In conformity with these instructions the necessary directions have been given to all His Majesty's Officers and Servants concerned in carrying them into execution. The doors of the Hall and Abbey will be opened at three o'clock in the morning. At the same hour all the gates of Hyde-park, except the Kensington-gate, will be opened for carriages, and the Stable-yard-gate will be opened for the passage of such carriages as will be permitted to use the second route laid down in the instructions. The doors of the Hall and Abbey will be shut at seven o'clock in the morning against all visitors, except those who are entitled to be set down at the House of Lords, and the doors of that House will be shut at eight o'clock. All carriages are then to depart, and the gates of the Park will be open at three o'clock in the afternoon, to those which are to wait there for the return of their owners, as stated in the second and third routes.

No 1.

Route for the Foreign Ministers, for all those who are to form part of the Procession, and for those who have Tickets from Peers, Judges, Privy Counsellors, and Grand Crosses of the Bath.

N. B. The holders of such tickets may also use the route No. 4.

Pass down Grosvenor-place, Eaton-street, and

the Vauxhall-road, along Millbank-road, Millbank-street, and the east side of Abingdon-street; set down at the House of Lords; and go home by the west side of Abingdon-street, along College-street, Little College-street, Wood-street, North-street, St. John's Church-yard, Little Tufton-street, Tufton-street, the Horseferry-road, Carey-street, the north and west sides of Vincent's-square, and Bentinck-street.

Persons of the above descriptions from the eastern parts of the town, will fall into this line most easily by crossing Vauxhall-bridge.

All the foregoing persons will be excluded unless they arrive by eight o'clock in the morning.

In the evening the carriages to take away the above-mentioned persons, will wait in Vincent's-square, with the hind wheels against the rails of the square, will come from thence (when required) by the reverse of the morning route, up the west side of Abingdon-street, and go home by the east side of that street, the Millbank-road, and Vauxhall-road.

No. 2.

Route for all Persons who have Tickets for the South Side of the Aisle of Westminster Abbey.

Enter St. James's-park, at the Stable-yard, pass along the Mall, cross the Parade, and leave the Park by Storey's-gate, pass down Princes-street; set down in Dean's-yard; and go home by Bowling-street, Little Smith-street, Smith-street, Dean-street, Tothill-street, the Broadway, York-street, James-street, into the Park at Buckingham-gate, up Constitution-hill, and out at the Hyde-park-corner-gate.

All the foregoing persons will be excluded, unless they take their seats by seven o'clock in the morning.

In the afternoon the carriages to take away the foregoing persons will enter St. James's-park from Piccadilly, and wait in the Bird-cage-walk with the hind wheels against the houses, and the horses heads fronting the canal, and (when called for) will take up and go home by the same route as in the morning.

This route will be used by those who have seats in the booths which open into Princes-street.

No. 3.

Route for all Persons who have Tickets for the North Side of the Aisle of Westminster Abbey.

Fall into the line in Cockspur-street, pass on the west side of the statue at Charing-cross, down Parliament-street and the Broad Sanctuary, set down at the stairs which will be provided to cross the platform, and go home through Little George-street, into George-street, and through Delabay-street, Duke-street, Charles-street, and King-street into Whitehall.

All the foregoing persons will be excluded, unless they take their seats by seven o'clock in the morning.

In the afternoon the carriages to take away the foregoing persons, will enter St. James's-park from the Stable-yard, turn to the left and wait on the Parade in the Park, with the hind wheels against the railing, and the horses heads fronting the Horse-Guards, and (when called for), will pass through the Horse-Guards, down King-street, take up where they set down in the morning, and return home by the west side of Parliament-street.

This route will be used by those who have seats in the Guildhall, and in the booths in the Abbey Church-yard and St. Margaret's Church-yard, and in the gardens of Parliament-square.

No. 4.

Route for all Persons having Tickets for Westminster-Hall, and the Exchequer and Duchy of Lancaster Offices.

