will part from hence in few days.

Strasburg, Octob. 23. On Monday last arrived here the Bishop of *Strasburg* from *Saverne*, and yesterday he parted again from hence, for *Cologne*. The Cavalry which was quartered in *Brigaw*, *Sungaw*, and the upper *Alsace*, are marching towards *Flanders*. Six Thousand Men work on the Fortifications of this City, the Citadel, and the Fort of *Kiel*.

Cobligne, Octob. 27. Monsieur *Tambonneau*, the French Envoy, had, the 22 Instant, an Audience of our Elector, whom, as we are informed, he acquainted, That he had received Orders from the King his Master to desire his Electoral Highness will declare, whether, in case things should come to a Rupture between the Emperor and his Master, his Electoral Highness will give the Imperial Troops, and those of the Allies, Winter-Quarters; to which his Electoral Highness has not as yet returned any Answer, and it is said he is not at all pleased with the Proposition. The Bishop of *Strasburg* will be here the next Week, but we do not yet know what we are to expect the Deputies of *Liege*. From *Vienna* we have advice, That the 15th Instant arrived there two Deputies from Count *Teckley*; That they have Instructions to Negotiate a Cessation of Arms, and to offer the restitution of the Berg-Towns, from whence the Emperor draws a yearly Revenue of 200 thousand Florins; and that these Deputies never speak of Count *Teckley*, but in the stile of their Master, and Prince of *Hungary*; and the Letters from *Vienna* of the 18th Instant, say, That there was great appearance that the Emperor will agree to the said Cessation.

Brussels, Octob. 27. Yesterday parted hence Monsieur *del Val*, being sent by our Governor, the Marquis *de Grana*, to the Court of *France*, to endeavour to obtain a prolongation of the Term, which the most Christian King has limited to the 20th of the next Month; and in the mean time his Excellency is not wanting to do what lies in him for the putting these Countries into a posture of defence. His Excellency does very much hasten the Fortifications at *Niword*, the care of which is left to some of the States of this Province. The Letters we received yesterday from *Cologne* give an account, That the French Minister there had desired to know of his Electoral Highness, whether in case of a Rupture between the Emperor and the said King, his Electoral Highness will grant Winter-Quarters to the Troops of his Imperial Majesty, or his Allies.

Brussels, Octob. 30. We are with great impatience expecting the success of Monsieur *del Val's* Negotiation at *Paris*, because of the Importance of it to these Countreys, for we hear the French are making great preparations; and that in case the French King has not satisfaction upon his late Declaration, before the Term therein limited ex-
