The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board, a Memorial from the Commissioners for discovering the Longitude at Sea, in the words following, viz.

“ WHEREAS by an Act of the fifty-eighth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled “ An Act for more effectually discovering the Longitude at Sea, and encouraging attempts to find a Northern Passage between the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans, and to approach the Northern Pole;” and by another Act of the present session of Parlia-

ment, to amend the said Act, it is provided, that for the encouragement of persons who may attempt the said Passage, or approach to the Northern Pole, but not wholly accomplish the same; we, the Commissioners for discovering the Longitude at Sea, may by our Memorial propose to your Majesty in Council, to direct and establish proportionate rewards to be paid to such person as aforesaid, who shall first have accomplished certain proportions of the said Passage or Approach :

And whereas it appears that the progress of discovery has already advanced on the Northern Coast of North America, and within the Arctic Circle, as far as 113 degrees of West Longitude, or thereabouts, from Greenwich; but has not arrived Northward, according to any well authenticated accounts, so far as 81 degrees of North Latitude :

We, your Memorialists, beg leave most humbly to represent these particulars for your Majesty's consideration, and to submit, with all humility, whether your Majesty may not be graciously pleased to establish the following scale of rewards, to be allotted according to the intentions of the said Acts :

- 1.—To the first ship belonging to any of your Majesty's subjects, or to your Majesty, that shall reach the Longitude of 130° West from Greenwich, by sailing within the Arctic Circle - - - £5,000
- To the first ship as aforesaid, that shall reach the Longitude of 150° West from Greenwich, by

sailing within the Arctic Circle, a further sum of - - - £5,000

To the first ship as aforesaid, that shall reach the Pacific Ocean by a North West Passage, the further sum of - - - £10,000

2.—To the first ship as aforesaid, that shall reach to 83° of North Latitude - - - £1,000

To 85°, a further sum of - £1,000

To 87°, a further sum of - £1,000

To 88°, a further sum of - £1,000

To 89°, or beyond, a further sum of - - - £1,000

And if your Majesty should graciously approve these proposals, we further, with all humility, submit whether your Majesty would not be pleased, by your Order in Council, to revoke, cancel, and annul His late Majesty's Order in Council, of the nineteenth March one thousand eight hundred and nineteen, establishing the scale of rewards therein contained, for the accomplishment of certain proportions of the said Passage or Approach."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve thereof; and His Majesty doth hereby establish the scale of rewards proposed in the said Memorial.

And His Majesty is further pleased, by and with the advice aforesaid, to revoke, cancel, and annul the Order in Council of the nineteenth of March one thousand eight hundred and nineteen, establishing the scale of rewards therein contained, and the same is hereby revoked, cancelled, and annulled accordingly. *Jas. Buller.*

A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE, R.

WHEREAS His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His late Majesty King George the Third, was pleased by His Royal Proclamations, bearing date the first day of July and the tenth day of October in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventeen, to ordain, declare, and command, that certain pieces of gold coin therein described, called sovereigns and half sovereigns, should pass and be received as current and lawful money of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and that every such sovereign

should weigh not less than five penny weights, two grains and three quarters, and that every such half sovereign should weigh not less than two penny weights, thirteen grains and one quarter; and whereas the allowance made for reasonable wear by the said Proclamations has been found by experience to be too small for general practice: We taking the same into consideration are pleased, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, and We do hereby ordain, declare, and command, that, from and after the date hereof, every gold sovereign not weighing less than five penny weights, two grains and a half, and every gold half sovereign not weighing less than two penny weights, thirteen grains and one eighth, shall pass and be received as current and lawful money of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland; every such sovereign as of the value of twenty shillings; and every such half sovereign as of the value of ten shillings, in all payments whatsoever.

Given at Our Court at Carlton-House, the sixth day of February one thousand eight hundred and twenty one, and in the second year of Our reign.

GOD save the KING.

Act of the Fourteenth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, Cap. 70, Sect. 7.

AND be it further enacted, by the authority aforesaid, that the Tellers in the Receipt of His Majesty's Exchequer in Great Britain, and all receivers, collectors, and other officers of all His Majesty's revenues whatsoever, and all other persons whatsoever, are hereby authorised and required to cut, break, or deface, or cause to be cut, broken, or defaced, every piece of gold coin of this realm that shall be tendered to them, or any of them, in payment, after such time and times as any such piece of gold coin shall, by virtue of any Proclamation of His Majesty in Council, be declared not to be allowed to pass in any payment whatsoever, any law or statute to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the person tendering the same shall bear the loss; but if any such piece so cut, broken or defaced, shall be of due weight, and appear to be lawful money, the person that cut, broke, or defaced the same shall, and is hereby required to take and receive the same at the rate it was coined for; and if any questions or disputes shall arise, whether the piece so cut be lawful coin, within the intent and meaning of His Majesty's Proclamations, it shall be heard and finally determined by the mayor, bailiff or bailiffs, or other chief officer of any city or town corporate where such tender shall be made; and if such tenders shall be made out of any city or town corporate, then by some justice of the peace of the county inhabiting or being near the place where such tender shall be made; and the said mayor or other chief officer and justice of the peace shall have full power and authority to administer an oath, as he shall see convenient, to any person for

determining any questions relating to the weight and lawful currency of the said piece of coin.