Fall into the line in the Strand, pass on the east side of the statue at Charing-cross, down Parliament-street, set down at the platform, near the corner of New Palace-yard, from whence the parties will walk along the platform into the Hall, and the carriages will go home along Bridge-street, and over Westminster-bridge.

All the foregoing persons will be excluded, unless they take their seats by seven o'clock in the morning.

In the evening the carriages to take away the foregoing persons will wait round the Asylum, with the hind wheels against the walls, and (when called for), will take up where they set down in the morning, and will go home along the east side of Parliament-street.

This route will be used by those who have seats in New Palace-yard.

Supplement to the foregoing Instructions.

IN pursuance of an Order of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, made on the 16th instant, whereby certain tickets are granted for Westminster-Abbey only to Judges, Knights Grand Crosses of the Bath, Knights Commanders of the Bath, and some others, notice is hereby given that the carriages of the holders of all such tickets must pass by the first route laid down in those instructions, and set down at the platform near Poets Corner.

A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE, R.

WHEREAS John Earl of Stair was duly elected and returned to be one of the sixteen Peers of Scotland, to sit in the House of Peers in the present Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and is since deceased; in order to the electing another Peer of Scotland to sit in his room, We do, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, issue forth this Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at Holyrood-House, in Edinburgh, on Thursday the second day of August next, between the hours of twelve and two in the afternoon, to nominate and choose another Peer of Scotland, to sit and vote in the House of Peers of this present Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, in the room of the said John Earl of Stair, deceased, by open election and plurality of voices of the Peers that shall then be present, and of the proxies of such as shall be absent (such proxies being Peers, and producing a mandate in writing, duly signed before witnesses, and both constituent and proxy being qualified according to law), and the Lord Clerk Register, or such two of the Principal Clerks of the Session as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his name, are hereby respectively required to attend such meeting, and to administer the oaths required by law to be taken there by the said Peers, and to take their votes; and immediately after such election made and duly examined, to certify the name of the Peer so elected, and sign and attest the same in the presence of the said Peers the electors, and return such certificate into the High Court of Chancery of Great Britain. And We strictly charge and command that this Proclamation be duly published at the Market-Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the county towns in Scotland, twenty-five days, at least, before the time hereby appointed for the meeting of the said Peers to proceed on such election.

Given at Our Court at Carlton-House, this ninth day of June one thousand eight hundred and twenty-one, in the second year of Our reign.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fifty-sixth year of His late Majesty's reign, cap. 38, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to

suspend the ballot or enrolment for the local militia," it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by any Order in Council, to direct that no ballot or enrolment for the local militia shall take place; but that such ballot and enrolment shall remain and continue suspended for the period specified in any such Order of Council, and from time to time, by any like Order or Orders in Council, to continue such suspension so long as His Majesty shall deem the same expedient, any thing in any Act or Acts of Parliament to the contrary notwithstanding: and whereas by an Order in Council, made the seventh of June last, it was ordered by His Majesty in Council, that no ballot or enrolment for the local militia should take place for the space of one year from the twenty-seventh of June last, but that the ballot and enrolment for the local militia should remain and continue suspended for the space of one year from the said twenty-seventh of June last: and whereas it is deemed expedient to continue such suspension of the ballot and enrolment for the local militia for the space of one year from and after the twenty-seventh day of this instant June; it is, therefore, ordered by His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, that no ballot or enrolment for the local militia do take place for the space of one year from and after the twenty-seventh day of this instant June, but that the ballot and enrolment for the local militia do remain and continue suspended for the space of one year from and after the said twenty-seventh day of this instant June.

