WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Commons, and Citizens of the City of Dublin, beg permission to present most respectfully at your Majesty's feet, our sincere and heartfelt congratulations upon your safe return to the capital of your Majesty's dominions.

The health of a Monarch, whose first ambition is, and uniformly has been, the happiness of his people, cannot but be an object of the liveliest and most indescribable interest; this is a sentiment common, we are assured, to all the subjects of your Majesty, but your ancient and devoted Corporation of Dublin would ill deserve the honours which your Majesty has so recently and bountifully bestowed upon them, if they did not feel that they more than participated in this loyal and affectionate solicitude.

May the Almighty Disposer of Events keep your Majesty in His most gracious and especial protection, granting you to live long and happily over all your people, and preserving to you, in His merciful Providence, health, repeatedly to confer upon your Irish subjects those unspeakable blessings which your presence among them has so universally excited and diffused.

The King was this day pleased to confer the honour of Knighthood on George Augustus Quentin, Esq. Colonel in the Army, Lieutenant-Colonel in the 10th Regiment of Light Dragoons, Aide-de-Camp to the King, and Major-General in the Hanoverian Service.

Dublin-Castle, December 31, 1821.

THIS day, at one o'clock, the Earl Talbot, late Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, left the Castle, in order to embark on board His Majesty's yacht, the William and Mary, on his return to England.

His Excellency the Marquess Wellesley, Lord Lieutenant, and the Earl Talbot went together from the Castle in the state coach, preceded by the leading coaches, in which were the Officers of State, to the South Wall, where the yacht lay.

They were escorted by a squadron of dragoons, and attended by a number of the Nobility and persons of distinction, the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, several of the Aldermen, and principal Citizens, in their carriages, followed by a concourse of people, to the water side.

The streets were lined by the regiments of infantry on Dublin duty.

The Earl Talbot received every demonstration of respect, in passing through the streets, from the people, who testified their regard by repeated wishes for his welfare and safe return to England.

A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE, R.

WHEREAS Our Parliament stands prorogued to Thursday the third day of January next; We, with the advice of Our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, that the said Parliament shall be further prorogued, on the said third day of January next, to Tuesday the fifth day of February next; and We have given order to Our Chancellor of that part of Our United Kingdom called Great Britain, to prepare a commission for proroguing the same accordingly; and We do further hereby, with the advice aforesaid, declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, that the said Parliament shall, on the said fifth day of February next, be held and sit for the dispatch of divers urgent and important affairs: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses; and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required and commanded to give their attendance accordingly, at Westminster, on the said fifth day of February next.

Given at Our Court at Brighton, the tenth day of December one thousand eight hundred and twenty-one, and in the second year of Our reign.

GOD save the KING.

AT the Court at Carlton-House, the 14th of November 1821,

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the fifth of May last, for prohibiting the exportation of gun-powder,

arms, or ammunition, to the places therein specified, will expire on the thirtieth day of this instant November; and whereas it is expedient, that the said prohibition should be continued for some time longer; His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, doth hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no person or persons whatsoever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's service) do, at any time during the space of six months (to commence from the thirtieth day of this instant November), presume to transport any gun-powder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, to any port or place within the dominions of the King of Spain, or to any port or place on the Coast of Africa (except to any ports or places within the Streights of Gibraltar), or in the West Indies, or on any part of the Continent of America (except to a port or place, or ports or places in His Majesty's territories or possessions on the Continent of North America, or in the territories of the United States of America), or ship or lade any gun-powder or salt-petre, or any sort of arms or ammunition, on board any ship or vessel, in order to transporting the same into any such ports or places within the dominions of the King of Spain, or into any such ports or places on the Coast of Africa (except as above excepted), or in the West Indies, or on the Continent of America (except as above excepted), without leave or permission in that behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring and suffering the respective forfeitures and penalties inflicted by an Act, passed in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Second, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the exportation of gun-powder, or any sort of arms or ammunition, and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying coastwise of salt-petre, gun-powder, or any sort of arms or ammunition;" and also by an Act, passed in the thirty-third year of His late Majesty's reign, cap. 2, intituled "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the exportation of naval stores, and more effectually to prevent the exportation of salt-petre, arms, and ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council:"

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

We, the undersigned, Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, pursuant to and in execution of the powers vested in us, in and by the said Act, do hereby declare, that it appears to us expedient that the provisions of the said Act should be extended to the articles of

Pigs' Chaps, Pigs' Faces, and German Sausages, legally imported or brought into the port of London (not being imported by the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies); and that such pigs' chaps, pigs' faces, and German sausages should be added to the list of goods, wares, and merchandise enumerated and described in the table annexed to the said recited Act, marked (E), and that such pigs' chaps, pigs' faces, and German sausages should be lodged and secured at or in such warehouse or warehouses, under the regulations and directions of the said Act: and we do further declare, that from and after the publication of this our certificate in the London Gazette, conformable to the directions of the said Act, all and every the provisions, regulations, and restrictions of the said Act shall extend, and be construed to extend, to all such pigs' chaps, pigs' faces, and German sausages, in every respect in as full and ample a manner as if the same had been inserted and enumerated in the table annexed to the said Act, marked (E), at the time of the passing of the same Act.