Act of the Fourteenth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, Cap. 92, Sect. 4.

AND be it further enacted, by the authority aforesaid, that from and after the thirty-first day of December one thousand seven hundred and seventy-four, all weights to be made use of for weighing the said gold and silver coin, shall be regulated and ascertained by the duplicates or copies of the said standard weights of a guinea, of a shilling, and of the parts and multiples thereof respectively, lodged in the custody of the officer before mentioned (viz. the officer appointed by His Majesty for this purpose, in pursuance of a preceding clause of the said Act), and after having been tried and compared therewith, and found to be just and true, shall, in testimony thereof, be marked by the said officer with a stamp or mark, or stamps or marks, to be approved of by the Master of His Majesty's Mint, which stamps or marks the said officer is hereby directed to provide; and in order that the impression or impressions made thereby may be known to all His Majesty's subjects, the said officer is hereby also directed to publish a description of the same, by advertisement in the London Gazette, three times at least before the said thirty-first day of December one thousand seven hundred and seventy-four; and the said officer is hereby required, upon application made to him at all reasonable hours, to stamp or mark, in manner aforesaid, all weights to be used for weighing the said gold and silver coin which shall be brought to him for that purpose, and which he shall find to be just and true according to the said duplicates or copies of the standard weights of a guinea and of a shilling, and of the parts and multiples thereof respectively, hereby directed to be lodged in his custody, without fee or reward, and without wilful delay; and from and after the said thirty-first day of December one thousand seven hundred and seventy-four, no other weights but such as shall be just and true, according to the weights with and by which they are hereby directed to be compared and ascertained, and shall be marked in manner before mentioned, shall be reputed or accepted in law to be true or of any effect for determining the weight of the gold or silver coin of this realm.

A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE, R.

WHEREAS His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His late Majesty King George the Third, was pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing date the twentieth day of November one thousand eight hundred and nineteen, to declare His Royal will

and pleasure, that the Governors or Deputy Governors of Gibraltar and Malta should be authorised to issue Mediterranean Passes for the protection of ships belonging to His said late Majesty's subjects in those possessions, according to a certain form therein referred to, marked (C), under and subject to certain regulations and sureties therein set forth; and whereas doubts have arisen as to the term during which it was intended that the said Passes should remain in force; We taking the premises into Our Royal consideration, and judging it necessary to remove such doubts, have thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation, and We do hereby declare, that the Passes to be issued by Our Governors or Deputy Governors of Our said possessions of Gibraltar and Malta for the protection of ships or vessels belonging to Our subjects in Our said possessions, according to the form (C), and under the conditions set forth in the before-mentioned Proclamation of the twentieth of November one thousand eight hundred and nineteen, shall be and continue in force for one year from the day on which the same shall respectively be issued, and no longer; and that at the expiration of that term, the said Passes shall be delivered up to the said Governors or Deputy Governors for the purpose of being cancelled, as required by the said Proclamation of the twentieth of November one thousand eight hundred and nineteen.

May it please your Most Gracious Majesty,

WE, the Ministers and Elders of the branch of the Church of Scotland established in India, impressed with a deep sense of our duty as Ministers of religion, and faithful subjects of your Majesty's Government, beg leave to approach the Throne upon the present melancholy occasion, to express unto your Majesty our heartfelt grief upon the death of our late beloved Sovereign King George III, and to assure your Majesty of our steadfast loyalty, and continued attachment to your illustrious house.

Deeply as we lament the death of our late Most Gracious Sovereign, and sincerely as we sympathise in the affliction of your Majesty, we have yet reason to bless God that in these times of distress and turbulence the reins of Government have fallen into the hands of a Prince whom a sorrowful but indispensable necessity had already called to exercise the supreme authority of the State, and that from his wisdom and experience we may confidently anticipate a reign of prosperity and peace.

While, however, we possess this consolation under the loss of a Sovereign highly distinguished by every public and private virtue—while we view with unmingled pleasure the dissemination of knowledge, and the wider diffusion of the principles of justice and liberty, under the able and enlightened administration of the Most Noble the Marquis of Hastings—while we see with equal astonishment and delight the natives of this country gradually divesting themselves of prejudice and superstition, entering our churches, and listening with eager attention to the precepts of our holy religion, and look with confidence upon these happy changes as undoubted harbingers of the ultimate prevalence of our divine faith in this quarter of the world, we have heard, with the utmost abhorrence and detestation, of the attempt of desperate and abandoned men to subvert the Government, and annihilate the Religion of our native country. In this season of general distress, demanding the strictest union, industry and economy, we have learned with the deepest sorrow, that many of our countrymen have been assiduously employed in sowing dissensions, and frustrating these laudable objects, with a view to accomplish the most treasonable purposes, we

have heard with horror of the activity with which seditious and blasphemous publications have been circulated throughout the Kingdom—of the eagerness with which men brought up in our holy religion, and enjoying the privileges of our unrivalled Constitution have listened to the disseminators of infidelity and rebellion, of the numbers who have been led astray by their pernicious representations, and taught to abjure all that we value here, or hope for hereafter. We hope that the reports which have reached us are greatly exaggerated; but if they are true, we sincerely deplore the delusion of our countrymen, in lending their confidence to men whose specious schemes of government, so far from tending to remove their distresses, are only calculated to introduce anarchy and confusion.

