To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

May it please your Majesty,

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the undersigned Nobility, Clergy, and Freeholders of the County of Wilts, beg leave to approach the Throne with renewed assurances of our ardent and unabated attachment to your Majesty's sacred person, as well as to that glorious constitution, of which your Majesty has ever shewn yourself the faithful guardian and protector.

Alarmed, but not dismayed, at the present disturbed state of our country, we have viewed with grief and abhorrence, the wicked industry of factious agitators, aided by a corrupt and licentious press, to subvert all religion and order, and to destroy the very foundations of civil society.

Against such nefarious attempts, we pledge ourselves to exert our most vigorous and unceasing endeavours, and to promote that loyalty to our Sovereign, and that willing obedience to the laws, which have hitherto been the peculiar boast and protection of our country.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty. SIRE,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Noblemen, Clergy, Gentry and Frecholdefs of the King's County, beg leave to approach the Throne with assurances of our warm attachment to your Majesty's sacred Person; and of our steady and devoted loyalty to that excellent Constitution, of which your Royal Authority forms so essential, and so valuable a part. Gratitude to the pious memory of our late venerated Monarch, the Father, not only of our King, but of our country, is a sentiment, of which loyalty is the natural fruit and produce; a loyalty, to which that son and successor is well entitled, whose ambition is to tread in the steps of his royal sire; and during the few years of whose auspicious sway, so many laurels have been added to those which already crowned his people. But independently of these sufficiently powerful incentives, well fitted, we presume to say, to influence an Irish mind, we feel, and we acknowledge, that we are guarding our own liberties, and defending our best rights, when we devote our efforts to maintaining the security of the throne.

Those efforts, it is the unquestionable right of your, Majesty to command; while a prompt and spirited obedience to that call, we not only admit to be our bounden duty, but are proud to claim

and assert it, as our right.

If your Majesty should graciously hold that the affectionate attachment of your liege subjects is deserving of return, we presume to suggest that the means of requital are within your royal power; and that you have only, whenever emergencies arise, to rely confidently on the courage and fidelity of your people.

Yet far be it from us to insinuate that even this is not a very subordinate resource: Your Majesty will look, as your royal father ever did, to that Divine Protection, which alone can be effectual towards prospering your reign, and blessing the loyal efforts of your faithful people.

It is indeed a matter for serious and profound reflection, that those would not spare the altar who assailed the throne; and that in struggling to preserve our Constitution unimpaired, we might be performing a still higher and more sacred duty: we might be combating to maintain the blessings of our Christian Faith.