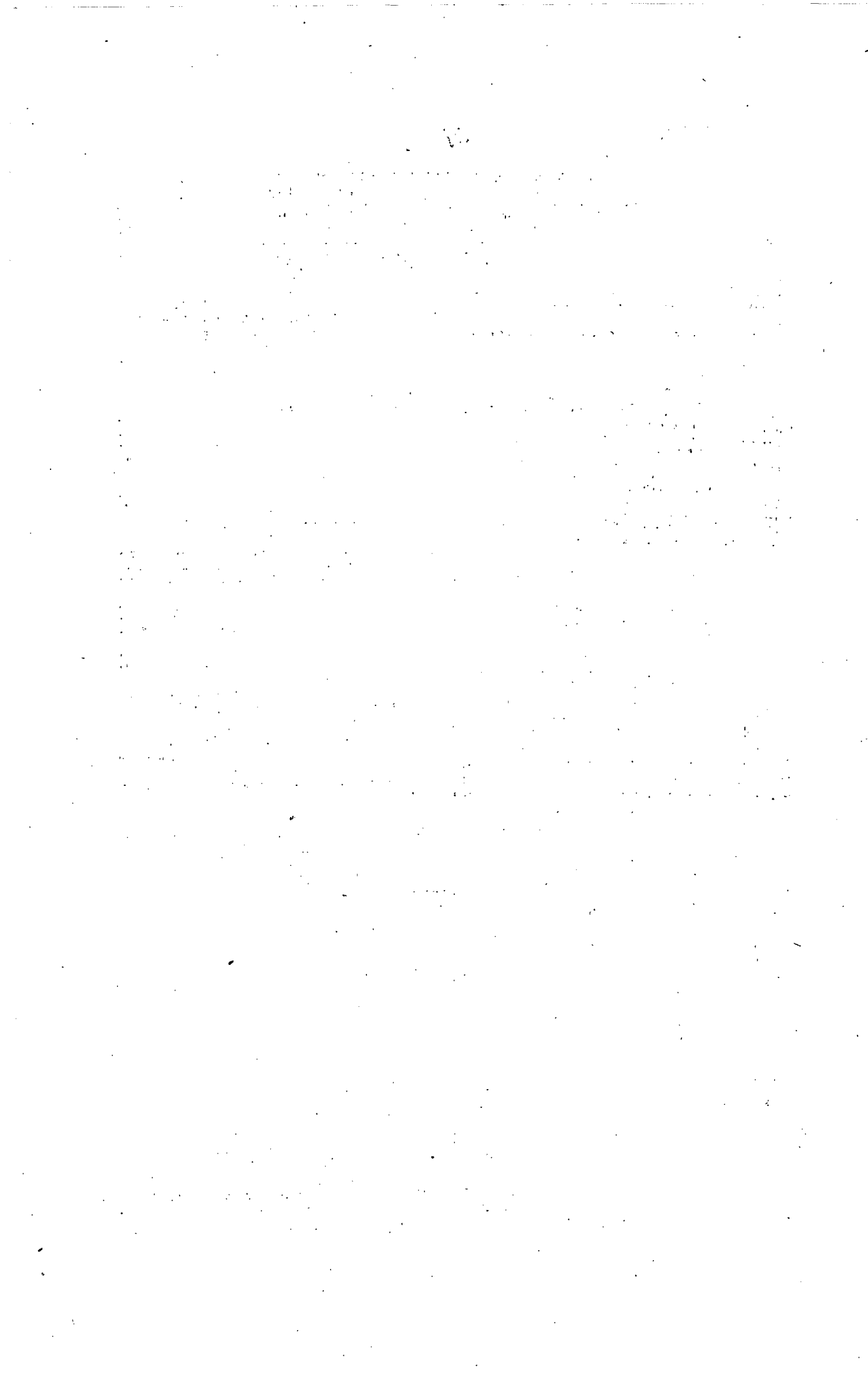
