, ₁ HE States of this Kingdom have been affembled for feveral days, and in our next we may rell you what refolutions they have taken upon the Proposition made to them in the Wings name, the lubitance of which was, That the King thought it needfary, in the prefeat conjus-Aure, to encrease his Forces both by Sea and Land, especially confidering his Territories lay to diffant from each other, and defired to be hyplied by them for that purpose. The Deputies that are here from *Liefand* have obtained leave to return home.

Vienna, Oftob. 22. On Sunday last arrived here a Conrier with Letters dated the fourth of the Jalt Month at Constantinople, which give an account, That the Grand-Signior, through the perswasion of the Grand-Vizier, had abfolutely refolved on a Was against the Emperor; That accordingly great preparationswere making agaioft Spring, and the Troops ordered to march to Greicks Weissenbourg, the place of their Rendevous. Upon which advice the Emperor has relolved likewife to prepare for War, and to raile fix new Regiments with all polfible speed; and the Margrave of Baden, Prefident of the Council of War, will go hence in few days for Raab, to fee that place be in a good pofture of defence: and Count Martinitz, whom the Empe-for is (ending to the Pope and the Princes of Itaby to demand a fiftance against the Turks, is hastening away. In the mean time we understand that by mutual confent Hosfilities do cease between the Rebels and the Imperialists, and that they will continue to to do as long as Count Teckeley's Deputies are here, or at leaft till the Emperor has given his final Answer upon their Proposals. Count Teckeley is retired with his Forces, and the Berg-Towns are now again in the possession of the Imperialists. It is reported here that the Emperor's Minister in Poland, having intercepted several Letters which the Abbot Fergne, who is faid to be an Agent for the French, was lending to Count Jeckeley and the Prince of Transilvania, he had prefonced them to the King of Poland, who had there-upon commanded the faid Abbot Vergne immediately to depart the Kingdom. And we are likewife told that the Emperor has caufed Copies of these intercepted Letters to be sent to his Ambaisadors at Francfors, and to the Dyet at Ratisbonne. The Marquis de Seppenille, the French Envoy, makes yory prefing Inflances, That one of his Domeflicks, w o was some time fince Inprisoned by the Emperor's Order, being charged with holding correspeedence in Hungary, may be reflored to his li-borry, and declares, That the Socretary of Coar;

Mansfeldt, who has by reprizal been made a Prifoner at Paris, mult expect the fame treatment that is used to his faid Domeflick here.

Zell, Nov. 3: Preparations are making here against the Marriage of the Prince of Hanouer with the Princels of Zell, which will be folemnized, as we are informed, about a fortnight hence, but the particular day is not yet fet- We have advice, that the Danes do threaten the Country people in Holfein with Military Execution, in cale they do not pay the Contributions they demand within a certain time; and that on the other fide the Duke of Holflein has absolutely forbid his Subjects to. pay the faid Contributions. This is a matter that our Duke and the Duke of Hanouer are concerned in; This is a matter that our and it's faid that they will fend fome of their Troops to protect the Subjects of the Duke of Halftein, if the Danes do proceed to the faid execution. At the fame time we are informed that loveral Bnandenburg Troops are on their march, with defign to hinder the Luneaburg Troops from taking their Winter-quitters in the Country of Mecklenburg which have been affigned them by the Emperor.

Francfort, Nov. 4. The Deputies of the Emer pire meet every day, but have not as yet taken any refolution upon the late Declaration of the French Ambaffadors. It is fail that in their laft Affembly the Deputy of *Bavare* proposed, that inflances fhould be made to the French Ambaffadors for the obtaining a prolongation of the Term, which ex-t pires the 22 of this Month, and that he was for conded therein by other Deputies. In the mean time the French Ambafladors are preparing to leave this place, and fome of the Furniture of their Houles is already taken down, they declaring that their Orders oblige them to depart from hence before the end of this Month, in case they receive not a fatisfactory Answer upon their faid Declaration. According to the Advices we receive from Hungary we can expect nothing but a War on that fide; Yeflerday arrived here part of the Baggage, with fome of the Servants of the Bilhop of Straburg, who is himfelf expected here to morrow or next day in his way to Cologne.

Hambarg, Nov. g. We hear the Danes have b . gun to raile the Coutributions they demand in Hola liein, and that the Lunenburg Troops are thereupon in motion, and we fear the Confequences this Affair may have, feeing the Neighbouring Princes do concern themfelves therein, and particularly the Dukes of Lunenburg, who have promited the Duke of Hoffein their Protection. At Gluckfladt the Danes have fitted out three finall Frigans, which they defign to make vie of for the hindring the Lunenburg Troops from passing the Elbe, in tale they shall attempt it. From Sweden they write, That that King had proposed to the States that are now affembled at Stockbolm, the encreasing his Forces by Land and Sea, which his Majefty thinks to be abfolutchy
