*Florence, Nov. 1.*

**T**HE Cardinal Colonna is arrived here from Rome, and has been to make his Compliment to the Great Duke. The Residents of France, and of Spain, at Genoua, have had Audience of that Senate; the first, to acquaint them, That the most Christian King had given Orders to the Commanders of his Men of War to Visit the Ships belonging to that State, to see that they have no Ammunition or Provisions on Board, designed for the Assistance of Argiers: and the other to complain that the Genouese Convoy, at its late arrival at Cadix, had not saluted that Port, as has been usual. The Postmasters upon the Road to Pignerol have Orders to keep good Horses in readiness, which makes them expect a Visit from Monsieur de Louvois; The French Troops continue to pass from Dauphiné thither, which gives the Governour of Milan great jealousy, and he has therefore resolved to raise 4000 Men for the Security of the Frontier Garisons.

*Vierm, Nov. 1.* The Palatine of Hungary having separated the Troops that were under his command, and put them into Winter-Quarters, is arrived here with some others of the Chief of the Nobility of Hungary, with whom the Emperor is willing to consult about providing Quarters for the Imperial Troop. As yet General Caprara continues Encamped near Trenchin, and will remain there as long as Count Teckley keeps the Field. The Berg-Towns are still in his hands, but the Persons appointed by the Emperor to look after the Mines, are permitted to go on with their work as formerly; in consideration of which, they are to pay him a certain Sum Monthly.

*Zell, Novemb. 20* On Monday last, our Duke received a Letter from the Princes of East-Frisland, giving him an account, that 400 Men belonging to the Elector of Brandenburg, had possessed themselves of Grietziel, obliging a small Garison of 18 Men, that was there, to quit the place; and that afterward 300 Danish Dragoons likewise arrived, and took their Quarters in the Neighbourhood: This News has occasioned several discourses here, but as yet it does not appear that our Duke will concern himself in this Affair, otherwise then to endeavour by his Mediation, to put an end to the Differences that are depending between the Princes, and the States of that Country.

*Francfort, Nov. 22.* The Courier which the French Ambassadors sent to Paris, upon the Application that was made to them on the part of the Deputies of the Empire, for the continuing the Negotiation after the expiration of the Term, is not yet returned; but in the mean time the French

Ambassadors declare, That they do not expect any Alteration of the Orders they have to leave this place the beginning of the next Month, and therefore they prepare for their departure. This City has hitherto declined entering into the Alliance that the Circle of Franconia (of which it is a principal Member) has lately made with the Emperor, being desirous to remain Neuter, and therefore will receive no Troops but such as are raised by themselves.

*Cologne, Novemb. 24.* The Deputies of Liege are not yet arrived, but expected every day. From Francfort they write, That the French Ambassadors were preparing to leave that place, and to return home, according to the orders they had, which they seemed confident would not be altered.

*Brussels, Nov. 20.* This place is now somewhat empty, all Officers from the highest Quality to the lowest being in their respective Garisons; and it's said that in case the most Christian King does not prolong the Term, his Excellency will go to Gauntz (where the Palace is preparing for his reception) for that it's believed, That if the French Troops make any Incursions, it will be on that side. From Luxemburg we have advice, That the French Troops are preparing to take their old Posts about that City, in order to block it up, which we are the less concerned at, for that the place is very well stored with Provisions, and that the Garison, with the last Supplies that were sent from hence, consists of 3500 effective good Men. From Lille they tell us, That there is a discourse that a Chamber of Re union will be set up there, in the same manner as at Metz and Brisac, and that the French speak of fixing a Quarter at Deinse. Don Antonio de Medrano, upon some dissatisfaction, has quitted his Government of Newport, which his Excellency has disposed of pro Interim, till the King does appoint a new Governour.

*Brussels, Nov. 24.* We have an account, of Count Tilly's arrival with his Regiment and the 300 Spaniards at Luxemburg: About five Leagues from the place they met with a Party of French Horse, and two Battalions of Foot; the Officer that commanded them demanded of Count Tilly, how he came to pass with such a Body of Men through the French Territories, without notice first given, and leave obtained; to which the Count only answered, That he was to obey his Orders: The French Officer asked again, whether in case he should oppose his Passage, he had Orders to force it, but the Count gave the same Answer as before, That he must obey his Orders; and the French permitted them to pass freely, without giving them any disturbance, contrary to their expectation. A Council of War being held at Namur for the Trial of the Count de la Tour, for disobeying his superiour Officer, they have pronounced Sentence, by which the said Count is deprived of his Command, (he being Lieutenant Colonel

Colonel of a Regiment) condemned to pay the whole charge of the Council, which amounts to 20000 Gelders, and required to make a Submission, and beg Pardon of his Colonel, and to remain a Prisoner till he has satisfied the said Sentence. His Excellency has received, in Bars of Silver, and Pieces of Eight, an hundred thousand Crowns from Spain.

*Hague, Nov. 27.* The 25th Instant the States of Holland were again compleatly assembled, his Highness the Prince of Orange being present in their Assembly. Our Letters from France give us an account, That the Swedish Minister at that Court having, in a late Audience he had of the King, pressed his Majesty to give order for the Payment of the Arrears of Subsidies due from his Majesty to the Crown of Sweden, the King had Answered, That he had a General Discharge from the King of Sweden; which the said Minister seeming surprized at, the King had added he would shew it him, and then took out of his Pocket the Copy of the Alliance lately concluded between the Emperor and the King of Sweden.

*Paris, Nov. 25.* The last Week the Marquis de Boufflers, upon an Order he received from the King, parted from hence in great haste, and it's said is gone for Luxembourg: and we are informed that Orders have been sent to the French Troops in those Quarters to take the same Posts they had during the Blockade of Luxembourg the last year, and that the Inhabitants of the County of Chimay have been forbid upon very severe Penalties to carry any Provisions to Luxembourg. At Thoulon four Men of War are fitting out, who are to relieve the Ships commanded by the Chevalier de Lery, which Monsieur du Quefne left before Argiers.

*London, November 22.* On Sunday Night a dreadfull Fire broke out in Cinnamon-Lane in Wapping, occasioned by the carelessness of an idle Fellow, which burnt so furiously, the Wind blowing very hard at South West, that notwithstanding the great Care and extraordinary Endeavours that were used, it consumed many hundred Houses, and was not quite overcome and extinguished till Monday at Night.

*Whitehal, Novemb. 22.* His Grace the Duke of Hamilton, having on the 25th of September last, in a Chapter then held at Whitehal by the Sovereign and six of the Knights Companions, been elected into the Society of the most Noble Order of the Garter; the said Election was signified to him by the Chancellor of the Garter. On the second Instant, his Grace arrived here from Scotland, and on the 4th in a Chapter held at Whitehal, having first received the Honour of Knighthood, he was invested with the Garter and Lesser George; and Yesterday he was honourably Installed at Windsor, the Duke of Ormond and the Duke of Grafton being the Sovereigns Commissioners for the performance of that Ceremony, and the Duke of Richmond, the Earl of Darby, the Earl of Denbeigh, with divers other Persons of great Honour, assisting therewith; who were afterwards most nobly entertained at a great and splendid Feast.

*Whitehal, Novemb. 22.* His Majesty has been graciously pleased, to confer upon Sir John Bennet, Knight of the Bath, the Dignity of a Baron of this Kingdom, under the Style and Title of John Lord Ossulston.