WHEREAS the time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the twenty-second of November last, for prohibiting the exportation of gun-powder, arms, or ammunition, to the places therein specified, will expire on the thirtieth day of this instant May; and whereas it is expedient, that the said prohibition should be continued for some time longer; His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, doth hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no person or persons whatsoever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's service) do, at any time during the space of six months (to commence from the thirtieth day of this instant May), presume to transport any gun-powder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, to any port or place within the dominions of the King of Spain, or to any port or place on the Coast of Africa (except to any ports or places within the Straights of Gibraltar), or in the West Indies, or on any part of the Continent of America (except to a port or place, or ports or places in His Majesty's territories or possessions on the Continent of North America, or in the territories of the United States.

of America), or ship or lade any gun-powder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, on board any ship or vessel, in order to transporting the same into any such ports or places within the dominions of the King of Spain, or into any such ports or places on the Coast of Africa (except as above excepted), or in the West Indies, or on the Continent of America (except as above excepted), without leave or permission in that behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring and suffering the respective forfeitures and penalties inflicted by an Act, passed in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Second, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of gun-powder, or any sort of arms or ammunition, and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying coastwise of salt-petre, gun-powder, or any sort of arms or ammunition;" and also by an Act, passed in the thirty-third year of His late Majesty's reign, cap. 2, intituled "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the exportation of naval stores, and more effectually to prevent the exportation of salt-petre, arms, and ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council."

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to allow for three years, and until six weeks after the commencement of the then next session of Parliament, the importation into ports specially appointed by His Majesty within the Provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, of the articles therein enumerated, and the re-exportation thereof from such ports," it is enacted that it shall and may be lawful, in any British ship or vessel owned and navigated according to law, or in any ship or vessel belonging to the subjects of any Sovereign or State in amity with His Majesty, to import into and export from such ports within the provinces of Nova Scotia or New Brunswick, as shall be specially appointed for that purpose, certain articles in the said Act enumerated, any thing in any law to the contrary notwithstanding; His Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Him by

the above recited Act, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the date of this order, and until further order made thereon, it shall be lawful, in any British built ship or vessel, owned and navigated according to law; or in any ship or vessel belonging to the subjects of any Sovereign or State in amity with His Majesty, to import into the port of St. Andrews, in New Brunswick, any scantling, planks, staves, heading-boards, shingles, hoops, horses, neat cattle, sheep, hogs, poultry, or live stock of any sort; bread, biscuits, flour, peas, beans, potatoes, wheat, rice, oats, barley, or grain of any sort; pitch, tar, turpentine, fruits, seeds, and tobacco; provided that such articles shall, in all cases where the same shall be imported in foreign vessels, be of the growth, produce, or manufacture of the country to which the vessels importing the same shall belong; and that it shall be lawful in any British built ship or vessel, owned and navigated according to law, to export from the said port any of the said articles, either to the United Kingdom, or to any other of His Majesty's possessions.

And it is hereby further ordered, that it shall and may be lawful, in any British-built ship or vessel, owned and navigated according to law, or in any ship or vessel belonging to the subjects of any Sovereign or State in amity with His Majesty, to export from the port of St. Andrews, in New Brunswick, any gypsum, grindstones, or other produce or manufacture of the said province; and also any produce or manufacture of the United Kingdom, or of His Majesty's colonies or plantations in the West Indies, or any goods whatever which shall have been legally imported into the said province, provided that none of the said articles shall be exported from the port abovenamed, to any foreign country or place, in any foreign vessel, unless such foreign vessel shall belong to the country to which the said articles shall be exported.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to enable His Majesty to direct the distribution of any reward awarded by the Commissioners of the Customs or Excise to the Officers of the Army, Navy, or Marines, for apprehending smugglers, in such manner as His Majesty shall be pleased to appoint," it was enacted that in all cases wherein the Commissioners of Customs or

