To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

At a Meeting of Merchants, Bankers, Traders and others of London, held at the City of London Tavern on Thursday the 11th of January 1821, Sir Robert Wigram, Bart. in the Chair, the following Declaration was unanimously adopted.

WE, the undersigned Merchants, Bankers, Traders and others of London, feel ourselves imperiously called upon, in the present state of the country, to declare these our deliberate sentiments, earnestly and anxiously hoping that the evils which threaten us will, under Divine Providence, be averted, and that now, when no foreign enemy assails us, we may be permitted to enjoy, uninterruptedly, the blessings of peace.

We declare it to be our firm and unalterable purpose to uphold our venerable and happy Constitu-tion, composed of King, Lords, and Commons, against all and every attempt to alter or subvert it, and to maintain in all its purity our holy and revered religion, feeling the most assured conviction that the greatest share of human happiness is to be derived from the one, and the best and strongest hopes of eternal felicity from the other.

We view with poignant regret and abhorrence the measures which abound to destroy these sources of present enjoyment and future consolation, and we trust the laws will be enforced to deter and to punish all who by their factious or blasphemous proceedings wish to deprive the subjects of this great and free country of these inestimable blessings; blessings handed down to us by our ances-

and happiness of the generations which are to follow us.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty. SÌRE,

WE, your Majesty's most faithful subjects, the undersigned Inhabitants of the County of Somerset, whose names have not been subscribed to any of the Addresses recently transmitted to the Office of your Majesty's Principal Secretary of State, from either of the Citics, Towns or Districts of the said County, now presume to offer to your Majesty the homage of our zealous attachment to your Majesty's sacred Person, and to the Throne and Constitution of the United Kingdom.

And in thus enlisting ourselves, we entertain a full and perfect conviction (a conviction, which we humbly intreat your Majesty to cherish in common with us,) that we shall be supported by all the good, the reflecting, the sober and the intelligent, that is to say, by the virtual majority of the nation. Deeply sensible tors, cherished by the wise and virtuous of our own that their liberty and property is one with the seen-time, and, in our minds, suited to the welfare rity of the State, and that the genuine principles of Constitution, will ever be best guaranteed by the cere assurances of attachment to your Royal Person equitable administration of its laws, they will be little disposed to exchange, for a crude and untried system, the blessing of a Government which has borne triumphantly the test of time, and is justly the admiration of the civilized world.

That our existing laws embrace, in their provident and extensive range, every essential provision to assure to the subject the plenitude of a Briton's liberty and birthright, we have the fullest confidence; were it otherwise, we should look for the remedy, rather to the great national Councils which our Constitution recognises, than to the dogmas of an unprincipled faction, and assemblies where distress lends a too willing ear to the nostrums and imposture of seditious demagogues.

That your Majesty may long enjoy the blessing of a prosperous reign, and that such of your subjects as have been led astray from their duties, may be speedily brought back into "ways of pleasant-ness and paths of peace"—our fervent prayers are directed to the Throne of Him "by whom Kings

reign and Princess decree justice."

GEORGE, R.

