

all the Officers that belonged to the Mincs. And they write, That the Governor of *Zamar*, which place was blockt up by the *Transylvanians*, has concluded with them a Suspension of Arms with regard to that place, for two Months. We are assured that the Emperor has resolved to raise six new Regiments, and that his Imperial Majesty has sent new and positive Orders to the Nobility and Gentry of *Hungary* to mount on Horseback, and to joyn their Palatine, the Count of *Esterhazy*, at such place as he shall appoint.

Cologne, Octob. 3. We are still expecting the Bishop of *Strasbourg*, whom our Magistrates intend to receive with great Respects. We have Letters from *Frankfort* of the 28th past, but they do not bring any thing of moment.

Hague, Nov. 3. The Prince of *Orange* continuing at *Saeftdyke*, the Deputies of the States are gone thither to consult his Highness in some matters before them. The Sicur *Pettecum* the Danish Minister is likewise gone thither to take his leave of his Highness. Here is an Envoy from the Czars of *Moscow*, who comes to notify the death of the late Czar, and the Accession of the two Princes that now Reign, to that Crown, and from hence he is to go with the same Commission for *England*.

Maidstone, Oct. 27. His Majesty having been graciously pleased, upon the surrender that was made by this Corporation of their Charter, to grant them a new Charter, the same was brought hither this day, being met at some distance from the Town by many Gentlemen of the County, and the most considerable of our Inhabitants, making above 300 Horse, who marched to the usual place of Electing our Mayors, where the Charter being opened and read, the new Mayor was sworn; which done, the Company was entertained at a very noble Dinner, and the day concluded with several Volleys of the Trained Bands, who were in Arms, with Ringing of Bells, Bonfires, and all other expressions of a general joy and satisfaction.

London, Octob. 27. This Morning Sir *William Prichard*, Elected Lord Mayor for the year ensuing, the Recorder, Aldermen, and Sheriffs of this City, attended His Majesty at *Whitehal*, according to the Order they had received from the Lord Chancellor of *England* the day before. And the Recorder presented the Lord Mayor Elect to his Majesty, and humbly prayed, in the name of the Citizens of *London*, his Royal Approbation of him; Mr. Recorder making a very Loyal Speech, and appositive to the occasion. His Majesty was pleased to answer, *That they had made choice of a Person to be their Lord Mayor, of whose Loyalty and Affection to the Established Government, and Ability to discharge that great Office, He was well assured, and that He did approve of him.* And at the same time His Majesty was pleased to declare the particular satisfaction he had in the Administration of Sir *John Moore* their present Lord Mayor, and his Gracious Acceptance of his vigilancy and pains in the course of his Mayoralty.

Whitehal, Octob. 26. His Majesty has been pleased to confer the Office of Lord Privy-Seal upon the Right Honourable the Marquis of *Hallifax*, who received yesterday the Seal from His Majesty.

Brecon, Octob. 20. This day were apprehended here two persons, suspected to be notorious Burglars and Robbers; the one about 35 years of age, something tall, slender bodied, long faced, his hair smooth, and of a light brown, his upper Coat of stuff, lined with red, and had a Leather Waistcoat with Silver Lace on it: He had a case of good Holster-Pistols in his Breeches, with a Silver Plate on the Stock of each of them, engraven. He had a Silver Cup, marked *A. P. M.* and rode on a grey Mare, about 13 hands high, and says his name is *John Smith*. The other went by the name of *Thomas Williams*, is a strong set man, of a middle Stature, about 28 years old, had on a Stuff Riding-Coat, with Loops, Lined with Red, and a black Cloath Cap, with Silver-Lace on it: He had a Case of Holster-Pistols, with *R. Silke* engraven on the Plate of the Lock. He confessed his breaking out of *Monmouth* Goal, where he was for Stealing two Mares, &c.

At a Court of Assistants, held at Goldsmiths-Hall, on the 22 day of September, 1682. The Clerk of the said Company will be ready to give all persons Receipts for the said Plate they shall send into the Hall.

It was likewise ordered at a Court of Assistants, held at Goldsmiths-Hall on the 21 of October, 1682. That all persons that bought any Wares, made of Gold or silver, at *Tunbridge*, being worse than Standard, are desired to send the said Wares, and the Name of the Seller to Goldsmiths-Hall, in order to the Prosecution of the Seller.
