A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE, R.

WHEREAS We have thought fit to order, that certain pieces of copper money should be coined, which should be called "farthings," every such piece having for the obverse impression Our effigy, with the inscription "Georgius IIII, Dei Gratia," and for the reverse the figure of Britannia, represented sitting on a rock in the sea, holding a trident in her left hand and branch of olive in her right hand, with the inscription "Britanniar: Rex: Fid: Def:" and the date of the year: And whereas pieces of copper money of the description aforesaid have been coined at Our Mint, and will be coined there; We have, therefore, with the advice of Our Privy Council, thought fit to issue this Proclamation; and We do hereby declare, ordain, and command, that all such pieces of copper money so coined, and to be coined as aforesaid, shall be current and lawful money of the Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and shall pass and be received as current and lawful

money of the said Kingdom; every such farthing piece as of the value of one farthing of like lawful money: Provided that no person shall be obliged to take more of such pieces, in any one payment, than shall be of the value of six pence.

Given at Our Court at Carlton-House, this fourteenth day of November one thousand eight hundred and twenty-one, and in the second year of Our reign.

The distance by which we are separated from our native country has tended to increase, rather than diminish, the interest which we have felt in the recent solemnities of the 19th of July, when your Majesty, by a public investiture, sanctioned by the sacred ties of religion, received that Crown which the virtues of your Royal Father had so long adorned: That its brightness and splendour will not be at-