WHEREAS His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His late Majesty King George the Third, was pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing date the twentieth day of November one thousand eight hundred and nineteen, to declare His Royal will and pleasure, that the Governors or Deputy Governors of Gibraltar and Malta should be authorised to issue Mediterranean Passes for the protection of ships belonging to His said late Majesty's subjects in those possessions, according to a certain form therein referred to, marked (C), under and subject to certain regulations and sureties therein set forth; and whereas doubts have arisen as to the term during which it was intended that the said Passes should remain in force; We taking the premises into Our Royal consideration, and judging it necessary to remove such doubts, have thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation, and We do hereby declare, that the Passes to be issued by Our Governors or Deputy Governors of Our said possessions of Gibraltar and Malta for the protection of ships or vessels belonging to Our subjects in Our said possessions, according to the form (C), and under the conditions set forth in the beforementioned Proclamation of the twentieth of November one thousand eight hundred and nineteen, shall be and continue in force for one year from the day on which the same shall respectively be issued, and no louger; and that at the expiration of that term, the said Passes shall be delivered up to the said Governors or Deputy Governors for the purpose of being cancelled, as required by the said Proclamation of the twentieth of November one ; sousand eight hundred and nineteen.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS the time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the twenty-ninth of May last, for prohibiting the exportation of gun-powder, arms, or ammunition, to the places therein specified, will expire on the thirtieth day of this instant November; and whereas it is expedient, that the said prohibition should be continued for some time longer; His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, doth hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no person or persons whatsoever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's service) do, at any time during the space of six months (to commence from the thirtieth day of this instant November), presume to transport any gun-powder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, to any port or place within the dominions of the King of Spain, or to any port or place on the Coast of Africa, or in the West Indies, or on any part of the Continent " America (except to a port or place, or ports or places in His Majesty's territories or possessions on the Continent of North America, or in the territories of the United States of America), or ship or lade any gun-powder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, on board any ship or vessel, in order to transporting the same into any such ports or places within the dominions of the King of Spain, or into any such ports or places on the Coast of Africa, or in the West Indies, or on the Continent of America (except as above excepted), without leave or permission in that behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring and suffering the respective forfeitures and penalties inflicted by an Act, passed in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Second, intituled "An Act to empower His " Majesty to prohibit the exportation of gunpowder, or any sort of arms or ammunition, and also to empower His Majesty to restrain " the carrying coastwise of salt-petre, gun-powder, or any sort of arms or ammunition;" and also by an Act, passed in the thirty-third year of His late Majesty's reign, cap. 2, intituled "An Act to " enable His Majesty to restrain the exportation " of naval stores, and more effectually to prevent the exportation of salt-petre, arms, and ammu-" nition, when prohibited by Proclamation or " Order in Council:'

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Com-missioners for executing the Office of Lord High twenty-second day of November one thousand Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THEREAS by an Act, passed in the first year of the reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act to continue until the fifth day of " July one thousand eight hundred and twenty-five, " an Act of the fifty-seventh year of His late Ma-" jesty, for regulating the trade and commerce to " and from the Cape of Good Hope, and for regu-" lating the trade of the Island of Mauritius;" His Majesty is authorised, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, by any Order or Orders to be issued from time to time, to give such directions, and to make such regulations touching the trade and commerce to and from all islands, colonies, or places, and the territories and dependencies thereof, to His Majesty belonging, or in His possession, in Africa, or Asia to the eastward of the Cape of Good Hope (excepting only the possessions of the East India Company), as to His Majesty in Council, shall appear most expedient and salutary, any thing contained in an Act, passed in the twelfth year of the reign of His Majesty King Charles the Second, intituled "An Act for the encouraging and increas-ing of shipping and navigation," or in an Act, passed in the seventh and eighth years of the reign of His Majesty King William the Third, intituled An Act for preventing frauds, and regulating abuses in the plantation trade," or any other Act or Acts of Parliament now in force, relating to His Majesty's colonies and plantations, or any other Act or Acts of Parliament, law, usage or custom to the contrary in any wise notwithstanding; and whereas by virtue of the powers granted by the above recited Act of the fifty-seventh year of His late Majesty, an Order in Council was passed on the twenty-eighth of May one thousand eight hundred and nineteen, for regulating the trade of the Island of Mauritius, with states in amity with His Majesty, on the conditions therein set forth; His Majesty is pleased to direct that the said Order be and the same is hereby revoked; and His Majesty is further pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the date of this present Order, British vessels arriving at any port of the Island of Mauritius, or its dependencies, from any country in amity with His Majesty, laden with any articles of the growth, production, or manufacture of such country (excepting all articles composen of cotton, iron, steel, or wool of foreign manufacture), shall be permitted to enter and land their cargoes, and dispose of the same in the said ports, subject to such duties as may be there payable thereon;

And it is further ordered, that British vessels arriving as aforesaid, shall be permitted to export to any such foreign country in amity with His Majesty, cargoes consisting of any articles of the growth, production, or manufacture of the Island of Mauritius, or its dependencies, or of any other articles which shall have been legally imported there, on payment of such duties as may be payable thereon:
