Leghorne, October 19.

BY a French Bark arrived here from the Coast of *Barbary*, we have advice that three Men of War belonging to *Tripoly*, meeting with a Privateer of *Corsica*, commanded by *Gio Maria Cardì*, a very famous Captain, had, after a very obstinate Fight, in which the said Captain was killed, taken her, and carried her to *Tripoly*, she having on Board 130 Christians, who were made Slaves, and 20000 Crowns in Money.

Milan, October 22. The Count de Porro, the Duke of Savoy's Resident at this Court, has acquainted our Governour, the Count de Melgar, with the Defensive Alliance lately concluded between the most Christian King and the Duke his Master, and that in pursuance of it 3000 French Horse are to have their Winter-Quarters in *Piedmont*; and his Excellency has desired the said Resident to return his Thanks to the Duke and Dutches of Savoy for giving him this Communication; but at the same time Expresses have been sent to *Naples* and *Sicily*, to inform the Viceroy of those Kingdoms of the said Alliance, and to press them to hasten the supply of Men and Moneys, which they have Orders from *Spain* to send hither.

Venice, October 23. Our Letters from *Turkey* speak of nothing of news, but the Preparations that are making for War; they tell us that the Forces of *Asia* are marching towards *Hungary*, and that all the eminent Officers are commanded from all parts of the Ottoman Empire to repair to the Army. Some days since the Count de la Torres, the Emperor's Ambassador, had an Audience of the Senate concerning the present conjuncture of affairs. From *Rome* they write, That matters between that Court and *France* continued very much embroiled, however that the Pope had resolved to send an Extraordinary Nuncio to the French Court, to make the usual Compliment upon the Birth of the Duke of *Burgundy*.

Florence, October 24. We have Letters from *Rome* of the 17th instant, which inform us, that the Cardinal Pio, Protector of the Affairs of *Germany*, having in an Audience he had of the Pope, represented to him the sad state of affairs in *Hungary*, and the impending War with the Turks, the Pope had assured him, that in case of a War between the Emperor and the Turks, or the continuance of that with the Hungarian Rebels, he would not be wanting to give his Imperial Majesty all the assistance he could; and that the said Cardinal had thereupon dispatched an Express to *Vienna* to give the Emperor an account thereof. That on the 12th of this Month Cardinal Cibo had been with the Cardinal d'Estree, to acquaint him that the Pope had resolved to send an Extraordinary Nuncio to *France* to carry the best Clout to the Duke of *Burgundy*; and that the same day the President of *Savoy* had

declared to the Cardinal Cibo, that the Duke of *Savoy* had concluded a Defensive Alliance with the Most Christian King, and that by virtue of it 3000 French Horse were to Winter in his Highness's Territories.

Genova, October 28. The 22 Instant in the Evening appeared in sight of this place five Algerine Men of War, who the day before came so near to *St. Remo*, and *Porto Maurizio*, that they took away several small Vessels that were there at Anchor: They are gone Eastward, and may do much mischief to the French. Three great Galleasses lie now in this Road, being bound for *Naples*, to transport from thence the Marquis de los Velez, Viceroy of that Kingdom, for *Spain*. Here is much discourse of the Defensive Alliance concluded between the most Christian King and the Duke of *Savoy*; and it is reported that the French have proposed a like Alliance with this State, but that they are here unwilling to enter into any such Engagements.

Vienna, October 25. Count Tockley's Deputies have had several Conferences with the Emperor's Ministers, but hitherto we have more reason to suspect their aim is to gain time, than to believe they have any real intention to accommodate things: however the Emperor has consented that all Hostilities shall cease, during their Negotiation here. Our advices from the Upper *Hungary* do all assure us, That the Turks are resolved on a War, and that the Grand-Signior, or at least the Grand-Vizier, will command the Ottoman Army in Person, when it takes the Field in the Spring. The Baron de Kracow, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Brandenburg*, is upon his departure, having, during his Residence here, endeavoured to induce the Emperor to accept of the French Proposals in order to the establishing a firm Peace between the Empire and the most Christian King. The Empress is with Child again, to the great joy of this Court.