From the contemplation of these melancholy occurrences, we turn to your Majesty's accession to the throne of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland with inexpressible comfort, entertaining the fullest confidence that, by the blessing of Divine Providence, your Majesty will be enabled to frustrate the designs of the blasphemous and rebellious, and to preserve pure and unimpaired the Religion and Constitution of our country; and we beg leave to assure your Most Gracious Majesty, that to disseminate principles of piety, and dutiful obedience to all lawful authority, to cherish feelings of respect and attachment to your Majesty's Government, Person, and Illustrious House, in the minds of those who are placed under our spiritual charge, are the ends to which our most fervent prayers, and unceasing labours shall always be directed.

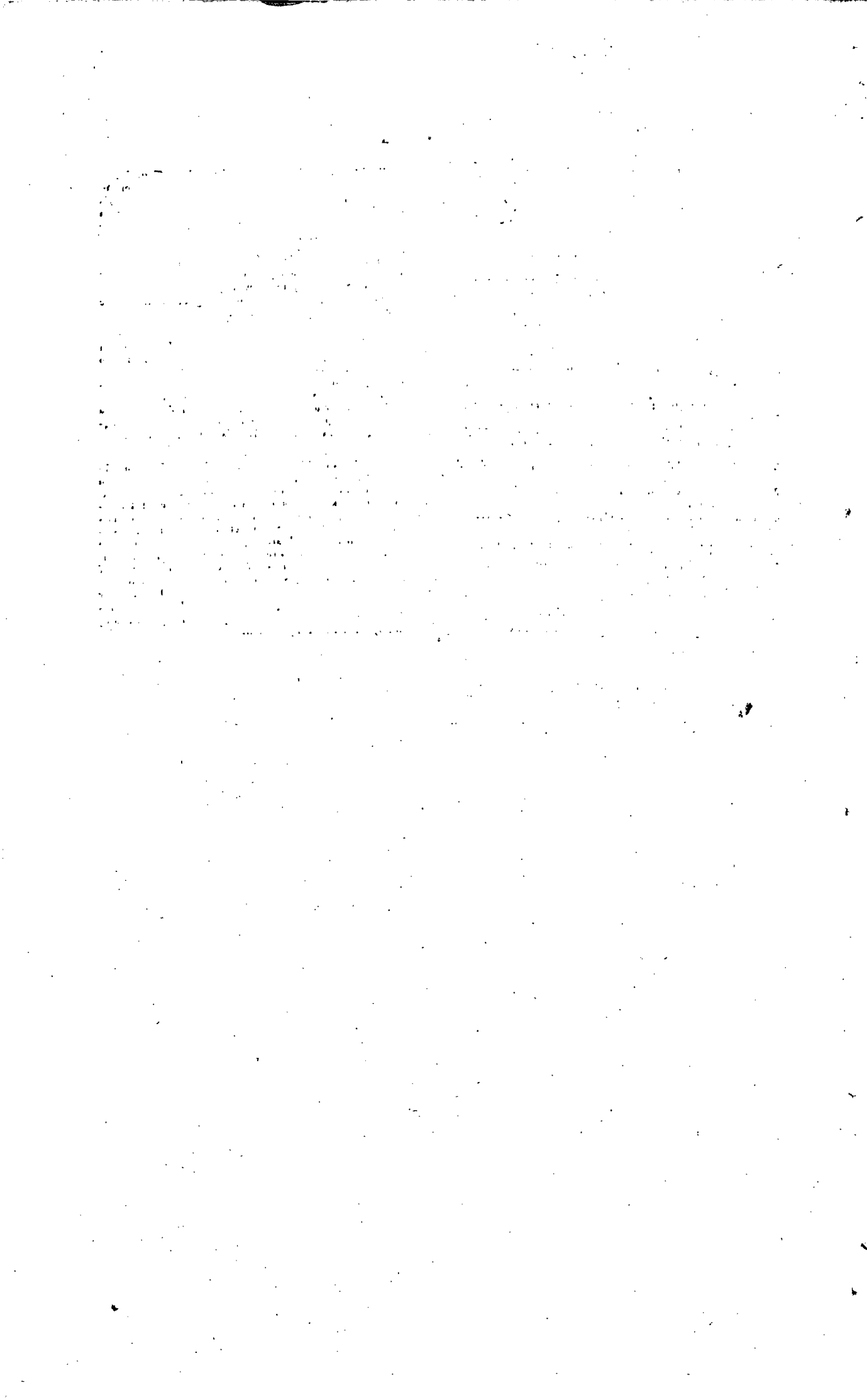
