

ble an anxiety in *Flanders*, fearing the Invasions of the French Troops. The States of *Holland* have been compleatly assembled since the 17th Instant; and have, it is said, several important matters before them. From *Hamburg* they write, That there are some differences between the Elector of *Brandenburg* and the Princes of *Lunenbourg*; and that they fear the Consequences of the Proceeding of the Danes in *Holstein*. The 14th, being the Prince of *Orange's* Birthday, when he entered into his 33 year, his Highness was complimented by the Deputies of the several Colleges of the State, by the Foreign Ministers, &c. and in the Evening their Highnesses were entertained by the Heer *Odyke* with a Ball and very noble Collation.

Hague, Nov. 10. The *Sieur Dieft*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Brandenburg*, has presented a Memorial to the States-General, on the occasion of his Electoral Highness's possessing himself of *Greuzell*, in *East-Friesland*, which isto this effect. That the said Envoy had received Orders from his Electoral Highness to represent to the States, That his Electoral Highness had for some time, past taken notice that there were ill affected Persons, who to advance their particular designs, had endeavoured to render all the actions of his Electoral Highness odious and suspected to the States; but that his Electoral Highness did assure himself that when they impartially consider the Affection and Friendship which his Electoral Highness manifested to this State during the last War, and that he hath since entered into a new and strict Alliance with them, and freely delivered up to them *Schenckians*, they will not be able to receive any ill Impressions concerning his proceedings; and His Electoral Highness does assure the States that he will faithfully maintain and cultivate the good Neighbourhood and Friendship that has been for so many years between them, and Religiously observe the said Alliance. And because the said ill affected Persons may endeavour to give the States an Ombrage of the few Men his Electoral Highness has caused to Land in *East-Friesland*, he does declare to them, That what he has done, he will do in that matter, is in pursuance of the Imperial Conservatorium, by which the Protection of the said Country, and the States and Inhabitants thereof, is committed to his Electoral Highness, the Bishop of *Munster*, and the Duke of *Neuburg* together, and in each in particular; That his Electoral Highness sent some time since, an Envoy to offer his Mediation, as well to the Princes as to the States of *East-Friesland* in order to an amicable composition of the differences depending between them, but that she declined it, And is being notorious that there are dangerous designs to burden the Country with Quarters for Foreign Troops, his Electoral Highness was obliged, by the Duty of his Conservatorship, to send some Men thither, as a safeguard to protect the said Country and the States thereof, and that by Water, because of the inconvenience of passing at this time by Land. And his Electoral Highness does assure the States that the same is not intended to any bodies Prejudice, much less to the damage of the States, or any other Neighbour, the smallness of the number of Men making it plain that no dangerous or prejudicial design lies hid under it. That his Electoral Highness has communicated this affair to the other Conservators, and will farther do so; and that he intends, so soon as he is secured of his aim, which is to preserve Peace in *East-Friesland*, and to protect the States and Inhabitants thereof against Foreign Ruin and Force, always to follow the farther direction

and Orders of the Emperor. The Elector of *Brandenburg* has likewise written a Letter to the States-General on this Subject, which, as well as the said Memorial, are put into the hands of the Deputies for foreign Affairs.

Paris, Novemb. 17. Our last Letters from *Paris* told us, That the Pope appeared as much dissatisfied as ever, with this Court; and that he had resolved to name some Person, that is already in this Kingdom, for the performing the Compliment of giving the Duke of *Burgundy* the Bless'd Clout, which done, his Commission should end, so that the hopes many had that the Popes sending a Nuncio hither, would offer a favourable occasion for the begetting a better understanding of things, than there is at present between the two Courts, are disappointed. Great preparations are making for the entertainment of the Court at *Versailles*, where it will remain all the Winter. It is said that the Dauphin is again with Child, which occasions great Joy at Court.