Vienna, October 29. The Emperor has resolved to raise 12 new Regiments, and the Commissions will be given out so soon as the Moneys necessary for that Service can be provided. Yesterday an Express was sent hence with Letters to General *Cabrera*, giving him an account, as we are told, of what has passed between the Emperor's Ministers and Count Tockley's Deputies, and the little ground there is to believe they proceed with sincerity in their Negotiation; and directing him to take care to secure the Passages into *Moravia*, for that the Rebels design to fall into that Province. Yesterday the Envoy from *Moscovy* had his first Audience of the Emperor, whom he acquainted with the Death of the late Czar; That his two Brothers did succeed him; and that they were very desirous of his Imperial Majesty's Friendship, and ready to enter into an Alliance with him for the defence of their respective Dominions.

Strasbourg, Octob. 30. Two days since arrived here from *Landers* the French *Gendarmes*, and the Regiments of *Hôles* and *Dragoons* that are to Winter in *Alsace*, are daily expected. It is almost incredible with what diligence the French work on the new Fortifications they are making here, the charge of which, and those of other places in *Alsace*, is said to amount to five hundred thousand *Livres* a Month.

Cologne, Nov. 6. The Bishop of *Strasbourg* arrived at *Trier* on Sunday last, and to-morrow he is expected here, his Baggage and most of his Servants being already arrived: The affairs of *Liege* remain in suspense till his arrival, his Electoral Highness having left the management of them to him, and the Magistrates of *Liege* being unwilling to send their Deputies hither till they have an assurance that they shall be well received.

Brussels, Nov. 6. We have not as yet any account of Monsieur *del Val's* Negotiation at *Paris*, concerning the Prolongation of the Term. And in the mean time the Marquis *de Grana* is providing against the worst, and has commanded all Officers to repair immediately to their several Commands. The Count *de Vallasine*, late Colonel of a Regiment in the service of these Courts, having (for that he refused to obey the Prince of *Chimay*, Governor of *Luxemburg*, where his Regiment was in Garrison, and sent him a Challenge) been imprisoned and deprived of his Command, and afterwards, by an Order from the Court at *Madrid*, obliged to go and serve the King at *Oran* in *Barbary*, he was conducted by four Officers to *Ostend*, and was ready to Embark, when he received a Counter-Order, which required him to repair to *Luxemburg*, and make that place his Prison, which it's believed is done, to give him an opportunity to make his submission to the Prince of *Chimay*, after which it's not doubted, but he will be restored to his Command, being generally esteemed. From *Ratisbonne* they write, That the Dyet had the Memorial of Monsieur *Verjus*, the French Minister, containing the same Declaration which the French Ambassadors made at *Francfort*, before them, but that considering the slowness of their Proceedings, it would be almost impossible for them to take any resolution thereupon before the 20th of this Month, when the Term set by the French expires.

Brussels, Nov. 10. Last Sunday, being the King of *Spain's* Birth-day, was observed here with great solemnity: All the Cannon of this City and *Fort Monterey* were thrice discharged, and in the Evening the Court was diverted with an *Opera*, with a Ball, and a great Entertainment. His Excellency has ordered the Army another Months Pay, and has appointed Commissioners to take an exact account of the Receivers of the Kings Revenues in the several Provinces, that so his Excellency may be informed of the true state of it. The Nations of this City are now assembled, and it's not doubted but they will without any difficulty agree to several new Impositions. Monsieur *d'Agurso*, our Maître de Camp General, is expected here to night or to-morrow.

Hague, Nov. 10. Two days since arrived here an Express from *Brussels*, with Letters from the Marquis *de Grana* concerning the present posture of things in the Spanish Netherlands. Prince *Ca-*

smir of *Nassaw*, Stadtholder of *Friseland* and *Groningen*, is gone to *Swalsbach*, where the Prince of *Nassaw*, his Mother, at present is. There has been much discourse of a Marriage which is said to have been proposed between the said Prince *Cassimir* and the Daughter of the Count *de Roze*, in *France*, but at present we hear no more of it. The States of *Holland* meet the 15th Instant, and against that time the Prince of *Orange* will return hither from *Soestdike*.

Paris, Nov. 11. We have advice from *Rome*, That the Pope has resolved to send hither an Extraordinary Nuncio to perform the Compliment which the Popes have been accustomed to make upon the Birth of the Sons of *France*; which we hope will contribute to the disposing of things to an accommodation. Orders having been sent to the French Ambassadors at *Francfort*, to leave that place before the end of this Month, we are informed that they have, within these few days, been countermanded, and that directions have been sent them to remain there some time longer, in case the Imperial Ambassadors do desire to renew the Negotiation upon the Proposals they, the French Ambassadors, made at their first arrival at *Francfort*. The Court will remove in few days from *Fountainbleau*.
