Genova, Nov. 25.

THis Week departed from hence the *Hope* Captain *Ravens*, for *Evizza*. The 22 Instant arrived from *Civita-Vecchia*, and *Legborne*, the ten French Gallies, bound for *Marseilles*. Yesterday arrived from *Legborne* the *Katherine*, Captain *Grist*. By the way of *Legborne* we have advice, That Admiral *Herbert* had Confirmed the Peace with the Government of *Argiers*, That he had done the like at *Tunis*, and was going on the same design for *Tripoli*.

Vienna, Nov. 26. Count *Teckeleys*'s Deputies, after having had several Conferences with the Ministers here, and been admitted to an Audience of the Emperor, parted from hence the 24th Instant, with very advantageous Offers, as is said, from his Imperial Majesty to Count *Teckeleys*, in order to a Peace: The said Deputies were Presented with a Medal and Chain of Gold each of them, and seemed to leave this place very well satisfied; and it's hoped, That upon their Report to Count *Teckeleys* things will be disposed to an accommodation. We likewise persuade our selves that the Peace will be prolonged with the Turks, and it's said that Commissioners are for that purpose to meet at *Raab*; but this does not agree with our advices from *Turkey*, which all say that the Turks are bent upon a War. Our last Letters from *Hungary* gave us an account, That Count *Teckeleys* had been before *Le-wentz*, had summoned the place, and brought his Cannon against it, but hearing that the Emperor had Ratified the Cessation, he thereupon retired, and put his Troops into Winter-Quarters. Orders have been likewise sent to Count *Cappara* to separate the Imperial Army, which is to Winter in the Emperor's Hereditary Countries, except such Troops as it's thought necessary to leave in *Hungary*, to secure the Country against the Incursions of the Enemy.

Strasburg, Nov. 27. Monsieur de *Chamilly*, our Governour is returned hither, and as we are informed brings with him Orders from Court for the hastening the new Fortifications that are making here with all possible diligence. The Dragoons that are to Winter in *Alsace* arrive daily. The Foot that are posted on the *Preusch* have Orders to go into their Winter-Quarters.

Hamburg, Dec. 1. From *Zell* they write, That the Marriage of the Prince of *Hanover* with the Princess of *Zell* would be solemnized very suddenly, but that the day was kept secret. From *Stockholm* we have no particular account of the Proceedings of the Dyet assembled there: the Letters only say, That what they have hitherto done is very much to that Kings satisfaction.

Brussels, Dec. 1. The Deputies from the States of *Flanders* are still here, soliciting his Excellency

to set aside the late Reform he made in the Civil Government of that Province, and to settle it upon the antient Foot; and their Instances are likely to have the Success they desire. The Garrison of *Namur* has been reinforced with several Troops drawn out of *Gelderland*, his Excellency being particularly careful to provide it at place, as likewise *Luxemburg*, with all things necessary for its defence. From *Lille* they write, That the Marschal de *Humières* had leave to be absent from his Government for three Months, which is lookt upon as an Argument that the most Christian King will prolong the Term. Not long since arrived here a Spanish Officer from *Spain*, with Letters of Recommendation to his Excellency, by whom he was therefore very well received; but upon the Arrival of the last Spanish Ordinary, he was seized, and committed to Prison, where he was three days after strangled by the Common Executioner, pursuant to a Sentence that had passed upon him in *Spain*, and was sent over hither, for Poisoning his Wife: His Name is kept secret for the same reason, that the Execution was thus private, viz. to avoid publick Scandal, he being a Person of Quality.

Brussels, Dec. 3. The Marquiss de *Grana* has received advice from *Paris*, That the most Christian King, upon the Instances that have been made to him, has prolonged the Term which he had given the Crown of *Spain*, for the accepting the Arbitrage, till the 15th of *January* next. Six hundred Spaniards arrived lately at *Ostend*, and now we have an account of the arrival of 400 more, being sent from *Spain* to Recruit the Spanish Regiments in the Service of these Countreys. The Bars of Silver which his Excellency has received from *Spain*, are sent to *Antwerp* to be Coined. From *Lille* they write, That the Marschal de *Humières* was gone for *Paris*, and that he had given liberty to a great many Officers to be absent from their Commands for a Month. Our Letters from *Vienna* of the 26th past, speak as if they had great hopes that matters will be accommodated with Count *Teckeleys*, and the Peace with the Turks prolonged for four Years. The last Spanish Ordinary brought the Marquiss de *Grana* Bills of Exchange for five hundred thousand, Orons, Don *Michael de Suave*, Quarter-Master General in these Provinces, is a Prisoner, and his Process is forming for causing his Coachman to be killed. From *Liege* they write, That their Deputies at *Cologne* had demanded more ample Instructions, which had been sent to them, and that in the mean time the Magistrates of *Liège* are endeavouring to re-establish the Payment of the Tax of the 60th Penny, which his Electoral Highness insists to have done before they enter upon any Treaty.

Hague, Dec. 4. The States of *East-Friseland* have written a Letter to the States-General of the United Provinces, giving them an account of the Elector of *Brandenburg*'s having put a Garrison into