Excise of England, Scotland, and Ireland respectively, shall award any sum not exceeding twenty pounds as aforesaid, to any officer, officers, non-commissioned officers, petty officers, seamen, or privates of His Majesty's army, navy, or marines, or acting under the orders of the Lord High Admiral, or of the Commissioners for executing the office of the Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, for any person so arrested, convicted, or committed to prison as aforesaid, the same shall be divided and distributed in such proportions, and according to such rules, regulations, and orders, as His Majesty shall, by His Order or Orders in Council, or by His Royal Proclamation in that behalf, be pleased to direct and appoint:

made prior to the date hereof, which shall be distributed according to the former Order:

And His Majesty is further pleased to direct and appoint that all sums awarded, saving as above excepted seizures made prior to the date hereof, by the Commissioners of Customs or Excise in England, Scotland and Ireland, to persons under the orders of the Lord High Admiral, or the Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, for the arrest on shore of any person or persons for a breach of the laws as above described, shall be paid in the following proportions, to and for the benefit of the person or persons who shall actually make the arrest, viz.

To the person or persons who shall actually make the arrest:

Three fourth parts of the reward to be divided in equal proportions, if more than one person shall actually make the arrest.

To the officer or officers being present, of the party of men, to which the person or persons making the arrest shall belong.

One fourth part of the reward to be divided, if more than one officer of the party shall be so present, as follows,

To the officer commanding the party, two shares.

To each of the other officers, one share.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to cause His Majesty's pleasure, hereby signified, to be duly complied with. *Jas. Buller.*

"WHEREAS by an Act of the fifty-eighth year of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act for more effectually discovering the Longitude at Sea, and encouraging attempts to find a Northern Passage between the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans, and to approach the Northern Pole;' and by another Act of the present session of Parliament, to amend the said Act, it is provided, that for the encouragement of persons who may attempt the said Passage, or approach to the Northern Pole, but not wholly accomplish

the same; we, the Commissioners for discovering the Longitude at Sea, may by our Memorial propose to your Majesty in Council, to direct and establish proportionate rewards to be paid to such person as aforesaid, who shall first have accomplished certain proportions of the said Passage or Approach :

And whereas it appears that the progress of discovery has already advanced on the Northern Coast of North America, and within the Arctic Circle, as far as 113 degrees of West Longitude, or thereabouts, from Greenwich; but has not arrived Northward, according to any well authenticated accounts, so far as 81 degrees of North Latitude :

We, your Memorialists, beg leave most humbly to represent these particulars for your Majesty's consideration, and to submit, with all humility, whether your Majesty may not be graciously pleased to establish the following scale of rewards, to be allotted according to the intentions of the said Acts :

1.—To the first ship belonging to any of your Majesty's subjects, or to your Majesty, that shall reach the Longitude of 130° West from Greenwich, by sailing within the Arctic Circle - - - £5,000

To the first ship as aforesaid, that shall reach the Longitude of 150° West from Greenwich, by sailing within the Arctic Circle, a further sum of - - - £5,000

To the first ship as aforesaid, that shall reach the Pacific Ocean by a North West Passage, the further sum of - - - £10,000

2.—To the first ship as aforesaid, that shall reach to 83° of North Latitude - - - £1,000

To 85°, a further sum of - - - £1,000

To 87°, a further sum of - - - £1,000

To 88°, a further sum of - - - £1,000

To 89°, or beyond, a further sum of - - - £1,000

And if your Majesty should graciously approve these proposals, we further, with all humility, submit whether your Majesty would not be pleased, by your Order in Council, to revoke, cancel, and annul His late Majesty's Order in Council, of the nineteenth March one thousand eight hundred and nineteen, establishing the scale of rewards therein contained, for the accomplishment of certain proportions of the said Passage or Approach."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration; was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve thereof; and His Majesty doth hereby establish the scale of rewards proposed in the said Memorial.

And His Majesty is further pleased, by and with the advice aforesaid, to revoke, cancel, and annul

the Order in Council of the nineteenth of March one thousand eight hundred and nineteen, establishing the scale of rewards therein contained, and the same is hereby revoked, cancelled, and annulled accordingly. *Jas. Buller.*
