EXCHEQUER BILLS.

TO THE RIGHT HONOURABLE THE LORDS COMMISSIONERS OF HIS MAJESTY'S TREASURY.

Y a clause in an Act of Parliament, anno 48° Georgii Tertii Regis, intituled "An Act for regulating the issuing and paying off of Exche-quer Bills," it is enacted, "that from and after the passing of this Act, all Exchequer Bills which shall hereafter be made forth under the authority of any Act of Parliament, shall be prepared and made out at the receipt of the Exchequer, in such method and form as the Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury shall think most safe and convenient, and may contain one common sum or different sums in the principal monies; provided always, that every such Exchequer Bill shall and may be signed by the Auditor of the Receipt of His Majesty's Exchequer, or in his name by any person duly authorised by the said Auditor to sign the same, with the approbation of the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, in writing under their hands; and that every such authority shall be duly registered in the proper Office for the issue of Exchequer Bills, and notice thereof published in the London Gazette before any Exchequer Bill, signed by virtue of such authority, shall be put into circulation.'
