Cologne, Nov. 6. The Bishop of *Strasburg* is expected here this evening, and part of the Garrison is ordered to be drawn out to receive him. Two days since passed by this place by water Monsieur *d'Agurto*, Maître de Camp General of the Forces in the Spanish Netherlands coming from *Luxemburg*; he went ashore at *Nau*, where a Convoy of about 20 Hoise attended him; and as we understand is gone to visit the Garisons in *Gelderland* and *Limburg*. From *Ratibonne* they write, that the City of *Hamburg* has made application to the Dyet, that they would write to the King of *Spain* on their behalf, to the end the Arrest that is laid upon their Goods in *Spain*, may be taken off.

Hague, Novem. 7. The Sieur *Diest*, Envoy from the Elector of *Brandenburg*, has presented a Memorial to the States-General, by which he demands the restitution of a Ship belonging to his Elector. I Highness, that was some time since taken on the Coast of *Guinea* by the Ships of our *West-India* Company. We have Advice from *Cadix*, that Rear-Admiral *Vander Putten* (who meeting, the 27th of *July*, with the French Fleet on the Coast of *Barbary*, was stoped by their Admiral, because he was bound for *Argiers*) after having been detained five Weeks by the Sieur *du Quesne*, was at last permitted to pursue his Voyage, and that arriving at *Argiers* the second of *September*, he had with much trouble and difficulty redeemed as many Captives as the Moneys he had would reach to; and that the 17th of *September* he parted again from *Argiers* for *Cadix*. The Deputies of this Province, and those of *Zealand*, continue their Conferences for the adjusting the differences between the two Provinces.

Falmouth, Octob. 31. Here is arrived the *Bachelor of London*, *John Smith* Master, in 13 weeks from *Famaica*. The day before she came out, Captain *Banister*, with three other Merchant Ships bound for *London*, set sail. Here are several Vessels in Port bound for *France*.

Bristol, Octob. 30. The Loyal young Addressers of this City, to shew their Zeal and Affection for the Government, met on Thursday the 26th Instant at the Guild-hall, and with their President, *Thomas Sheridan* Esq. marched to *St. Thomas's* Church, through the principal Streets, with the City Trumpets before them, and Scarlet Ribbons in their Hats, Imprinted *Rex & Heredes*, (in opposition to the late factious *Blew*, and former *Green* Marks of the *Kings* head and other Antimonarchical Clubs) being honoured and encouraged with the presence of the Mayor, Aldermen, Sheriffs, Common-Council, and chief of the Citizens and Gentry of the Neighbourhood. Having heard an excellent Sermon Preached by Mr. *Thompson*, they returned in the same order to the Guild-hall, where was prepared a very good Dinner; at which, Drinking the King's, Duke's, and the rest of the Royal family's Healths, with Musick and the usual Acclamations, they parted about four or five in the Afternoon, in good order, to their own homes; with Resolutions of keeping up yearly their custom, as a very good Anti-Association and Nursery of Loyalty.
